A PROCLAMATION,

For Pardoning such Deserters from His Majesty's Marine Forces as shall return into His Majesty's Service on or before the Thirty-sirst Day of December next.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS it hath been represented unto Us, that there are at this Time several Deserters from Our Marine Forces, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of Pardon, and hat fuch an Instance of Our Clemency might have due Influence upon their future Behaviour, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclaclamation, and do hereby promise Our most Gracious Pardon to all Deserters from Our Marine Forces, who shall furrender themselves on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next, to the Commanding Officers of the Chatham, Portsmouth or Plymouth Divisions of Marines; and We do hereby declare, that fuch Marines, fo furrendering themfelves as aforefaid, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may have formerly belonged: And We do further declare, That Our faid Pardon shall extend to such Deserters as have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol or Regimental Custody, upon their Arrival under Escort at Head Quarters. But We do hereby further declare, that any Marine Soldier who shall defert after these Our Intentions shall have been made publick, shall not be included in the Pardon above offered, but thall, if found guilty by a Court Martial, be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Second Day of November, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-fix, in the Thirty-seventh Year of Our Reign,

GOD fave the KING,

AT the Court at St. James's, the 9th of November,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS His Majesty has received Information, that divers unjust Seizures have been made in the Ports of Spain of the Ships and Goods of His Majesty's Subjects, and that Acts of Hostility and unprovoked Aggression have been committed by the Ships of His Catholick Majesty on Ships and Vessels of His Majesty and his Subjects: His Majesty therefore, being determined to take such Measures as are necessary for vindicating the Honor of his Crown, and for procuring Reparation and Satisfaction for his injured Subjects, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprizals be granted against the Ships, Goods and Subjects of the King of Spain, so that as well His Majesty's Fleet and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissionated by Letters of Marque or General Reprizals, or otherwise

otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to the King of Spain, or his Subjects, or others inhabiting within the Territories of the King of Spain, and bring the same to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions; and to that End His-Majesty's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorizing the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprizals, to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the faid Commissioners shall deem sitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, feizing and taking the Ships, Veffels and Goods belonging to Spain, and the Vassals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or any inhabiting within his Countries, Territories or Dominions; and that such Powers and Claufes be inferred in the faid Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents. And His Majesty's faid Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorizing the faid Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the faid Court, his Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the feveral Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon, all and all Manner of Captures, Scizures, Prizes and Reprizals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be taken, and to hear and determine the fame; and, according to the Course of Admiralty and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all fuch Ships, Vessels and Goods as shall belong to Spain, or the Vasials and Subjects of the King of Spain, or to any others inhabiting within any of His Countries, Territories and Dominions; and that fuch Powers and Clauses be inferted in the faid Commission as have been usual and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewife to prepare and lay before His Majesty, at this Board, a Draught of such Instructions as may be proper to be fent to the Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's Foreign Governments and Plantations

for their Guidance herein; as also another Draught of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissionated for the Purposes aforementioned.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Moore, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Melampus, to Evan Nepean, Eig; dated off the Isle of Wight, November 14, 1796.

I Have to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that Yesterday Morning at Day-light His Majesty's Ships Minerva and Melampus drove a French National Corvette on Shore in the Entrance of Barsleur Harbour. The Wind being directly on Shore, and the Tide falling, it was impossible for His Majesty's Ships to get near enough to destroy her; but I have no Doubt she must be totally lost, it being near Half Ebb when she struck.

Captain Peyton having ordered me to work up towards Havre, with the Melampus and Childers, we parted from the Minerva in the Evening, and at Eight A. M. this Morning, the Childers being in Company, we discovered a Ship, to which we gave Chace: At Four P. M. we began to fire our Bow Guns at her, which she returned with what Guns she could bring to bear: At Half past Five, being within Half Musice Shot, and going to give her a Broad. fide, the discharged her Guns in the Air, and fitness her Colours. She proves to be L'Etna, of 18 Twelve Pounders and 137 Men, commanded by Citizen Joseph La Coudrais, a National Corvette, from Havre bound to Breft, laden for the Republic with Naval and Military Stores, and various other Articles. The Priloners inform me, that the other Corvette ashore at Barsleur, had sailed the Night be-fore L'Etna did from the Bason of Havre, is called L'Etonnant, mounting 18 Eighteen Pounders, bound for Breft, and laden with Naval and Military Stores. They are both quite new, very complete Ships, and their first Oruize.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Bosuater, Commander of His Majefty's Ship Trent, to Evan Nepean, E/q; dated Yarmouth Roads, October 16, 1796.

YOU will be pleased to inform their Lordships, that, in consequence of the Representation of the Mayor of Yamouth, informing me that Two Ships passing between Ousley Bay and this Place, were attacked by a small Cutter Privateer off Southwold, on Monday Eve, about Nine o'Clock. I Yesterday

Yesterday Morning dispatched the Phoenix hired Cutter in Quest of her, and to give Information to the Espeigle Brig, on that Station.

Thursday Morning, November 17.

The Wind blowing very hard all Day Yesterday from the Westward, prevented my sending this to the Post, and since that Time the Phoenix has returned to this Place, bringing in with her the Privateer Cutter she was sent after. The Privateer had been Four Days from Dunkirk, and had taken a light Collier Brig the Day before she was captured.

Copy of a Letter from Lieutenant William Sharp, commanding His Majesty's bired Armed Cutter the Dover, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Swansea, November 16, 1796.

SIR,

AM to acquaint you, for the Information of their Lordships, that on the 12th Instant I captured, in His Majesty's hired Armed Cutter Dover, under my Command, Seven Leagues South of the Land's End, the Providence, Lugger Privateer, a new fast-sailing Vessel, carrying Four Three Pounders, pierced for Eight, with 29 Men; out Four Days from St. Maloes, and had not taken any Thing.

SIR,

I Beg Leave to inform you, that this Morning, Uthant bearing N. E. by E. Eight Leagues, I discovered His Majesty's Ship Thake in Chace of a strange Sail; and the Artois being pretty well to Windward, I made her Signal to join the Pursuit also, and have the Satisfaction to say, that Sir Edmund Nagle brought her to at Eleven A. M. Ushant then bearing N. E. by E. Eleven Leagues. She proves to be Le Franklin, mounting Twelve Six Pounders, and a Complement of 100 Men.
