From Douday March 31. to Thursday April 3. 1679.

Mosco, Febr. 23, HE Sicur Hees, Envoy from the Elector of Brandenburgh, who hath been fome time at this Court, to negotiate an Alliance between the Czar and the Elector his Mafter against the Crown of Sueden, parted from this City fome days fince, having obtained a promise from the Czar, that he will fend an Ambas-lador to his Electoral Highness, who shall have full power to treat and conclude, according to the con-flitution of things; but after all it is very notorious, that the Czar has not any disposition (at this time that he is engaged in a War with fo powerful an Enemy as are the Turks) to enter into any Engagement against the Suedes; otherwife it's probable enough he-might embrace this favourable conjuncture to attack Livonia, to extend his Frontiers on that fide. The preparations of the Turks are very great, and they threaten to fall in upon us like an inundation, and to 'lay all wafte before them; but the Czar will on his fide have fuch great Armies in the Field this Campagne, that we have no reafon to apprehend their menaces.

Flenna, March 19. The Emperor, as we are in-formed, has lately received a Letter from the Duke of Mantoua, wherein he takes notice of the report fpread abroad of his being about parting with Cazal To the French, and affores his Imperial Maj-fly that it is without the leaft ground, and that he knows too well the importance of that place, to put it into any other hands. The Hungarians having hitherto refufed the Conditions tendred them by the Emperor, it is refolved to employ a very confiderable Army against them this Summer, which is believed the more neceffary, because the Turks, notwith landing all their affurances of friendlhip, and of their not giving the least affiftance or countenance to the Hungarians, are drawing their Forces together on the Frontiers of Hungary, and give us jult caule to fulpect the fincerity of their professions. The Count de Thoring, who was fent hither by the Duke of Lorrain, is difpatched back with Letters from the Emperor to his Highness, wherein his Imperial Majefly exhorts him to give way to the prefent necessity of the time; and to accept the Conditions flipplated for him in the late Treaty concluded at Nimeques.

The Letters we receive Dantzick, March 22. from the Dyet in Poland, fpeak of the great probability there is of the Mofcovites Ambailador fucceeding in his Negotiation, most of the Nobility being extremely inclined to a War with the Turks, in order to mend the Conditions of the laft Peace, which were fo difadvantageous to the Crown of Poland. From Moscouy we have an Account, that they were preparing there for a very carly Campagne, and that the Ezar would have this Summer 400000 men in the Field, for whole fubliftence valt quantities of Provi-Tions were bought up, and great Magazin's provided, in all the confiderable places near the Frontiers : That the Turks on their fide were, making the like prepation, and that the Grand Vifier would command the Ottoman Forces in perfon.

Hamburg, March 31. We were told that the Sicur Rabenac, who concluded the Treaty with the Princes of Lunenburg at Zell, was ordered, fo foon as h. had exchanged the Ratifications, to go for Berlin to expect the Elector of Brandenburgs return thith r from Pruffia, and to make Overtures of Peace to him, but at prefent we understand that his journy is flopt; but what the reafon of it is, we know not, unlefs it be what fome fay (but they possibly fpeak only what they with) that the Elector having declared that he will never part with all his Conquests in Pomeren, the French and Suedes who still make that demand, think it is in vain to begin a Treaty till his Electoral Highness be in other Sentiments. The Bishop of Munster continues to press with great earnelines the return of those Troops which were fent by his Predeceffor as Auxiliaries to the King of Denmark, but without any appearance of obtaining it; for those Troops are finde the death of the late Bilhop actually pail into the fervice of the King of Denmark, and have bound themfelves to him by an Oathof Fidelity. Struburgh, March 29. The Imperial Officers in

these Parts, continue to raise Recruits for the compleating their Troops, which are to continue on foot. The Duke of Lorrain remains still at his quarters, and at prevent there is nothing faid of his intended jou-ney to Kienna. The French work hard on the Fortincations of Colmar and Schleftadt, which they pretend to have finished by the end of the next month, Peor ple here are extremely pleafed, to hear that the Dyet hath given its confent to the ratifying the Peace.

Amiterdam, April 4. By a Vetfel arrived from Surinam, we have Letters from thence dated the 29 of December, which give an account that the India having got together in a confiderable Body, had fallen upon feveral Plantations, and barbaroufly murthered all the Christians they found there ; that they had likewife defigned to have surprized the Callle, but were disappointed, and force. I to retirey upon the Chriffians coming together, who had purfued them, and taken 15 or 16 prifoners, whom they had immediately executed. That the Heer Heynfius, the new Governor arrived there fome days before the date of theie Letters; and that the indians had fent to him to treat about a Peace.

Hague, April 4. The States General; who it feems are not fatisfied with the answer their Deputies brought them from the Provinces of Frizeland and Groningen in the matter of their separate diff banding, have ordered their faid Deputies to return to Groningen, and to make farther representatio: 8 to the States of that Province as well as to those of Frizeland, concerning their proceeding in this Affair, which the States G neral cannot but refent, as being

dang rous confequence to the well-being of the state It has been thought necessary to itrengthen the City of Breds with fome new Fortifications, which will, coordingly be immediately gone about; and for the hallening the Work the Princes Regiment of Foot Guards, and others will be font thither, to be employed in it; and it is faid the Prince will make a flep thither himfelf.

Hague, April 7. There are Letters from Franc-fort which fay, That the Imperial Army was to Rend-zvous at Egra in Bohemia on the 15 of May, and that it would confift of 40000 mens Monfieur Van Beuningen, Ambassalor Extraordinary from this State in England, having defined leave to return home, the States have granted it. From Wefel they write, that the Ceffation of Arms lately agreed Betweeh France, Sueden, Denmark, and Brandenburg, hall been published there. His Highness is gone to Sdeifdyke.

Gkent, April 4. His Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermofa continues still here, the affairs of this Province having taken him up longer than he thought they would. From Nimeguen they write, that the French Amballadors have prolonged the term for the exchanging the Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace with the Emperor, till the 20th of this month.

Bruffels, April 7. The French are demolifhing St. Guiflain, the Mines are near ready, and will be fprung in two or three dayes: And at the fame time they fortifie Mabeuge, where 6000 men are daily at work ; they have razed the Capucin's Cloyfter, with a great many Houfes adjoining to it, and have enlarged the Town on the other fide, by taking certain Hills, which did before command the place, within their Fortifications, on one of which Hills they have made a Royal Cittadel. The States of this Province have given fecurity to the French Intendant to pay the Contributions demanded by him within 6 weeks, after the Sum is adjulted; and in default thereof, they give their confent for the putting all those places, which are liable to Contributions, under Military Execution. The French demand likewife an Arrear of Contributions of the City of Louvain; the Sum they demand of this Province and Haynault, is T00000 Florins. The Marquis de los Balbaces is still here, expecting, as is faid, farther Orders from Spain, from whence the Ordinary arrived this day, and brings an account, that the Kings Journey for Catalonia was put off.

Paris, April 8. The 10th of this month the Court removes to Fontainebleau, where it will contimue till the King begins his Journey, which is now faid to be put off till the 15th of the next month. The s th inflant Henry Savile Elg; who fome days fince arrived here in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from His Majefty of Great Britain, was conducted, with the ulual Ceremonies, to his Audience of the King, and afterwards to that of the Queen and the Dauphin. From Germany we have advice, that the States affembled at Ratubonne, have by a formal refolution approved the Treaty of Peace concluded by the Imperial Ambaffadors at Nimeguen, where it's expected the Imperors Ratifications will now arrive in few days. The Sieur Ducker is arrived here from Nimeguen, having brought the Treaty concluded and figned by the French Ambafiadors, and the Sieur Zermulen, the Bithop of Munfters Minister there.
