AT the Court at St. James's, the 29th of April,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by an Act made in the Twentythird Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, " An Act for preventing certain "Instruments from being required from Ships " belonging to the United States of America; " and to give to His Majesty, for a limited " Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants " of the faid United States;" which faid A& has been continued by feveral subsequent Acts until the 5th Day of April, 1796. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to extend the 4. Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year " of the Reign of His present Majesty, for giving 46 His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of 44 His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants 44 of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British 44 Colonies and Plantations in America, with re-" spect to certain Articles therein mentioned," the Powers given by the faid recited Act were extended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, fo far as the same might relate to Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mentioned Act has also by several subfequent Acts been continued until the said 5th Day of April, 1796.

And whereas by another Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act to continue " the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade be-" tween the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions " and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging " to the United States of America, so far as the " fame relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the faid United " States," it is declared to be expedient, that the faid Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, so far only as the same extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the eople and Territories belonging to the United States of America, and also that the faid Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, should be further continued and be in Force; and it is thereby enacted, that the faid Acts shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1797.

His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, until further Order, any Ummanusastured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law (except Tobacco, for which Provision is herein after made, and except Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the

Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermacesi) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rofin, Pot-Ash, Pearl Ash, Indico, Masts, Yards and Bowfprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, or in Ships taken by any of the Ships or Vessels of War belonging to the Government, or any of the Inhabitants of the faid United States, and condemned as lawful Prize in any Court of Admiralty of the faid United States (of which Condemnation due Proof shall be given) and owned by the Subjects of the faid United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Threefourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the faid United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of fuch Duties as the like Sorts of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law.

And it is, in like Manner, further ordered, that all other Goods and Merchandize, not herein before enumerated or described, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Snuff, for which Provision is herein after made) and also Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti, being the Growth, Production or Manufacture of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be imported from thence into this Kingdom in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of such Duties of Customs and Excise as are payable on the like Goods and Merchandize upon their Importation into this Kingdom from Countries not under the Dominion of His Majetty, according to the Schedule and Tables, marked A. D and F. annexed to an Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act for repealing the " feveral Duties of Customs and Excise, and granting other Duties in Lieu thereof, and for apply-" ing the faid Duties together with the other Du-

14 ties composing the Public Revenue; for permit-

" ting the Importation of certain Goods, Warcs and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture " of the European Dominions of the French King, " into this Kingdom; and for applying certain un-" claimed Monies remaining in the Exchequer, for the Payment of Annuities on Lives, to the Re-" duction of the National Debt;" or by any other Laws in Force passed subsequent to the said Act, touching the Duties contained in the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F.; and in Cafes where different Duties are imposed upon the like Goods imported from different Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, then that such Goods shall be imported upon the lowest Duties which by the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. are required to be paid on the Importation of any fuch Goods from any European Country not under the Dominion of His Majesty.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that, until further Order, all fuch Goods and Merchandize shall be intitled to the same Drawbacks as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandize when exported from this Kingdom, according to the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to the before mentioned Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, or according to any other Law in Force, passed subsequent to the faid Act, touching Drawbacks. And it is hereby, in like Manner, further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the fame Drawbacks and Bounties on Goods and Merchandize exported from this Kingdom to the Territories of the faid United States, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America. And it is hereby, in like Manner, further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the fame Drawbacks upon the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from this Kingdom into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron to other Foreign Parts; and all fuch Drawbacks and Bounties respectively shall be allowed and paid in the same Manner, and under the same Rules, Regulations, Restrictions and Forfeitures, in all Respects, as such Drawbacks and Bounties are allowed and paid, or are subject and liable to by Law; provided al vays, and His Majesty is further

pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the Importation of Rice and other Articles, without Payment of any Duty whatever, by virtue of an A& passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An A& to prohibit the Exportation of Corn, Meal, Flour and Potatoes, and to permit the Importation of Corn and other Articles of Provision, for a limited Time, in any Ships whatever, without Payment of Duty, and in the Manner in the said A& mentioned."

And His Majetty is hereby further pleased to order, that, until further Order, any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be imported in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of the same Duties as Tobacco, imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation, is or may hereafter be subject to; and that any Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of any of the faid Territories, may be imported in Manner before mentioned, upon Payment of fuch Duties as Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of Europe, imported from Europe, is or hereafter may be subject to, and may be warehoused and again exported; subject respectively nevertheless to all and fingular the Regulations of an A& made and passed in the Twentyninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, invituled, " An Act for repealing the Duties on To-44 bacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in " Lieu thereof:" And another Act passed in the Thirtieth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to explain and amend an Act " made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu " thereof:" And also another Act passed in the Thirty first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to prevent other Ships than those 14 laden with Tobacco from mooring and discharging their Lading at the Places appointed by an " Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for er repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof; to prohibit the Exportation of damaged or mean Tobacco; and for permitting the Importation of " Tobacco and Snuff into the Port of Newcastle " upon Tyne."

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That in case and as often as Riceshall not be allowed, by the said Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, to be imported without Payment of any

Duty, any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight-pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinafter excepted) under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commisfioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall be so landed : But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Briftol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Pool, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty to enter and land the fame without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Case such Rice shall be warehoused, under the joint Locks of His Majefly and the Proprietors, in fuch Warehouse or Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called England, and any Three or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; every Expence attending which Warehousing shall be borne by the faid Proprietors: And that such Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, at all feasonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to such Warehouses, in the Presence of fome proper Officer of the Customs, for the Purpose of skreening and shifting the Rice, to prevent it's receiving Damage. And that if any Rice, which shall be so imported from the Territories of the fai d United States into any of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforesaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors as aforelaid, for Home Consumption, the full Duties, due and payable by Law upon the Importation of fuch Rice into this Kingdom for Home Confumption, shall, previously to it's being taken out of such Warehouses, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Ports where fuch Rice shall be so warehoused; but that such Proprietor, if he intends to export fuch Rice, shall have

respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever: Provided that the Exportation of any such Rice, hereaster to be warehoused, be made within the faid Space of Eighteen Months; and if not within that Period, that the full Duties, payable by Law upon the Importation of fuch Rice, be paid for the fame, and not be afterwards drawn back: And that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond, in Manner aforesaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been so secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the faid Duties thereon shall be discharged and cancelled by Debenture or Debentures, made out and passed in the usual Manner, for the Quantity or Quantities of Rice duly exported. And if any Rice imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and warehoused in Manner aforesaid, shall be taken out of any fuch Warehouse for Home Consumption, the Remainder of the Duties, due and payable by Law, shall, previously to it's being taken out of fuch Warehouse, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Port where such Rice shall be fo warehoused; and that such Payment shall be made, and the Warehouse cleared for such Rice hereafter to be warehoused, within the said Space of Fighteen Months, otherwise the same shall and may be fold for the Duties, in like Manner, and under the same Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, as any other Goods are now directed by Law to be fold for the Duties.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treasury, and the Lords Commisfioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively Steph. Cottrell. appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS by an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intitled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been con-" cerned in advising or carrying into Execution an " Order of His Majesty in Council respecting the

- " Exportation of Rock Salt; for preventing Suits
- in consequence of the same; for authorizing His
- Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying " Coastwife of Rock Salt; and for making further

Liberty to export the same from such Warehouses | " Provisions relative thereto;" it is enacted, That His Majesty may, by Proclamation or Order in Council, when he shall see Cause, and for such Time as shall be therein expressed, prohibit the exporting or carrying Coastwife, or the attempting to export or carry Coastwise, any Sort of Rock Salt whatfoever: And His Majesty, judging it necessary to prohibit the Exportation of Rock Salt, doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, under the Authority of the faid Act, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the Date of this Order in Council, export or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or load or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatfoever, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by aforementioned Act: His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwise under the usual Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the usual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given, by the Exporter and Two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Vessel shall be one) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the faid Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if fuch Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majetty's Dominions in Europe, and within Twelve Months if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies, and within Eighteen Months if for any of the British Settlements or Factories in Afia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Customs at the Port or Place where fuch Rock Salt shall be fo landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Cuftoms, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, tetlifying that the faid Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the fame was entered out. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respec-Steph. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 4th of November last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pot-Ash or Pearl Ash, (except as in the faid Order is mentioned) will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant May: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibi tion should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the faid 7th Day of this instant May, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed our of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act paffed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesly's Reign, intituled, " An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising " or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords * Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl Ashes; 44 for preventing Suits in confequence of the fame; es for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exof portation or carrying Coastwife of Pot-Ashes or ec Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions " relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majetty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exporsation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majefly's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Articles do first make Oath of the true Destina-

tion of the fame to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commiffioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards .- And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majelty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
