His Majesty is graciously pleased to declare, that every Man found fit for Duty shall be entitled, on his Arrival at the Garrison to which he shall be sent, to receive a Bounty of One Pound Five Shillings, or so much thereof as shall remain after supplying him with proper Necessaries; and those who, on Examination, are found unfit for Duty, shall be dismissed, with proportionate Subsistence to carry them back to their Homes.

And it is hereby further notified, that all Out-Pensioners in South Britain and Wales (except as aforesaid) who shall not appear at the Times and Places herein appointed, will be considered as otherwise provided for by Government, or as Dead; and they will accordingly be struck off the Books of the Out-Pension of the said Hospital, without any Prospect of being restored thereto.

PROCLAMATION for pardoning DESERTERS.

War-Office, September 22, 1796.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, That there are at this Time several Deserters from the different Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that such an Instance of his Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour;

His Majesty has been graciously pleased, by his Order in Council, to grant his free Pardon to all Deserters from his Regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves, on or before the 10th Day of November next,

to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Inspector-General of the Recruiting Service at Chatham Barracks.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be appointed to such Regiments as His Majesty may be pleased to command; and shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Regular Corps, and are now serving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, without being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deserters, in order to entitle them to the Benefit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable, at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served: But this Clause is not to extend to Deserters enlisted by the Corps raising Recruits for general Service; which Deserters are only to be entitled to their Pardon on declaring themselves at Chatham Barracks to be such, and being there transferred to some established Regiment.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol, or in Regimental Custody, His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant them his free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival under Escort at Chatham Barracks, where they will be disposed of in the Manner above-mentioned.

Any Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

TO OFFICERS ON HALF-PAY.

ALL Officers on the Half-Pay of the British Establishment, resident in Great Britain and Ireland, are hereby required to transmit to the Secretary at War, within One Month from the Date hereof, an Account in Writing of their Age, past Services and present Places of Abode: And such as think themselves from Age or Infirmities unfit for further Service even in this Country, are to accompany their Reports with sufficient Vouchers of their Inability, and the Causes thereof: The Officers resident Abroad are to make their Reports in Six Months;

Months; those in the East Indies excepted, who are allowed Twelve Months.

Should any of the said Officers neglect to pay due Attention to this public Notice, within the respective Periods above limited, they will be considered as otherwise provided for, or dead; and their Names will be struck off the Half-Pay List accordingly.

MINUTES of the Forms and Ceremonies observed in the House of Peers on Opening the new Parliament.

House of Lords, September 27.

THE Lord Chancellor acquainted the House, that His Majesty not thinking fit to be personally present here this Day, had been pleased to cause a Commission to be issued under the Great Seal, in order to the Opening and Holding of this Parliament.

Then Three of the Lords Commissioners being seated on a Form, placed between the Throne and the Woolstack, the Lord Chancellor in the Middle, with the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury on his Right Hand and the Lord President on his Left, commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to let the Commons know the Lords Commissioners desire their immediate Attendance in this House, to hear the Commission read; who being come,

The Lord Chancellor said,

“ My Lords, and Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

“ His Majesty, not thinking fit to be present here this Day in His Royal Person, has been pleased, in order to the Opening and Holding of this Parliament, to cause Letters Patent to be passed under his Great Seal, constituting us, and several other Lords therein named, his Commissioners to do all Things in His Majesty's Name, on his Part necessary to be performed in this Parliament. This will more fully appear by the Letters Patent themselves, which must now be read.”

Then the said Letters Patent were read by the Clerk: Which done,

The Lord Chancellor said,

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

“ We have it in Command from His Majesty to let you know, that His Majesty will, as soon as the Members of both Houses shall be sworn, in Person declare to you the Causes of his Calling this Parliament; and it being necessary a Speaker of the House of Commons should be first chosen, it is His Majesty's Pleasure that you, Gentlemen of the House of Commons, repair to the Place where you are to sit, and there to proceed to the Choice of some proper Person to be your Speaker, and that you present such Person whom you shall so choose, here Tomorrow at Twelve o'Clock, for His Majesty's Royal Approbation.”

House of Lords, September 28.

Several Lords took the Oaths.

Then Three of the Lords Commissioners, being in their Robes, and seated as on the preceding Day, commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to let the Commons know, that the Lords Commissioners desired their immediate Attendance in the House of Lords:

Who being come, Mr. Addington said,

“ My Lords,

“ In obedience to His Majesty's Commands, the Commons of Great Britain have proceeded to the Election of one of their Members to be their Speaker, and their Choice has fallen upon me, whom they now present for his Majesty's Royal Approbation.”

Then the Lord Chancellor acquainted the Commons, that they were commanded by His Majesty to acquaint them, that His Majesty was perfectly satisfied with the Choice they had made, and doth allow and confirm Mr. Addington to be their Speaker; and doth also, in pursuance of their Request, grant and allow them all their ancient Rights and Privileges, as hath been accustomed.

Then the Commons withdrew.

St. James's, September 28.

This Day Mahomet Cagga, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from Tunis, was at Court, and had a private Audience of His Majesty: To which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Portland, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Leipsig, September 18.

An Estafette from Ratibon is just arrived at this Place, informing us, that, on the 11th Instant, the Austrian Generals Frolich and the Prince Furstenberg had made a successful Attack on the Enemy's Forces assembled near Munich, and forced them to a precipitate Retreat, with the Loss of about 2000 Men killed and wounded, and of 1500 taken Prisoners. This Victory was chiefly decided by a skilful Manœuvre of General Hotze, in consequence of which he had effected a Passage over the Danube, near Donawerth, with a considerable Body of Imperial Troops, with whom he attacked most vigorously the French Corps besieging Ingolstadt, and obliged them to raise the Siege with great Loss.

Where Officers are Abroad on Leave, their Agents are to produce attested Copies of such Leave, before the Half-Pay can be paid.

And as by an Act of Parliament passed in the Thirty-fifth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for establishing a more easy and expeditious Method for the Payment of Officers belonging to His Majesty's Navy," it is enacted by the 20th Clause of the said Act, "That if any Commissioned or Warrant Naval Officer who shall be entitled to receive Half-Pay, and shall be desirous to receive and be paid the same near to the Place of his Residence, he may apply to the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy in London to have such Half-Pay paid at or near the Place of his Residence in the Manner pointed out by the said Act;" Notice is hereby further given, that the Half-Pay ending the 30th of June, 1796, will commence paying on the 10th of next Month; and all Persons desirous of having their Half-Pay remitted to them, may apply as above directed.
