DISPATCHES, of which the following are Copies, have been received from Captain Anftruther by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majefty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

> Head Quarters of His Royal Highnefs the Archduke Charles, Windecken, September 10, 1796.

Mr Lorn,

T Have the Satisfaction of informing your Lordship, that the Progress of the Austrian Arms continues to be marked by brilliant and uninterrupted Succefs. His Royal Highness the Archduke having quitted his Camp near Wurtzburg on the 5th, puffied on a firong Advanced Guard, under the Command of Lieutonant-General Kray, to fecure the De Bouche of the Speffurt. That Officer arriving in the Neighhoushood of Afchatfenbourg in the Afternoon of the 6th, found the Enemy, to the Number of Two Thousand Men, posted so as to dispute the Pass from the Forest. After a fevere Cannonade, which lasted a confiderable Time, he attacked them with much Spirit, drove them from their advantageous Polition, and his Cavalyy purfuing them without Hefitation through the Town, difperfed them in the Woods on the other Side of the Meyn. The Lofs of the

Enemy on this Occasion amounts to above a Thoufand Men, of whom Six Hundred are Prifoners.

The Archduke advanced on the 7th to Afchaffenbourg, where the Main Body halted on the 8th; but Intelligence being received that the Enemy had abandoned Frankfort the preceding Night; the Advanced Guards were putthed on fuccessively to the Kintzig and the Nidda.

On the 9th His Royal Highnels marched to Dettingen, and on the 10th to Windecken; the Advanced Corps occupying the important Point of Friedberg,

Ten Thousand Men, drawn from the Garrison of Mayence, have advanced towards Kenigstein, (which was abandoned by the Enemy on the 8th) and will be a very effential Reinforcement of Infantry to the Army.

The Confequences of these rapid and detifive Movements have exceeded the Expectations of the most fanguine, and have uniformly frultrated the Defigns and Efforts of the Enemy.

Jourdan, who after the Action of the 3d, had directed his Retreat on to Fulda, was still in Hopes of gaining before the Archduke the strong Position of Bergen, where, reinforced by the Two Divisions which had been left behind in the Neighbourhood of Frankfort, he might have checked for a Time the Progress of the Austrians. In this View he arrived

by forced Marches at Schluititern, on the great Road from Fulda to Hanau, in the Evening of the 6th; but finding that the Duke was already Mafter of Afchaff nbourg, he gave up his A tempt, and, turning to the Right, directed his March acrofs the Vogelfberg towards Wetzlar, where, it is reported, he is endeavouring to affemble his Army.

From Information of the most authentic Nature, relative to the prefent Situation of the French Troops, I can venture to affure your Lordship, that they are in a State of the utmost Confusion and Despondency. A great Part of the Infantry have thrown away their Arms, and are almost naked. Their Retreat has loit ail Semblance of Order, and has become a tumultuous Flight. Exceflive Fatigue has probably destroyed more of them than the Sword; and the continual Dread they entertain of a general Rifing of the Peafantry in the Countries they traverfe has fpread a Panic among them, which renders them deaf to the Commands of their Officers. The Lofs which Jourdan has fuftained fince he advanced from the Lahn may be estimated, without Exaggeration, at Twenty Thousand Men; a Number which must be daily encreafed by Defertion, in the prefent State of his Army.

The Conduct of the French, during their Abode in this Country, has exhibted a Scene of Depravity, which is degrading to Human Nature. Robbery and Peculation have been universal in every Rank and in every Department of the Army.

Every Species of Violence has been exercifed on the Perfons as well as on the Properties of Individuals. Many Villages have been reduced to Afhes, without the Exiftence of even a Pretext for this Act of Barbarity; and the Countries, through which their Army has paffed, exhibit every where a Spectacle of the utmoft Defolation and Diffrefs.

BY Reports received from General La Tour it appears, that on the 1ft and 2d Inftant Moreau attempted, with his Right Wing, to make himfelf

Mafter of the Bridge on the Yfer at Munich. After a very obitinate Combat, which lafted the whole of both Days, he was repulfed by the Prince of Fuftenberg with confiderable Lofs.

General La. Tour, in the mean Time, having formed a junction with the Corps of General Nauendorf, attacked, on the 2d, the Left Wing of the Enemy, and drove it before him the Space of Six Leagues. In the Neighbourhood of Langenbruche, however, the Enemy having received confiderable Reinforcements, pofted himfelf fo advantageoufly, that General La Tour, after feveral fruitlefs Attempts to diflodge him, judged it expedient to retire to his original Poft behind the Yfer; having, however, fucceeded in the Object of his Operation, which was to weaken the Enemy's Attack on the Prince of Fuftenberg.

There is as yet no positive Information that Moreau has begun his Retreat, although from the late Movements, there is Reason to apprehend that he is making Preparations for it.



Wilhelmsbad, near Hanau, September 6, 1796.

TOURDAN continues his Retreat in the fame diforderly Manner: Numbers of Stragglers pafs by Hanau, and likewife on the other Side of the River by Steinheim; but the principal Part of the Army feems still to direct it's March by Fulda and Gettenhaufen. About 200 Artillery Men paffed this Place Yefterday, without even Side Arms : They faid they were difarmed and ill-treated by the Inhabitants of the Spesseft. It appears that great Numbers of the Enemy have been killed by the Peafants; they fell upon the Quarter-Master-General Ernouff, who was retreating with what is called the Grand Etat Major of the Army, killed the greateft Part of the Efcort, feized the Military Cheft, and divided the Money they found in it. General Ernouff, who is arrived at Frankfort, only escaped by the Swiftness of his Horfe. . As foon as the Frerch appear, the Alarm is given by the Ringing of Bells, when the Peafants immediately assemble where they think they may be able to attack the Enemy to Advantage.

HIS Majefty in Council was this Day pleafed to declare the Right Honorable John Earl of Chatham Lord Prefident of His Majefty's Moft Honorable Privy Council, and his Lordihip took his Place at the Board accordingly.

PROCLAMATION for pardoning DESERTERS. War-Office, September 22, 1796.

HEREAS it has been reprefented to the King, That there are at this Time feveral Deferters from the different Regular Corps in His Majefty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majefty's gracious Pardon, and that fuch an Inftance of his Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour;

Exeter. Winchefter. Marlborough. Hereford. Bury. Nottingham. Birmingham. Shrewfhury. Manchefter. Leedi. York. Kendal. Durham. His Majefty has been gracioufly pleafed, by his Order in Council, to grant his free Pardon to all Deferters from his Regular Land Forces, who fhall furrender themfelves, on or before the 10th Day of November next, to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whofe Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Infpector-General of the Recruiting Service at Chatham Barracks.

Such Deferters, if able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be appointed to fuch Regiments as His Majesty

Edinbargh. Glafgow. Aberdeen. Invernefs. may be pleafed to command; and fhall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the faid Deferters may have enlifted in other Regular Corps, and are now ferving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to fuch Deferters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct that they shall continue to ferve in the Corps wherein they now are, without being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deferters, in order to entitle them to the Benefit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable, as any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly ferved : But this Claufe is not to extend to Deferters enlifted by the Corps raifing Recruits for general Service ; which Deferters are only to be entitled to their Pardon on declaring themselves at Chatham Barracks to be fuch, and being there transferred to fome eftablished Regiment.

And whereas feveral of the faid Deferters have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol, or in Regimental Cuftody; His Majefty is likewife pleased to grant them his free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival under Escort at Chatham Barracks, where they will be disposed of in the Manner above-mentioned.

Any Soldier who may defert after these His Majefty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

From the Returns which have been made it appears, that in the Action of the 3d, 3200 Men were made Prifoners, exclusive of the Number that were killed and brought in by the Military and Peafants; 2 Standards were likewife taken: 127 French Ammunition Waggons, and 15 Pieces of Cannon, among which were 6 Field Pieces, were found in the Citadel at Wurtzburg. The Enemy at Schweinfurth left 90 Pieces of Cannon, and 60 at Freudenberg, feveral Magazines in the Town of Wurtzburg, and in the Citadel a large Cheft con-taining Specie, Mandats, and Affignats.

Glocefter and Berkeley Canal Navigation.
