And whereas it hath appeared to His Majesty, that it would be for the Benefit and Advantage of this Kingdom to permit the making of Low Wines and Spirits from the Corn and other Articles hereinafter mentioned; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, according to the said Acts, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the Date hereof, it shall be lawful for any Person or Persons to make Low Wines and Spirits from Barley, Malt, or any other Sort of Grain, or from any Meal, Flour or Bran, other than Wheat, or any Malt, Meal, Flour or Bran made of Wheat. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

Day of this instant October: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this instant October, export or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or load or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of His Majesty in Council respecting the Exportation of Rock Salt; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Rock Salt; and for making further Provisions relative thereto;" His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwise under the usual Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the usual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given, by the Exporter and Two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Vessel shall be one) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the said Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if such Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, and within Twelve Months if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies, and within Eighteen Months if for any of the British Settlements or Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Customs at the Port or Place where such Rock Salt shall be so landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Customs, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, testifying that the said Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the same was entered out. But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney,

Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

PROCLAMATION for pardoning DESERTERS

War-Office, September 22, 1796.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, That there are at this Time several Deserters from the different Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that such an Instance of his Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour;

His Majesty has been graciously pleased, by his Order in Council, to grant his free Pardon to all Deserters from his Regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves, on or before the 10th Day of November next, to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Inspector-General of the Recruiting Service at Chatham Barracks.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be appointed to such Regiments as His Majesty may be pleased to command; and shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol, or in Regimental Custody, His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant them his free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival under Escort at Chatham Barracks, where they will be disposed of in the Manner above-mentioned.

Any Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

To his Excellency John Jeffries, Earl Camden, Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland;

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled.

May it please your Excellency,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to return your Excellency our unfeigned Thanks for your excellent Speech made this Day from the Throne to both Houses of Parliament.

We cannot sufficiently express our Gratitude to His Majesty for continuing to us a Chief Governor so eminently distinguished, as well by his amiable and domestic Virtues, as by his public Firmness, Uprightness and Ability.

We thank your Excellency for communicating to us, in His Majesty's Name, that the Enemy threaten a Descent on this Kingdom and Great Britain.

This Intimation, less calculated to alarm than to excite our Feelings, will stimulate us to evince the Loyalty and Spirit in which we trust His Majesty fully relies. We shall neglect no Precaution for preventing or defeating all hostile Attacks which may be attempted, and we doubt not they will quickly terminate in the Confusion of our Enemies.

We beg Leave to acknowledge your Excellency's Attention to our Security, in procuring an additional Supply of Regular Troops from Great Britain, and in encouraging the zealous and loyal Disposition, which is so universally displayed, to associate in Arms under His Majesty's Authority. Such Exertions, if continued with Perseverance, will enable us to repel any Attack with the surest Prospect of Success, and will preserve internal Tranquillity, and give additional Security to Property.

Your Excellency has afforded us great Satisfaction, by announcing to us that His Majesty has opened a Way for an immediate and direct Negotiation; and that it is his Intention to send a Person to Paris with full Powers to treat for the Restoration of general Peace.

The Conduct and Disposition of the Court of Spain, which at present wears so hostile an Appearance, will, we trust, be satisfactorily explained, when your Excellency shall be enabled to disclose the Result of the Discussions respecting them. If in this Instance we admire His Majesty's Moderation and Forbearance, we are at the same Time ready to vindicate the Dignity, the Rights and the Interests of the Empire against every Aggression.

When we reflect that the vast and extensive Commerce of His Majesty's Kingdoms have been protected during the present Year in a Degree almost beyond Example, we cannot but admire the Spirit and Exertions which so eminently distinguish His Majesty's Navy; nor can we pass, without a peculiar Mark of Applause, the Conduct of the Squadron stationed on the Coasts of this Kingdom, which has defeated every Effort of the Enemy against our Trade with such successful Vigilance and Intrepidity.

When your Excellency points our Attention to the Success of His Majesty's Arms in the East and West Indies, we see that the Exertions of his Forces by Sea and Land are there also conspicuous, productive of real Glory to themselves and of great Advantages to the Empire.

It is a real Source of Satisfaction to us to reflect on the honourable and dignified Conduct of the Emperor, and the invincible Gallantry of the Austrian Armies under the Command of the Archduke Charles. Their Steadiness and Valour have wrought a material Change in the Aspect of Affairs; and we trust that the final Issue of the Campaign, not less disastrous to France than its Commencement was flattering, will facilitate His Majesty's Endeavours to procure an honourable and lasting Peace for himself and his Allies.

The Cessation of Outrage which has in general taken Place in consequence of the vigorous Measures we adopted in the last Session afforded us real Satisfaction. We lament, however, with your Excellency, that good Order has not been universally restored; and we cannot but feel a just Resentment against that System of Confederation, under secret and unlawful Oaths, which has spread itself in some Districts of the Kingdom; and as we are assured

ured that no Means have been left untried by your Excellency to counteract the Instigators of Disaffection, it becomes us to increase our Vigilance, and to aid your Excellency's Endeavours with proportionate Energy.

The Agriculture, the Manufactures, the Commerce of the Kingdom, which have been recommended to our Attention by your Excellency, will be the Objects of our peculiar Care. The Protestant Charter Schools, and other Institutions of Education and Charity, which have been usually succoured by National Benevolence, will also receive, at a proper Time, their due Encouragement.

We cannot but feel the strongest Incitement to exert ourselves for the Advancement of National Prosperity, when we reflect that, even under the Pressure of War, our Resources remain unimpaired. This fortunate Situation of our Country is an evident Proof that the Measures of Government have been wisely directed to the true Interests of the Kingdom.

We look forward to the early Attainment of an honourable and permanent Peace, from the Steps which His Majesty has taken to secure that most desirable Event. If any sinister Views shall defeat his benevolent Purposes, His Majesty may rest assured of our Readiness to sacrifice our Lives and Fortunes in Support of his Crown and Dignity; and we doubt not that a brave and loyal People will enable your Excellency to frustrate every hostile Attack, and maintain the Kingdom in Peace and Security.

May it please your Excellency,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland in Parliament assembled, return your Excellency our sincere Thanks for your excellent Speech from the Throne.

His Majesty's repeated Acts of paternal Goodness towards this Kingdom claim our most grateful Acknowledgments; and in no Instance has His Majesty's Regard for the Happiness of his People of Ireland been more conspicuously manifested than in the Continuance of your Excellency as Chief Governor, who, by the Wisdom, Moderation, and Energy of your Government, have conciliated the Affections, and acquired the Confidence of His Majesty's Subjects of Ireland, and who, by your unremitting Attention to the Interests of this Country, have so essentially conduced to it's present Welfare and Prosperity.

We regret the apparently hostile Dispositions and Conduct of the Court of Spain, and that they have led to Discussions, with the final Result of which His Majesty has not as yet been able to acquaint his Parliament; yet we rely with the most perfect Confidence, that, whatever may be their Issue, they will afford to Europe a farther Proof of His Majesty's Moderation and Forbearance, and cannot fail to animate us in defending the Dignity, Rights and Interests of his Empire against every Aggression.

In reviewing the Events of this Year, it affords us the greatest Satisfaction to observe, that, by the Spirit and Exertions of His Majesty's Navy, the Commerce of his Kingdoms has been protected in a Degree almost beyond Example, and in no Part more completely than by the Skill, Activity, and Bravery of the Squadron stationed on the Coasts of this Kingdom.

We congratulate your Excellency on the Success of His Majesty's Arms in the East and West Indies, which has been highly honourable and advantageous to the Empire, and evinces, in the strongest Manner, the Valour and good Conduct of His Majesty's Forces both by Sea and Land.

We also felicitate your Excellency on the essential Change which has been given to the Aspect of Affairs on the Continent by the honourable and dignified Conduct of the Emperor, and by the Intrepidity and Spirit of the Austrian Forces under the Command of the Archduke Charles; and we trust that the final Result of the Campaign will be such as will materially promote His Majesty's Endeavours to obtain a safe and honourable Peace for himself and his Allies.

Strongly impressed with the great Interests for which we are contending, we will cheerfully provide for such Articles of Expence as are not included in the Estimates of the current Year, and which the present

present Circumstances have rendered necessary ; and, when the ordinary Accounts and Estimates of the ensuing Year shall be laid before us, we shall cheerfully grant such Supplies as the particular Exigencies of the Times may require for the Public Service, and for the honourable and secure Support of His Majesty's Crown and Government.

We have great Satisfaction in hearing that the Expediency of the vigorous Measures which were adopted in the last Session of Parliament has been amply proved by the general Cessation of those Outrages which they were intended to suppress. We however lament that in one Part of the Country good Order has not yet been entirely restored, and that a System of secret Confederation, by the administering of illegal Oaths, still continues, although no Means within the Reach of Government have been left untried to counteract it.

We shall not fail to persevere in our Attention to the Manufactures, the Agriculture and the Commerce of the Country, and to extend our accustomed Benevolence to the Protestant Charter Schools, and the other Institutions of Education and Charity.

We learn with the most cordial Pleasure, that the Prosperity and Resources of the Kingdom remain unimpaired by the Pressure of the War; and your Excellency may rely on our unremitting Attention to the further Advancement of the national Prosperity. Should His Majesty's gracious Endeavours to procure the Blessings of a general Peace, upon a solid and permanent Basis, not be followed by the Success which His Majesty has every Right to expect, His Majesty may rely with Confidence on the Affection, Courage and Perseverance of his People for furnishing His Majesty with the Means of frustrating the Designs of his Enemies, and for the Maintenance of the Honour and Dignity of his Crown.
