any Time, for the Space of Six Months from the faid 10th Day of this inftant June, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forseitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act for indemni-" fying all Persons who have been concerned in " advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Trea-" fury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or " Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence " of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to pro-" hibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwife of " Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further " Provisions relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board any of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to prevent the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majetty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfac tion of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Cuftoms, to carry the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is fo entered Outwards, and none other; an I fuch Bond shall not be canamora to a mar-

mand, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at | celled or delivered up until Proof bemade, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards .- And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Extract of a Dispatch from Mr. Fraser to Lord Grenville, dated Hamburgh, May 27, 1796.

Nformation has been received here from Amfterdam, of the 24th Instant, that, in consequence of the late Disturbance in that City, the French General Bournonville had thought it adviseable to propose putting a considerable Number of French Troops in Garrison in that City; that that Measure had at first met with much Opposition on the Part of the Burghers of that City, who had claimed to themfelves the Right of fettling their own Difpute without the Interference of the French Military; that how-ever they had been obliged to yield; and that a confiderable Body of French Troops had actually marched nto Amsterdam.
