PROCLAMATION,

For Pardoning such Deserters from His Majesty's Marine Forces as shall return into His Majesty's Service on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next.

GEORGE R. THEREAS it hath been represented unto Us, that there are at this Time several Deserters from Our Marine Forces, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of Pardon, and that fuch an Instance of Our Clemency might have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclaclamation, and do hereby promise Our most Gracious Pardon to all Deferters from Our Marine Forces, who shall furrender themselves on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next, to the Commanding Officers of the Chatham, Portsmouth or Plymouth Divisions of Marines; and We do hereby declare, that such Marines, fo surrendering themfelves as aforesaid, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may have formerly belonged: And We do further declare, That Our Said Pardon shall extend to such Deserters as have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol or Regimental. Custody, upon their Arrival under Escort at Head Quarters. But We do hereby further declare, that any Marine Soldier who shall desert after these Our Intentions shall have been made publick, shall

not be included in the Pardon above offered, but shall, if found guilty by a Court Martial, be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS His Majesty has received Information, that divers unjust Seizures have been made in the Ports of Spain of the Ships and Goods: of His Majesty's Subjects, and that Acts o. Hostility and unprovoked Aggression have been committed by the Ships of His Catholick Majeftycon Ships and Vessels of His Majesty and his Subjects: His Majesty therefore, being determined to take such Measures as are necessary for vindicating the Honor of his Crown, and for procuring Reparation and Satisfaction for his injured Subjects, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprizals be granted against the Ships, Goods and Subjects of the King of Spain, to that as well His Majesty's Fleet and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissionated by Letters of Marque or General Reprizals, or otherwife

otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully feize all Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to the King of Spain, or his Subjects, or others inhabiting within the Territories of the King of Spain, and bring the same to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominious; and to that End His Majesty's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to precare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to His Majefty at this Board, authorizing the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprizals, to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the faid Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, feizing and taking the Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to Spain, and the Vassals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or any inhabiting within his Countries, Territories or Dominions; and that fuch Powers and Claufes be inferted in the faid Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents. And His Majesty's said Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorizing the faid Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the faid Court, his Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the feveral Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon, all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes and Reprizals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be taken, and to hear and determine the fame; and, according to the Courfe of Admiralty and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all fuch Ships, Veffels and Goods as shall belong to Spain, or the Vastals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or to any others inhabiting within any of His Countries, Territories and Dominions; and that fuch Powers and Claules be inferted in the laid Commission as have been usual and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewise to prepare and lay before His Majesty, at this Board, a Draught of fuch Instructions as may be proper to be fent to the Courts of Admiralty in

My Lord,
I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that
official Accounts were this Day received by the
Archduke from General Davidovitch, stating
his having beaten the Corps that was opposed to
him, and taken a Thousand Prisoners.

His Advanced Guard has taken Possession of Trente, which Place, as well as the strong Position behind it, were abandoned by the Enemy without Resistance.

Archduke from Lieutenant-General Neu, Govern

nor of Mayence, it appears, that the Corps which had advanced to the Nahe has been obliged to fall back, and take a Polition behind the Seltz.

This Corps confifted merely of Detachments from the Garrison of Mayence, commanded by Major Generals Simpschan and Rosemberg. The latter, Generals Simpschan and Rosemberg. with the Left Wing, was posted on the Heights of Biebelsheim and Planig, to observe Creutznach; the former, with the Right Wing, on the Hill called the Rochusberg, to defend the Passage of Bingen. They had Orders, in case of being attacked by a very superior Force, to retire nearer to Mayence.

This Polition on the Right Bank of the Lower Nahe is well known from the Operations of last Year. It is not to be maintained against an Enemy of very superior Force; for Creutznach lies so entirely under the Fire of the Hills from the Left Bank of the River, that the Enemy is always Master of that Passage, as was sufficiently proved by the Affair of the 1st of December, 1795. On this Side Creutznach the Heights are so distant from the River, that the Enemy has every Facility in extend ing himself in Front and on each Flank of the Town; and a Corps of very inferior Force cannot take Post near enough to prevent this Formation.
On the 20th Generals Simpschan and Rosemberg

were attacked by Two Divisions of the Army of Sambre and Meuse. The Action lasted several Hours, and the Enemy, notwithstanding so very great an Inequality of Numbers, was repulfed with con-

fiderable Loss.

Early on the 27th the French renewed the Attack, and advanced in feveral Columns from Creutznach, to turn the Left of the Austrians; but the latter, by an Exertion of much Ability and Steadiness, maintained their Position. In the Evening, however, the Generals, in Conformity to the Order mentioned above, determined on retiring behind the Seltz; and the Retreat was executed with perfect Order.

The Loss of the Austrians on this Occasions confifts in Nineteen killed, One Hundred and Eighty-four wounded, Ninety-fix missing; on the Whole Two Hundred and Ninety-nine Men and Eighty-

nine Horfes.

The Enemy's was certainly confiderable; Two Hundred of them were taken Prisoners and brought

into Mayence.

I am thus circumstantial in stating the Particulars of this, in Fact, unimportant Affair, because I objective that the official Reports of the Army of Sambre and Meule, I mean the late ones, contain the most absurd Exaggerations. I should consider them perfectly undeferving of Notice, were it not that those who have no other Means of judging of the Events of the Campaign than by comparing the Accounts published by the contending Armies would be led into the most erroneous Conclusions if they gave each Party Credit for only an equal Degree of Pairnels in their Relations.

In the Enemy's official Account of the Affair of the 21st of last Month near Neuwied, it is represented as having been a ferious and general Attack; whereas it was merely undertaken for the Purpose of destroying his Bridge, and foreading Alarm on the Left Bank of the Rhine. Both these Objects were effected by a very infignificant Force; and there was not the smallest Idea of making a ferious Assault on the Tete-de Pont of Neuwied. The Enemy states, that, be-

sides an immense Number of killed and drowned. he actually took One Thousand Prisoners, whereas I can affare your Lordship, from the most authentick Information, that the whole Lois of the Austrians did not exceed Two Hundred and Eighty-four Men.

After General Moreau's Army had croffed the Rhine, Two Divisions of it were detached towards Liandau, and One Division of the Army of Sambre and Meuse arrived about the same Time in the Neighbourhood of Kayferslautern. General Hotze was fill at Schweigenheim, on the Road from Speyer to Landau; his Corps was not of sufficient Strength to have any other Object than that of spreading Alarm in Lower Alface; and it was evident, that as foon as the Rhine should again separate the main Armies. the Enemy must immediately become Masters of the Vicinity of Landau,

General Hotze, therefore, on the Approach of Forces infinitely fo superior to his own, retired towards to the entrenched Camp of Manheim, without being in the smallest Degree molested by the Enemy. He established the advanced Posts of his Left Wing on the Reebach, from whence they ran along he Fletz

bach towards Franckenthal,

On the 7th Instant the French attacked General Hotze's Line. Their principal Efforts were directed against the Lest Wing, and the Fire of Artillery and small Arms continued a great Part of the Day; but the Enemy was repulsed, and General Horze full maintains his Posts in Front of the entrenched Camp extending from the Reebach, by the Village of Man bach, to Franckenthal.

My Lord.

IT is with the greatest Satisfaction I have the Honor of announcing to your Lordship, that official Reports were this Day received by the Archduke from Generals Alvinzy and Davidoviteli, wherein it appears that the offentive Operations in Maly have been most successfully commenced.

I should not presume to address your Lordship upon this Subject, were it not that if Cotonel Gradham is, as I suppose he must be, with Marshall Wurmfer in Mantua, he cannot as yet have had it in his Power to correspond with your Lordship.

General Alvinzy's Report is dated at Caldo Perro, November 7. General Davidovitch's at Trence the

8th Infant.

After the Second Operation, undertakes for the Relief of Mantua, those Corps of Marinal World fer's Army, which could not penetrate, retired the One under General Quoddanowich to the Venetial Frioul; the other, under General Davidovitch, up the Valley of the Adige, towards Neumarkt.

These Corps were successfully reinforced by confiderable Numbers of fresh Troops; and General Alvinzy, was appointed to command the whole of the Army, until it should effect it's Reunion with Martinal Wurmier.

After the Arrival of the Reinforcements at the Places of their Delimation, General Alvinzy, who in Person had undertaken the Conduct of the

who in Person had undertaken the Conduct of the

His own Corps was to advance through the Trevisine towards Bassano, and, after forcing the Pasfages of the Brenta, to proceed towards the Adige, whilst General Davidovitch should descend the Valley by which that River runs down from the Mountains of the Tyrol, forcing the Positions of Trente, Rovoredo, &c.

On the 3d of this Month, upon the Approach of Part of General Alvinzy's Advanced Guard, the Egemy abandoned Castel Franco; and on the 4th the Austrian Corps advanced in Two Columns to the Brenta; the one to Bassano (of which they took Possession) and the other of nearly equal Force (under Lieutenant-General Proverra) to Fonteniva.

General Alvinzy halted on the 5th lottant, and fpont that Day in reconnoitring the Polition of the Enemy. He found the French Army encamped in Three Lines in Front of Vicenza.
On the 6th, as General Alvinzy was on the Point

of pushing forward his Advanced Guard, Buona-parte, who had marched in the Night, commenced a most severe Attack upon his whole Line. The Action began with General Proverra's Corps about Seven in the Morning, and very shortly afterwards the Enemy also advanced against Bassano.

General Alvinzy reports, that the Enemy's Attacks, though made with the greatest Impetuosity, were confrantly and completely repelled; and that Night put an End to the Affair, without either Party having gained or lost any Ground: But an indis-putable Proof of the Austrians having had the Advantage in this Action is, that when General Alvinzy next Morning was preparing to fenew it, he found that the Enemy had completely retreated. He reports, that they directed their March towards Lisièra, r

General Proverra's Bridge over the Brenta having been destroyed in the Course of the Morning of the 6th, his Column could not cross the Rivel till towards Noon on the 7th, and General Alvinzy's whole Corps arrived late in the Evening of that Day at the Camp of Caldo Ferro.

General Davidovitch had in the mean Time driven back the Corps opposed to him, had made a Thou-fand Priloners, and taken Possession of Trente, as was mentioned in his former Report.

On the fame Day that the above mentioned severe Action was fought on the Brenta, General Davidovirch attacked the Enemy in the strong Pass of Caliano, a little to the Northward of Rovoredo. The Prench had entrenched their Position, and occupied, French had entrenched their Polition, and occupied, in confiderable Force, the Cattles of Besson and La Pietra, which, as I understand, command the Pass.

The Strength of the Polition was such, that, not-withstanding his repeated Esforts, General Davidovitch could not force it on the oth; but on the following Day he renewed firs Attack.
