And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord War-

den of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that in consequence of the Progress of the French Arms in the Territories of the Grand Duke of Tuscany, the Payment of Bills of Exchange, drawn or negotiated in the Town of Leghorn, may be deemed unlawful, by virtue of the Provisions contained in an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for preventing Money or Effects in the Hands of His Majesty's Subjects, belonging to or disposeable by Persons resident in France, being applied to the Use of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France; and for preserving the Property thereof for the Benefit of the individual Owners thereof;" and in an Act passed in the same Session, intituled, "An Act for more effectually preserving Money or Effects in the Hands of His Majesty's Subjects, belonging to or disposeable by Persons resident in France, for the Benefit of the individual Owners thereof;" unless His Majesty shall licence the Payment of such Bills, in pursuance of the Powers given by the said several Acts; His Majesty, taking the same into His Royal Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That it shall be lawful for any Person residing or being in Great Britain to pay any Bill drawn or indorsed in the said Town of Leghorn, and sent from thence on or before the Day on which the Armies of France entered the said Town of Leghorn; provided such Bill shall have been made payable at no greater Distance of Time than Ufance of Three Months from the Date thereof, or Three Months from Sight thereof; provided also that all and every Person and Persons, who shall take the Benefit of such Licence hereby granted, shall so take the same, upon Condition, that in case of any Proceeding, Criminal or Civil, under the Provisions of the said Acts of Parliament, or either of them, for any Thing alledged to have been done contrary thereto, any Question shall arise, whether the Thing so done was authorized by the Licence hereby given, the Proof that such Thing was done, under the particular Circumstances, and according

to the special Terms and Conditions required by this Order, shall lie on the Persons claiming the Benefit of such Licence.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of August next; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His

His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirty-first Day of August next to the Thirty-first Day of October following: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Thirteenth of January last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty-fifth Day of this instant July: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty-fifth Day of this instant July, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or em-

ployed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland; or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

THE Letter, of which the following is an Extract, was received from Colonel Graham, by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, dated Roveredo, July 4, 1796.

ON the 30th Ult. I had the Honor of informing your Lordship that the Enemy made an unsuccessful Attack on Monte Baldo on the 28th; since that all has remained quiet. Marshal Wurmsler arrived here this Morning.

Downing-Street, July 30, 1796.

THE Letter, of which the following is an Extract, was received from Lieutenant-Colonel Craufurd, by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, dated Head Quarters of His Royal Highness the Archduke Charles of Austria, Eisingen, near Pfortzheim, July 11, 1796.

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that, on the 7th and 8th Instants, the Archduke remained in the Possession of Ettlingen, in order to give Time for the Arrival at Pfortzheim of the Saxons, who were advancing from Graben to reinforce His Royal Highness's Army; and the Corps that had been detached into the Mountains, under the Command of General Keim, to cover the Left, was ordered to take its principal Position at Frawen Alb.

The Saxons reached Pfortzheim in the Night of the 7th. On the 8th the Disposition was made to attack General Moreau on the 10th, in the Position of the Murg, at Raftadt, Kuppenheim and Gertzbach, and, on the 9th, whilst the preparatory Movements were executing, in order to bring the Troops forward to the different Points from whence they were to advance the next Morning, the Enemy forced back the Archduke's Advanced Posts with a Part of their Army, whilst their principal Force attacked General Keim. His Royal Highness immediately supported his Advanced Posts, and was victorious on his Right, and along his whole Front; but General Keim, after having made a most obstinate Resistance, was obliged to yield to the Superiority of Numbers, and he retired to Pfortzheim. The Saxons, who were in March to cover that General's Left Flank, did the same; and, as this unfortunate Circumstance gave the Enemy Possession of all the Passes in the Mountains, on the Archduke's Left, His Royal Highness found himself under the Necessity of marching with his Main Army to Pfortzheim, on the 10th, where he is now encamped.

The Austrians lost on this Occasion about Sixteen Hundred Men and Four Pieces of Cannon. The Loss of the French cannot be exactly ascertained, but it must have been very considerable.

The Prince of Condé's Corps, which has behaved with great Bravery, was at Villingen on the 8th, the Date of the last Accounts that were received from it. The Austrian General Frolich still remained in the Brisgaw.

The Enemy has passed the Lahn, and the Army, which was left for the Defence of that Part of the Country; has retired to the Position of Bergeu, having thrown proper Garrisons into Mayence and Ehrenbreitstein.

Extract of a Letter from Captain James Athol Wood, Commander of His Majesty's Sloop Favorite, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Fort Royal Bay, Martinique, June 2, 1796.

INclosed are some Letters which I had no Opportunity to forward to Sir John Laforey before he left this Country, therefore transmit them for your Perusal.

Favorite, St. George's Bay, Grenada, February 17, 1796.

S I R,

SINCE I did myself the Honour of writing you on the 5th Instant His Majesty's Sloop under my Command has captured Two French Privateers, and run one on Shore within the Bocas on the Island of Trinidad; at the same Time the Alarm and Zebra captured a Privateer to Leeward of us, and retook Two Schooners. The Name of the largest Privateer captured by the Favorite is the General Rigaud, of Eight Guns and Forty-five Men, mostly Italian and Spaniards, a most desperate Set, without any Commission; the small one was lately the Hind Packet, taken off St. Vincent's. The Men jumped overboard and got ashore before we could take Possession of the Hind. The Name of the Privateer run ashore is the Banan. I have the Honor to be, &c.

Favorite, St. George's Bay, Grenada, March 12, 1796.

S I R,

THREE Days ago, about Seven in the Morning, in His Majesty's Sloop under my Command, we fell in with Three of the Enemy's Cruizers to Windward of this Island; Two Schooners, one of Ten and the other of Twelve, and a Ship of Fourteen Guns, They at first bore down on us, but perceiving we did not alter our Course, they soon after hauled their Wind to the Southward: Light and baffling Winds prevented our getting alongside of the Ship until Eleven at Night, when she surrendered without Resistance.

This Ship was the *Sufanna* of Liverpool, that had been taken only a few Days before, and was fitted and manned by the Enemy to cruise against the Trade of His Majesty's Subjects. The Two Schooners escaped under the Favor of the Night.

Having had about Seventy French Prisoners on Board the Favorite, I have taken upon me to distribute them, to the Number of Two or Three, on Board of each of the Transports and Merchant Ships homeward bound. The Officers I have put on Board the Charlotte Sloop, Lieutenant Williams, the Remainder I have put on Board the Prison Ship at this Place.
