

th in into the Suedish Territories, and had ravaged and laid in waste 15 or 16 miles in length, and 5 or 6 miles in breadth, which he had done to deprive the Enemy of any subsistence for their Forces on that side. We have nothing new from *Schonen* or *Sueden*, nor do we certainly hear where the King of *Suedgnat* present is.

Hamburg, March 31. The *Brandenburg* Troops are coming down from *Prussia*; and it is reported that they will march towards the *Rhine*, for the defence of the *Electors* Territories on that side, which the *French* are ready to fall into; and at the same time the *Electors* will assist the King of *Denmark*, with 8 or 10000 men, towards the forming an Army in *Holstein*, which it's said is to be commanded by Prince *George*, to make head against the Forces which it's believed will be employed for the re-establishing the Duke of *Holstein Gottorp* in his Country, which he hath now been out of for some years. The Dukes of *Lunenburgh* are going to disband greatest part of their Forces, and it's probable the Princes that remain in the War will endeavor to get them into their service.

Cologne, March 31. On Monday last Count *Kinski*, who came hither two days before from *Nimeguen*, parted again for *Bonne*, from thence to continue his journey for *Vienna*. The *French* do now demand Contributions for the month of *April*; which the *Country* people being unable to pay, they every where desert their houses, so that the misery among them is great.

Paris, April 1. On Wednesday last the King's Guards received orders to be ready to march on the 15 instant, but whither no body knows. It is said that the King has ordered the *Marschal de Crequi* to part immediately for *Alsace*, to command his Forces there. The discourse at Court concerning the Duke of *Mansou's* selling *Casal* and *Montserrat* to our King, is revived; a short time may let us see what ground there is for it. Yesterday was published here an *Edict* for the regulating of *Monies*, by which all foreign Coins, except Spanish *Piols* of weight, and *Reals* of weight, are cryed down; and the 4 *Sols* pieces are reduced to 3 *Sols*, and 9 *Deniers* for 3 months, and after that to 3 *Sols* and an half; and the marked *Sols* to 12 *Deniers*. We are told that the King's journey is put off till the end of this month; and some say, even to the 5th or 10th of the next. The Duke of *Navailles*, who commanded the King's Army in *Catalonia*, is come to Court. The Chamber of Justice appointed by the King for the Tryal of those persons who are now in Prison upon an Accusation of having poisoned several people, will begin their Session presently after *Easter*, though the first President hath made fresh instances to the King, that the cognizance of that affair might be left to the Parliament here.

Brussels, April 4. On Saturday in the evening the Dutchess de *Villa Hermosa* arrived here from *Engbien*, and was soon after to pay her Respects to her Royal Highness; and yesterday his Royal Highness visited her Excellency and the Princess of *Vaudemont*. His Excellency is expected here on Friday or Saturday next from *Ghent*, where he hath been detained longer than he expected by the publick affairs. To morrow the States of *Flanders* will take a final resolution concerning the supply demanded by his Excellency. From *Flanders* they write, that the *French* Troops are marching towards

the *Boulannois*, and the *Sea Coast*. The Baron de *Hounsbrooke* is gone by his Excellencies order for *Paris*, to adjust the matter of the Contributions.

Hague, April 4. On Friday last the States of *Holland* separated for some time, having granted the 200th penny to be paid by the first of *June*, and with some abatement to those who shall pay their quota's by the first of *May*. The matter of the Contributions of the *Mavery of Bolduc* is adjusted, the States having given way that they shall be paid; the first payment is to begin about a week hence, and so to be continued weekly, till the whole Sum demanded be discharged. The Prince of *Orange* is gone this morning for *Soestdyke*, to pass some time there in Hunting. The Letters we receive from *Nimeguen*, confirm what we told you in our last, of the Treaty of Peace between the Crowns of *France* and *Sueden*, and the Bishop of *Munster*, being signed the 29th past: And add, that the Ambassadors of *France*, of *Sueden*, of *Denmark*, and of the *Electors* of *Brandenburgh*, had finally agreed on Articles for a Cessation of Arms, to commence on the first day of this month, and to continue till the first day of *May*, during which time Contributions are to be paid as formerly.

Falmouth, March 24. Yesterday came into this Port the *Ferry* of *Bristol*, in two days from *Morlaix*; the Master says that there are a great many Soldiers in those Parts, and that the Drums beat daily to raise Seamen to serve on Board the Men of War that are fitting out.

Lynn, March 24. The 20 instant arrived here the *Endeavour* of *Ramsgate*, with Tobacco from *Maryland*, from whence she came about a month since; the Master says, they had there a very good Crop of Tobacco this year.

Plymouth, March 25. This afternoon arrived here the *Harwich*, the *Woolwich*, the *Lyon*, the *Dunbirk*, and the *Lark* Frigats, being bound to the Westward to Cruise.
