AT the Court at St. James's, the 29th of April,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS by an Act made in the Twentythird Year of the Reign of His present Majefly, intituled, " An Act for preventing certain Influments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majelly, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majefty's Dominions and the Inhabitants " of the said United States;" which said A& has been continued by several subsequent Acts until the 5th Day of April, 1796. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to extend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year " of the Reign of His present Majesty, for giving " His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying " on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of " His Majetty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade " and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British " Coionies and Plantations in America, with re-" fpect to certain Articles therein mentioned," the Powers given by the faid recited Act were extended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, fo far as the fame might relate to Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of

the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mentioned Act has also by several sub-fequent Acts been continued until the said 5th Day of April, 1796.

And whereas by another Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act to continue " the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade be-" tween the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, fo far as the " same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried " on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the faid United " States," it is declared to be expedient, that the faid Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, so far only as the same extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the eople and Territories belonging to the United States of America, and also that the faid Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, should be further continued and be in Force; and it is thereby enacted, that the faid Acts shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1797.

His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, until further Order, any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law (except Pobacco, for which Provision is herein after made, and except Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the

Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rofin, Pot-Ash, Pearl Ash, Indico, Masts, Yards and Bowfprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, or in Ships taken by any of the Ships or Vessels of War belonging to the Government, or any of the Inhabitants of the faid United States, and condemned as lawful Prize in any Court of Admiralty of the faid United States (of which Condemnation due Proof shall be given) and owned by the Subjects of the faid United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Threefourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of fuch Duties as the like Sorts of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, natwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the fame may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law.

. And it is, in like Manner, further ordered, that all other Goods and Merchandize, not herein before enumerated or described, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Snuff, for which Provision is herein after made) and also Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti, being the Growth, Production or Manufacture of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be imported from thence into this Kingdom in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of such Duties of Customs and Excise as are payable on the like Goods and Merchandize upon their Importation into this Kingdom from Countries not under the Dominion of His Majetty, according to the Schedule and Tables, marked A. D and F. annexed to an Act , passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act for repealing the " feveral Duties of Customs and Excise, and grant-" ing other Duties in Lieu thereof, and for apply-" ing the faid Duties together with the other Du-" ties composing the Public Revenue; for permit"ting the Importation of certain Goods, Wares " and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture " of the European Dominions of the French King, " into this Kingdom; and for applying certain un-" claimed Monies remaining in the Exchequer, for " the Payment of Annuities on Lives, to the Re-"duction of the National Debt;" or by any other Laws in Force passed subsequent to the said Act, touching the Duties contained in the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F.; and in Cases where different Duties are imposed upon the like Goods imported from different Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, then that such Goods shall be imported upon the lowest Duties which by the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. are required to be paid on the Importation of any fuch Goods from any European Country not under the Dominion of His Majesty.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that, until further Order, all such Goods and Merchandize shall be intitled to the same Drawbacks as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandize when exported from this Kingdom, according to the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to the before mentioned Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, or according to any other Law in Force, passed subsequent to the faid Act, touching Drawbacks. And it is hereby, in like Manner, further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks and Bounties on Goods and Merchandize exported from this Kingdom to the Territories of the faid United States, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Expertation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America. And it is hereby, in like Manner, further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the fame Drawbacks upon the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from this Kingdom into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of H-mp or Iron to other Foreign Parts; and all fuch Drawbacks and Bounties respectively shall be allowed and paid in the fame Manner, and under the fame Rules, Regulations, Restrictions and Forseitures, in all Respects, as such Drawbacks and Bounties are allowed and paid, or are subject and liable to by Law; provided always, and His Majesty is further Exportation

be construed to prevent the Importation of Rice and other Articles, without Payment of any Duty whatever, by virtue of an A& passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act to prohibit the " Exportation of Corn, Meal, Flour and Potatoes, " and to permit the Importation of Corn and other " Articles of Provision, for a limited Time, in any " Ships whatever, without Payment of Duty, and " in the Manner in the faid Act mentioned."

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that, until further Order, any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be imported in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of the same Duties as Tobacco, imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation, is or may hereafter be fubject to; and that any Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of any of the faid Territories, may be imported in Manner before mentioned. upon Payment of fuch Duties as Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of Europe, imported from Europe, is or hereafter may be subject to, and may be warehoused and again exported; subject respectively nevertheless to all and singular the Regulations of an A& made and passed in the Twentyninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, " An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in " Lieu thereof:" And another Act passed in the Thirtieth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to explain and amend an Act " made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled " An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and " Spuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu " thereof:" And also another Act passed in the Thirty first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to prevent other Ships than those " laden with Tobacco from mooring and discharg-" ing their Lading at the Placer appointed by an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign " of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for " repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, " and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof; " to prohibit the Exportation of damaged or mean " Tobacco; and for permitting the Importation of " Tobacco and Snuff into the Port of Newcassle " upon Tyne."

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That in case and as often as Rice shall not be allowed, by the faid Act passed in the present Session of Par-

pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall | Duty, any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdon, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight-pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinaster excepted) under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpole by the Commiffioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for fuch Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall be so landed : But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any fuch Rice into the Ports of London, Briftol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Pool, Whitehaven, Hull. Greenock, and Port Glasg .w, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberry to enter and land the same without Payment of any Duty whatever; ia which Cafe fuch Rice shall be warehoused, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors, in fuch Warehouse or Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain ca'led England, and any Three or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; every Expence a tentling which Warehousing shall be borne by the faid Proprietors: And that fuch Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, at all seasonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to such Warehouses, in the Presence of some proper Officer of the Customs, for the Purpose of skreening and shifting the Rice, to prevent it's receiving Damage. And that if any Rice, which shall be so imported from the Territories of the sai d United States into any of the Ports abovementioned tespectively, and warehoused as aforesaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors as aforefaid, for Home Confumption, the full Duties, due and payable by Law upon the Importation of such Rice into this Kingdom for Home Confumpt on, shall, previously to it's being taken out of fuch Warehouses, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Ports where fuch Rice shall be so warehoused; but that such Proliament, to be imported without Payment of any | prietor, if he intends to export such Rice, shall have

respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever: Provided that the Exportation of any fuch Rice, hereafter to be warehoused, be made within the faid Space of Eighteen Months; and if not within that Period, that the full Duties, payable by Law upon the Importation of fuch Rice, be paid for the same, and not be afterwards drawn back: And that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond, in Manner aforefaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been so secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the faid Duties thereon shall be discharged and cancelled by Debenture or Debentures, made out and passed in the usual Manner, for the Quantity or Quantities of Rice duly exported. And if any Rice imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and warehoused in Manner aforesaid, shall be taken out of any fuch Warehouse for Home Consumption, the Remainder of the Duties, due and payable by Law, shall, previously to it's being taken out of fuch Warehouse, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Port where such Rice shall be so warehoused; and that such Payment shall be made, and the Warehouse cleared for such Rice hereafter to be warehoused, within the faid Space of Eighteen Months, otherwise the same shall and may be fold for the Duties, in like Manner, and under the same Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, as any other Goods are now directed by Law to be fold for the Duties.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commisfioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively Steph. Cottrell. appertain.

Liberty to export the same from such Warehouses [" Provisions relative thereto;" it is enacted, That His Majesty may, by Proclamation or Order in Council, when he shall see Cause, and for such Time as shall be therein expressed, prohibit the exporting or carrying Coastwife, or the attempting to export or carry Coastwife, any Sort of Rock Salt whatfoever: And His Majesty, judging it necessary to prohibit the Exportation of Rock Salt, doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, under the Authority of the faid Act, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the Date of this Order in Council, export or attempt to export. transport, carry or convey, or load or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatfoever, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by aforementioned Act: His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwife under the usual Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the ufual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given, by the Exporter and Two other Persons, (of whom the Matter of the Veffel shall be one) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the said Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if such Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, and within Twelve Months if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies, and within Eighteen Months if for any of the British Settlements or Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Cuftoms at the Port or Place where such Rock Salt shall be so landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Customs, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, testifying that the faid Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the fame was entered out. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respec-Stepb. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, 1793, to promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this inflant April; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it Is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the faid Thirtieth Day of this instant April, to the Thirtieth
