P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Thirty-fifth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to prohibit, for a limited Time, the making of Low Wines or Spirits from Wheat, Barley, Malt, or any other Sort of Grain, or from any Meal, Flour, or Bran, and for permitting Home-made Spirits, deposited in the Warehouses for Exportation, to be taken out for Home Consumption, on Payment of Duty;" and by another Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, for continuing the former Act, it is enacted, that no Low Wines or Spirits shall, till the 1st of February, 1797, be brewed, made, prepared, extracted or distilled from any Wheat, Barley, Malt or Tilts, or any other Sort of Corn or Grain, or from any Meal, Flour or Bran, or any Mixture with the same; with Proviso, that in case His Majesty shall, in His Royal Discretion, judge it most for the Benefit or Advantage of this Kingdom to permit the making of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat,

Barley, Malt, or any other Sort of Grain, or from any Meal, Flour or Bran, that, then, it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to permit all and every Person and Persons, Natives and Foreigners, (but not any particular Person or Persons) to make Low Wines and Spirits as aforesaid.

And whereas it hath appeared to His Majesty, that it would be for the Benefit and Advantage of this Kingdom to permit the making of Low Wines and Spirits from the Corn and other Articles hereinafter mentioned; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, according to the said Acts, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the Date hereof, it shall be lawful for any Person or Persons to make Low Wines and Spirits from Barley, Malt, or any other Sort of Grain, or from any Meal, Flour or Bran, other than Wheat, or any Malt, Meal, Flour or Bran made of Wheat. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant October; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said

Thirty-first Day of this instant October to the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by Majesty's Order in Council of the 29th of April, 1796, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom of any Sort of Rock Salt, will expire upon the 29th Day of this instant October: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this instant October, export or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or load or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of His Majesty in Council respecting the Exportation of Rock Salt; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Rock Salt; and for making further Provisions relative thereto;" His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwise under the usual Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the usual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given, by the Exporter and Two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Vessel shall be one) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the said Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced within Six Months from the Date

of

of the Bond, if such Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, and within Twelve Months if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies, and within Eighteen Months if for any of the British Settlements or Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Customs at the Port or Place where such Rock Salt shall be so landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Customs, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, testifying that the said Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the same was entered out. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 6th of May last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of of this Kingdom any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, (except as in the said Order is mentioned) will expire upon the 7th Day of November next: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to-commence from the said 7th Day of November next, export or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Ma-

jesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Pro f be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

HIS Majesty doth hereby direct and require, that all the OUT-PENSIONERS of CHELSEA-HOSPITAL, residing in South Britain, who were discharged from their respective Corps as Corporals or Private Men (those resident in London, or within Twenty-five Miles thereof, who are to attend at Chelsea on such Days as the Commissioners of the said Hospital shall appoint; the Out-Pensioners from the Cavalry; those Men also who by the Hospital Books are now more than Fifty-five

Years

Years of Age, or had served Twenty-five Years in the Army previously to their Discharges; and those who have lost an Eye or a Limb, excepted) do personally appear at the Places, and on the Days, hereinafter mentioned; that such of them, as on Examination shall be found fit, may be sent to Garrison Duty only, viz.

Kent and Surrey, (more than 25 Miles from London) —Maidstone, 24th and 25th October; or Winchester 4th and 5th November.

Suffex—Lewes; 29th and 31st October; or Winchester, 4th and 5th November.

Hampshire—Winchester, 4th and 5th November.

Berkshire and Oxfordshire—Oxford, 8th and 9th November.

Somersetshire—Bridgwater, 24th and 25th October; or Bristol, 28th and 29th October.

Wiltshire—Devizes, 1st and 2d November.

Dorsetshire—Blandford, 5th and 7th November.

Devonshire—Exeter or Launceston, 24th and 25th October; or Barnstaple, 29th and 31st October.

Cornwall—Launceston, 24th and 25th October; or Truro, 29th and 31st October.

Gloucestershire and Worcestershire—Gloucester, 24th and 25th October; or Bristol, 28th and 29th October; or Birmingham, 29th and 31st October, and 1st November.

Herefordshire and Monmouthshire—Hereford, 28th and 29th October.

Suffolk—Ipswich or Norwich, 24th and 25th October; or Cambridge, 29th and 31st October.

Bedford, Bucks and Herts—(more than 25 Miles from London)—Dunstable, 3d and 4th November; or Oxford, 8th and 9th November.

Norfolk—Norwich, 24th and 25th October.

Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire—Kettering, 24th and 25th October.

Warwickshire and Staffordshire—Birmingham, 29th and 31st October and 1st November; or Newcastle under Line, 4th and 5th November.

His Majesty is graciously pleased to declare, that every Man found fit for Duty shall be entitled, on his Arrival at the Garrison to which he shall be sent, to receive a Bounty of One Pound Five Shillings, or so much thereof as shall remain after supplying him with proper Necessaries; and those who, on Examination, are found unfit for Duty, shall be dismissed, with proportionate Subsistence to carry them back to their Homes.

And it is hereby further notified, that all Out-Pensioners in South Britain (except as aforesaid) who shall not appear at the Times and Places herein appointed, will be considered as otherwise provided for by Government, or as Dead; and they will accordingly be struck off the Books of the Out-Pension of the said Hospital, without any Prospect of being restored thereto.

PROCLAMATION for pardoning DESERTERS *War-Office, September 22, 1796.*

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, That there are at this Time several Deserters from the different Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that such an Instance of his Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour;

His Majesty has been graciously pleased, by his Order in Council, to grant his free Pardon to all Deserters from his Regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves, on or before the 10th Day of November next, to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Inspector-General of the Recruiting Service at

Leeds.

Leeds. Chatham Barracks.
York. Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men
Kendal. and fit for Service, shall be appointed
Durham. to such Regiments as His Majesty
Edinburgh. may be pleased to command; and
Glasgow. shall not be liable to be claimed by
Aberdeen. any other Corps to which they may
Inverness. formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Regular Corps, and are now serving therein, His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, without being under the Necessity of declaring themselves Deserters, in order to entitle them to the Benefit of this Pardon; and they shall not be liable, at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served: But this Clause is not to extend to Deserters enlisted by the Corps raising Recruits for general Service; which Deserters are only to be entitled to their Pardon on declaring themselves at Chatham Barracks to be such, and being there transferred to some established Regiment.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol, or in Regimental Custody, His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant them his free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival under Escort at Chatham Barracks, where they will be disposed of in the Manner above-mentioned.

Any Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

TO OFFICERS ON HALF-PAY.

ALL Officers on the Half-Pay of the British Establishment, resident in Great Britain and Ireland, are hereby required to transmit to the Secretary at War, within One Month from the Date hereof, an Account in Writing of their Age, past Services and present Places of Abode: And such as think themselves from Age or Infirmities unfit for further Service even in this Country, are to accompany their Reports with sufficient Vouchers of their Inability, and the Causes thereof: The Officers resident Abroad are to make their Reports in Six Months; those in the East Indies excepted, who are allowed Twelve Months.

Should any of the said Officers neglect to pay due Attention to this public Notice, within the respective Periods above limited, they will be considered as otherwise provided for, or dead; and their Names will be struck off the Half-Pay List accordingly.

WE, whose Names are hereunto subscribed, Volunteers associated for the Defence of the Town of Helfton, under your Command, beg Leave to repeat our Loyalty and Attachment to our King, and Readiness to stand forward at this critical Period, for the Defence, not only of our Town but our Country at large, our Religion, our Liberties, Properties and every Thing that we hold dear, under the auspicious Reign of our most gracious Sovereign, by declaring at this Time our Willingness and Determination (when His Majesty shall judge it necessary to call upon us) of marching, at a Moment's Notice, to any Part of the Kingdom, where you and your Officers will conduct us, not doubting but through the Justness of our Cause you will lead us to Victory; and that, by being firm and steady, our Foes will soon fly this Land of Liberty. This Day Mahomet Cagga, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from Tunis, was at Court, and had a private Audience of the Queen:

To which he was introduced by William Price, Esq; Vice-Chamberlain to Her Majesty, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Dublin Castle, October 13, 1796.

THIS Day the Parliament having met according to Prorogation, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Bryan Connor, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency made the following Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I Have His Majesty's Commands to acquaint you, that he has thought it necessary to require your Attendance in Parliament at this early Period, and to resort to your deliberative Wisdom at a Time when

when the ambitious Projects of our Enemies have threatened to interrupt the Happiness and Prosperity of his People, by making a Descent on this Kingdom and Great Britain. And although His Majesty looks forward with the utmost Confidence to the Spirit, Loyalty and Ability of his faithful People of Ireland to repel such an Attack, it will yet become your Wisdom to neglect no Precautions which may preclude the Attempt, or secure the speediest Means of turning it to the Confusion of the Enemy.

His Majesty has been graciously pleased to direct an Addition to be made to the Regular Forces in this Kingdom by Troops sent from Great Britain, the greater Part of which is already arrived; and, in pursuance of His Majesty's Commands, I have also encouraged the loyal and zealous Disposition, which has generally displayed itself, to associate in Arms under His Majesty's Authority, for the better Security of Property, and the Preservation of Tranquillity and good Order.

I have also His Majesty's Commands to acquaint you, that, in consequence of the Steps which he has taken to restore Peace to Europe and to secure it's future Tranquillity, a Way has at length been opened for an immediate and direct Negotiation, and that it is His Majesty's Intention to send a Person to Paris with full Powers to treat for the Restoration of general Peace.

The apparently hostile Dispositions and Conduct of the Court of Spain has led to Discussions of which I am not able to acquaint you with the final Result; but whatever may be their Issue, they cannot but afford to Europe a further Proof of His Majesty's Moderation and Forbearance, and cannot fail to animate your utmost Exertions in defending the Dignity, Rights and Interests of his Empire against every Aggression.

In reviewing the Events of this Year, it must afford you the greatest Satisfaction to observe, that, by the Spirit and Exertions of His Majesty's Navy, the Commerce of his Kingdoms has been protected in a Degree almost beyond Example, and in no Part more completely than by the Skill, Activity and Bravery of the Squadron stationed on the Coasts of this Kingdom.

The Success of His Majesty's Arms in the East and West Indies has been highly honourable and advantageous to the Empire, and evinced in the strongest Manner the Valour and good Conduct of his Forces both by Sea and Land.

The steady and dignified Conduct of the Emperor, and the Intrepidity and Spirit of the Austrian Forces under the Command of the Archduke Charles, have given so essential a Change to the Aspect of Affairs on the Continent, as to inspire a well-grounded Confidence that the final Result of the Campaign will be such as materially to promote His Majesty's Endeavours to obtain a safe and honourable Peace for himself and his Allies.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have ordered to be laid before you an Account of such Articles of Expence as are not included in the Estimates for the current Year, and which the present Circumstances have rendered necessary; and, when you consider the great Interests for which we are engaged, and the Objects for which we are contending, I doubt not that you will grant the

Supplies which may be requisite for them with your accustomed Cheerfulness and Liberality; and, when the ordinary Accounts and Estimates for the ensuing Year shall be laid before you, I trust you will then proceed with the Zeal you have always manifested in providing for the Exigencies of the State, and the honourable Support of His Majesty's Government.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Expediency of the vigorous Measures which you adopted in the last Session of Parliament has been amply proved by those Outrages, which they were intended to suppress, having, in a great Measure, subsided. I have, however, to lament, that in one Part of the Country good Order has not yet been entirely restored, and that in other Districts a treasonable System of secret Confederation, by the administering of illegal Oaths, still continues, although no Means within the Reach of Government have been left untried to counteract it.

You will not fail, at a proper Time, to continue your Attention to the Manufactures, the Agriculture, and the Commerce of the Country, and to extend your accustomed Benevolence to the Protestant Charter Schools and the other Institutions of Education and Charity which have been so long fostered by your liberal Encouragement.

The Prosperity and Resources of the Kingdom, so highly improved by your meritorious Care, still remain unimpaired by the Pressure of the War; and I trust to your unremitting Attention for the further Advancement of the National Prosperity.

You have learnt the Steps which His Majesty has taken to procure the Blessings of general Peace upon a solid and permanent Basis. Should these gracious Endeavours of His Majesty not be followed by the Success which he has every Reason to expect, he is satisfied that the Affections, Courage and Perseverance of his People will enable him to frustrate the Designs of our Enemies, and to maintain the Honour and Dignity of his Crown.

It will afford me the highest Satisfaction to be aided at this important Crisis by your Advice; and I rely with a Confidence you have taught me to indulge, upon your liberal Interpretation of my Conduct, and upon that Support I have so amply experienced since I received His Majesty's Commands to repair to this Country; and it will be peculiarly gratifying to me if I should have the good Fortune in the Administration of the King's Government to impress upon your Minds the full Extent of His Majesty's paternal Care of this Kingdom, and of my own Anxiety to promote, by every Means, it's Interests, it's Safety, and it's Prosperity.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His

His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And, if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Suffrance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
