Genoua, March 9.

OT any Ships are arrived here this week, fave the Providence, which came in this mor-

ning from St. Reino. We continue here in great apprehenfion of the defigns of the French. Coningsberg, March 3. The Sieur Alefeldt, En-voy of the King of Denmark, has, fince his arrival here, had fev ral Audiences of our Elector, and Conferences with his Minillers, we know not the particulars of his Negotiation, but in general it is faid, that his bufinels is to concert leveral matters with his Electoral Highness, concerning the continuing the War. From Livonia we have an account, that Count Horne had put their Troops he brought back with him, into quarters, to refresh them, after having fuffered to much as they did in their retreat. Yelterday the Duke de Croy, Governor-General for the Elector of this Country, treated their El cto-ral Highneffes, and the Electoral Prince, at a very fplendid Dinner. We know not certainly how long his Electoral Highnels will continue here; but in the mean time his Troops, and his Artillery, are march-ing towards Germany, which are unneceffary here, feeing we are not only freed of our Enemies, but likewife of any fear that they give us of any more vifits

Copenhagen. March 4. The Commissioners ap-pointed by the King to re-examine the affair of Lieutenant-General Arenfdorf, are Count Alefeldt Lord Chancellor, the Sieur Corbitz Great Marefchal, Count Anthony of Oldenburg, and the Siear Holger-wint Lord Treasurer : It is believed that the intention of affigning him thefe new Commissioners, is to acquit him. Our preparations for the next Campagne are carried on with all the vigor possible; and about the middle of the next month, our King will have a good Army in the Field, and a good Fleet at Sea; and that which encourages us as much as any thing, is, thar our King hath received fresh affurances from the Elector of Brandenburg of his being firmly refolved to continue the War, in conjunction with his Mijefty, till they can obtain fuch a Peace, as will leave them the fruits of the colt and labor th y have been at in the War. The other day a great many Scamen and other ordinary fort of people, being got together, begun to plunder and pull down fome houles they had taken offence at, and occafionel a very great diforder, infomuch that. the King was forced to fend his Guards to suppres them; which they did, and feized fome of the Ringleaders, who were committed to Prilon, to be pumilit according to their defert.

Strasburg, March 13. The Duke of Lorrain is gone for Vienna, having before his departure from his quarters given strict orders to the several Officers concerned to recruit their repective Regiments with all poffible diligence ; and likewife commanded that our Bridge ov.r the Rhine be speeduly repaired, and that no time be loft in the carrying of the new Fortifications that are making here, e

Cologne, March 14: The French have floff fe-veral Dutch Vesicls, who were coming hither Will Merchandifes. pretending certain Duties which the Matters of the faid Veffels refuse to payl We are affured that Monfieur Calvo, who commands the French Troops in these parts, has received orders from Court to pais the Rhine, and to fail into the Territories of the Elector of Brandenburg. The Emperor has it's faid written a Letter to our Magi2 firates to exhort them not to disband any of the Troops that are at prefent here in Garifon, till their n ighborhood be cleared of foreign Forces. We do not yet hear that the Dyet at Ratisbonde has given its confent to the ratifying the Peace, though it's not doubted but they will, notwithsfanding all the arguments that are used by the Deputies of the Elector of Brandenburg, to perfuade them to difapprove a Treaty, which is to difadvantageous to the Empire, and to apply themfelves to the taking of fitting re-

folutions for the carrying on the War. Liege, March 19. The French continue their preparations, in order to their pailing the Rhine at Ordinghen, where Monfieur Calud was expected as yelterday with a Body-of 12 or 14000 men. He has command ed the Country of Fulitrs to furnith 1400 Wagons for the use of his Troops in their march to the Rhine. We have an account that the Bilhop of Ofnabrug has fent orders to Monfieur de Louvigny to disband feveral Regiments of his Troops, whick

are now quartered in Wetter avia. Bruffels, March 17. Several Robberies have of late been committed in the neighb schood of this City by the Soldiers, five of which being appre-hended, were hanged this forenoon On Monlay laft the finall Town of *Ferke* near *Dieft* was burnt down, there being onely five of fix houles left fanding. The Letters from Liege of the is fay, that the French Troops are marching towards the Rhize, which it's believed they will pais at Ordinghen ; and add, that the French give out they will fortifie St. Tron, and lay up a great Magazine there; and at Aix la Chapelle they are providing a great many Wagons, to carry the Pontons which are to be made use of for their passing the Rhine.

Bruffels, March 21. O Sunday last arrived here the Sieur Minders, and the Sieur Wachtendoncke, from Paris, whither they had been fent by the Elector of Brandenburgh, in quality of his Envoys; they are now returning home, not having fucceeded in their Commission, which was to have treated with the Ministers at that Court, about the Peace of the North.

Ghent, March 18. His Excellency fince his being here, has regulated feveral matters relating to the good Government of this Ciry, and among other things, has displaced those that were in the Magiftracy, while the French were our Mafters, and has appointed others in their flead. Has likewife made a confiderable change in the Council of Flanders ,

by putting out all those that flayed here, and took an Oath of Fideli y to the French, and by giving the 1 whole power of acting to those Councellors, who upon the French coming hither, retired to Bruges. The Advocates and Procurators who flayed here, are alfo forbidden to practice, and generally all forts of perfons who executed any publick Charge or Office under the French Government, are removed from their Employments. This day the States of Flanders treated his Excellency at Dinner at the Stadthouse; on Monday the like will be done by the Magillrates, and a day after his Excellency will take a turn to Courtray and Audenarde, to lettle affairs there; and in his absence the States of Flanders will affemble here, and take a refolution concerning the fupply to be given his Excellency towards the maintaining the Army this year ; all the other Provinces having already agreed their quota's, and his Excellency having accordingly ordered the recruiting all the Regiments now on foot. The last Ordinary from Spain brought a Patent for Don Francisco Marcos de Velasco, to be Governor of the Cittadel of Antwerp; and another to Lieut nant-General Agurto, to be General of the Artillery.

Gbent, March 22. His Exc. llency continues still here, and the discourse at Court is, that he will refide here this whole Summer; this we know, that orders are given for the fitting the Emperors Palace for him. To morrow his Excellency intends for Courtray and Audenard, to fettle the Mngistracy of those places, and will return hither on Sunday.

Hague, March 21. The French demand of the Country belonging to Bolduc a very great Arrear of Contributions, and have threatned, that if the fame be not speedily paid, they will proceed to military execution; and on the other fide we are told, that the States have declared, that in fuch cafe they will defend their Subjects; the islue of this affair time must show. Complaints have been likewise made to the States, that Monfieur Calvo has cauled feveral Dutch Veffels, that were going up the Rhine to Cologne and other places, to be flopt, requiring a great duty from them, which the Mafters of the Veffels refused to pay. The Lord Ambassador Fenkins is come hither from Nimeguen, and has notified his arrival to the States, as being appointed by his Majefty to refide here.

Hague, March. 22. On Friday last about ten at night the Prince received an account by Sir Gabriel Sylvius, of the Duke and Dutcheffes arrival in the Maefe; whereupon his Highnefs ordered immediately his Yachts to go and attend their Royal Highneffes at Maefland-Sluys, and followed himfelf the next morning early, accompanied by all the principal perfons of quality here in Town, to receive and compliment their Royal Highneffes upon their landing, and to wait upon them hither ; accordingly they arrived here between one and two in the afternoon, and having dined with the Prince and Princes, were conducted by the Prince to the old Court.

Yeflerday the Prince drew out all his Horfe and Foot Guards, to shew them to his Royal Highn is . they made a very noble appearance, being in all 3000 men, and in a very good Equipage; and when the Duke paffed by them, the Prince put himf. If at Duke pailed by them, the Prince put himilit at the head of his Guards du Corps, commanded by Monficur Overkerke, and faluted his Royal Highnefs with his Sword in his hand, and afterwards as they

filed off the Prince marchel at the head of them, and repeated the fame Civility, though the Duke did all be could to hinder him. Their Royal Highneffes aro entertained and defrayed by the Prince with all possible demonstration of honor and respect; and the States, upon the notice they had of their Royal Highneffes arrival, defired to have rendred them thole publick Honors which are due to their high Quality, but the Duke exculed it, defiring to be here incognito.

Paris, March 22. The Chevalier de Lorrain is, as we are told, going for Spain, to compliment that King on the part of the Duke of Orleans, and to carry him Madamoiselles Picture. We are told that the Chevalier de Nefmond is failed from Rochefort with five Men of War, and that he is to join three more, which are already at Sea, to cruife against the Pirates of Sally. The Letters from the Rbine affure us, that Monsieur Calvo is going to pais that River.
