If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly suffer the fame to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majefly.

One Moiety of the Forseitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utenfil or Implement whatfoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel or fron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any fuch Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Cafe of Tools and Utenfils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
