Colegne, March 28. On Friday last Count Kinsky, one of the Imperial Ambassadors at Nimeguen, artived here from thence, and passed yesterday again on his way for Bonne. The French Intendant at Ordinghen has sent a Commissary hither, to treat with such as shall be appointed by our Elector, concerning the Centributions the French demand from this Dioceis. From Ratubonne we have an account, that the Dyet has given its consent for the ratifying the Peace with France.

Wesel, March 25. The French are already pessessed of part of the Country of Cleves, and of the Town of that name, where they have a strong Garison; they have likewise put 300 men into Buricke, and by their approaching towards this place, give us reason to expect a Siege, which we are therefore preparing for the best we can.

Nimeguen, March 22. The Marquis de los Ba'baces is gone from hence on his way to Bruffels, from whence he will continue his journy to Paris. The Court Kinsky, one of the Imperial Ambaffadors, has likewife icft this place, and is gone for Vienna. The French Ambaffadors have given an answer to the Paper of the Danes and Brandenburg Ambaffadors concerning the Cessation of Arms, which the Northern Princes have now accepted.

Eague, March 18. The Heer Meynders, who has been lately at Paris in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, is returned hither, without any success in his Commission; for it is hid the French insist to have Sueden restored to all that Crown has lost in this War, which the Elector will rather hazard, than yield to. It is reported as a thing very certain, that the Elector of Brandenburg will restore Schenck scans to this State, and that several Conferences have lately been held here with the Brandenburg Minister concerning it. We have an account, that Monsieur Calvo is fallen into the Country of Cleves, and that he was on Friday last in the Town of Cleves, into which he has put 24 Companies of Foot, and 6 Troops of Horse.

Hague, March 28. It is faid that Monficur d'Avaux the French Ambassador, does declare, that the King his Mafter has not any deugn of employing his Arms against Geneva, Genous, or any other part of Italy; and that the reports which have been forced abroad concerning it, are wholly groundless. The coming of the French into the Country of Cleves, has 10 far alarmed this State, as that they have refolved to fend several Regiments to strengthen the Garison of Schenck-schans, which is a Post of great impor-tance. From Nimeguen we have an account, that the French Ambassadors have agreed to a Ceffation of Arms with the King of Denmark, and the Elector of Brandenburg, to continue till the end of the next month; but those Princes would have it for a longer term. The French it feems are resolved to exact the Contributions they demand from the Mayery of Bolduc; and in case they are not pay'd, to execute the Country, which however they say they will do with all the moderation they can. We are every day expecting to hear that the Bishop of Munster. hath concluded his Treaty

Hague, March 31. Yesterday the Deputies of the States for foreign Assairs had a long Conserence with Monsieur d'Ausux, concerning the matter of the Contributions, which, as our Letters from France tell us, the Most Christian King has absolute-

ly refuled to refer to the Arbitrage of a third Party; it is hoped a way will after all be found out to compose the thing, by moderating the Sum de-manded, and allowing a longer time for the payment of it. A complaint hath been made on the part of the Most Christian King, to this State, that Scamen are raised in this Country for the service of the King of Denmark, contrary to the Neutrality which this State is obliged to by the late Treaty of Peace; and at the same time the Danilh Miniffer has likewise complained, that Seamen are raifed for the service of Sueden. From Nimeguen we have an account, that the Peace between France, and Sueden, and the Bilhop of Munster, was figned there on Wednesday last, and that Monficur Ducker, the Minister of the Bishop of Strasburg, was gone with the Treaty for Paris. The Letters add, that the Brandenburg Ambassador had confented to the Ceffation of Arms proposed by the French, to last to the end of the next month; and it was believed the Ambassador of Denmark Monfieur Hoeg, would do the like.

Portmouth, March 24. Yesterday in the afternoon the Harwich Sir Robert Robinson Commander, the Dunkirke Captain Ashbey, the York Captain Storey, the Lyon Captain Williams, and the Larke Captain Trelawney, set fail from the Spitthead to the Westward to Cruise. There remain at Spitthead the Spiftsure, the Staveren, and the Sarah Firelhip.

Deale, March 25. This forenoon the three East India Ships outward bound, sailed out of the Downes with several other Ships bound for Tangier and the Streights.

Whitehall, March 26. His Majesty having thoughtfit to dismiss the Earl of Danby from the Office of Lord High Treasurer of England; and the Lord Latimer, his Son, having this morning delivered to White Staff into His Majesties Hands; His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Right Honorable the Earl of Essex, Laurence Hyde Eq; Sir John Ermlic, Sir Edward Deering, and Sidney Godolphin Esq; Commissioners of His Majesties Treasury.
