E, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God, that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Wednesday the Eighth Day of March next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves be-fore Almighty Ged, in order to obtain Parloll or Our Sins, and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, fend up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved; and imploring His Blesfing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Direc tions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be !

used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

as We may juffly inflict on all fuch as contemn and neglect the Performance of fo religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the feveral Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We appoint them to fend Copies hereof to the feveral Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned the fame may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

### By the KING, PROCLAMATION,

For granting the Distribution of Prizes taken from the King of Spain, or His Subjects, subsequent to the Ninth Day of November, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-fix, the Date of His Majesty's Order in Council for granting General Reprizals against the Ships and Goods of the King of Spain and His Subjects.

### GEORGE R.

HEREAS, by Our Order in Council, dated the Ninth Day of New York the Ninth Day of November last, We have ordered, that General Reprizals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the King of Spain, fo that as well Our Fleet and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that be commissionated by Letters of Marque, or General Reprizals, or otherwise, by Our Commissioners for executing Our Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully feize all Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the King of Spain or His Subjects, or others inhabiting within any of the Territories of the King of Spain, and bring the fame to Judgment in any of Our Courts of Admiralty within Our Dominions: We, being defirous to give due Encouragement to all our faithful Subjects who may have lawfully feized any such Sisips, Vessels, or Goods, subsequent to the faid Ninth Day of November last, or who shall hereafter seize such Ships, Vessels, or Goods; and having declared in Council Our Intentions concerning the Distribution of all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes, and Reprizals, of all fuch Ships and Goods as aforefaid, which, subsequent to the said Ninth Day of November, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-fix, have been, or hereafter, during the present Hostilities, shall be seized as aforesaid do now make known to all Our loving Subjects, and all others whom it may concern, by this Our Pro-clamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, that Our Will and Pleasure is, that the Neat Produce of all Prizes taken as aforesaid, sub-fequent to the said Ninth Day of November last, or which shall hereafter be taken as aforesaid, the

Right whereof is inherent in Us, and Our Crown; be given to the Takers, (fave and except the Produce of fuch Prizes as are or shall be taken by Ships or Veffels belonging to Our Commissioners of Cuitoms or Excise, the Disposition of which We referve to our further Pleafure) but subject to the Payment of all fuch or the like Customs and Duties as the same are now, or would have been liable to, if the same were or might have been imported as Merchandize; and that the fame may be so given in the Proportion and Manner herein-after set forth; that is to say, that all Prizes taken by Ships and Vessels having Commissions of Letters of Marque and Reprizals, (fave and except such Prizes as are or shall be taken by the Ships or Vessels belonging to Our Commissioners aforesaid) may be sold and difposed of by the Merchants, Owners, Fitters, others, to whom such Letters of Marque and Reprizals are granted, for their own Use and Benefit, after final Adjudication, and not before: And We do hereby further order and direct, that the Neat Produce of all Prizes which are or shall be taken as aforefaid by any of Our Ships or Vessels of War, shall be for the entire Benefit and Encouragement of Our Flag Officers, Captains, Commanders, and other Commissioned Officers in Our Pay, and of the Seamen, Marines, and Soldiers, on Board Our faid Ships and Vessels, at the Time of the Capture; and that such Prizes may be lawfully fold and disposed of by them and their Agents, after the same shall have been to Us finally adjudged lawful Prize, and not otherwise. The Distribution shall be made as follows; the Whole of the Neat Produce being first divided into Eight equal Parts.

The Captain or Captains of any of Our faid Ships or Vessels of War, who shall be actually on Board at the taking of any Prize, shall have Three Eighth Parts; but in case any such Prize shall be taken by any of Our Ships or Vessels of War, under the Command of a Flag or Flags, the Flag Officer or Officers, being actually on Board, or directing and assisting in the Capture, shall have One of the said Three Eighth Parts; the said One Eighth Part to be paid to such Flag or Flag Officers in such Proportions, and subject to such Regulations, as are herein-after mentioned:

The Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants, and Master on Board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them: but that every Physician appointed, or hereafter to be appointed, to a Fleet or Squadron of Our Ships of War, shall, in the Distribution of Prizes which are or shall be taken as aforesaid, by the Ships in which he shall ferve, or in which such Ship's Company shall be entitled to share, be classed with the Sea Lieutenants, with respect to the faid One Eighth Part, and be allowed to share equally with them, provided fuch Physician be actually on Board at the Time of taking such

The Lieutenants and Quarter Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Enfigns, and Quarter Masters of Land Forces, Secretaries of Admirals or of Commodores, with Captains under them, Boatswains, Gunners, Purser, Carpenter, Master's Mates, Chirurgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain on Board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them:

The Midshipmen, Captain's Clerk, Master Sailmaker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Cockswain, Quarter Masters, Quarter Masters, Quarter Masters, Chirurgeon's Mates, Yeomen of the Powder Room, Serjeants of Marines, and Land Forces on Board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them:

The Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Stewards, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marines and other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty and affishing on Board, shall have Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them:

Provided, That if any Officer being on Board any of Our Ships of War, at the Time of taking any Prize, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, fuch Officer shall be intitled only to the Share or Shares of the Prizes which, according to the above-mentioned Distribution, shall belong to his Superior Commission or Office. And We do hereby strictly enjoin all Commanders of Our Ships and Vessels of War taking any Prize, as soon as may be, to transmit, or cause to be transmitted, to the Commissioners of Our Navy, a true List of the Names of all the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others, who were actually on Board Our Ships and Vessels of War under their Command at the Time of the Capture; which Lift shall contain the Quality of the Service of each Person on Board, and be subfcribed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, and Three or more of the Chief Officers on Board. And We do hereby require and direct the Commissioners of Our Navy, or any Three or more of them, to examine or cause to be examined, such Lists by the Muster Books of such Ships and Vessels of War, and Lists annexed thereto, to see that such Lists do agree with the faid Muster Books and annexed Lists, as to the Names, Qualities, or Ratings, of the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others belonging to fuch Ships and Vessels of War, and upon Request forthwith to grant a Certificate of the Truth of any List transmitted to them, to the Agents nominated and appointed by the Captors to take care and difpose of such Prize; and also upon Application to them (the said Commissioners) they shall give, or cause to be given, to the said Agents, all such Lists from the Muster Books of any such Ships of War, and annexed Lists, as the said Ageuts shall find requisite for their Direction in paying the Produce of fuch Prizes, and otherwise shall be aiding and affisting to the faid Agents in all fuch Matters as shall be We do hereby further will and direct, necessary. that the following Regulations shall be observed con-cerning the One Eighth Part herein-before mentioned to be granted to the Flag or Flag Officers, who shall actually be on Board at the taking of any Prize, or shall be directing or assisting therein: First, That a Flag Officer, Commander in Chief, when there is but One Flag Officer upon Service, shall have to his own Use the said One Eighth Part of the Prizes taken by Ships and Vessels under his Command: Secondly, That a Flag Officer, fent to command at Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken by Ships or Vessels employed there, before he arrives at the Place to which he is fent, and actualyl takes upon him the Command: Thirdly,

That when an inferior Flag Officer is fent out to reinforce a superior Flag Officer at Jamaica, or elsewhere, the superior Flag Officer shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken by the inferior Flag Officer before the inferior Flag Officer thall arrive within the Limits of the Command of the fuperior Flag Officer, and actually receive some Order from him: Fourthly, That a Chief Flag Officer returning Home from Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Share of the Prizes taken by the Ships or Veffels left behind to act under another Command: Fifthly, That if a Flag Officer is feat to command in the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, he shall have no Share of the Prizes taken by Ships or Vessels which have failed from that Port by Order from the Admiralty: Sixthly, That when more Flag Onicers than One serve together, the Eighth Part of the Prizes taken by any Ships or Vessels of the Fleet or Squadron; shall be divided in the following Proportions, viz. If there be but Two Flag Officers, the Chief shall have Two Third Parts of the faid One Eighth Part; and the other shall have the remaining Third Part; but if the Number of Flag Officers be more than Two, the Chief shall have only One Half; and the other Half shall be equally divided amongst the other Flag Officers: Seventhly, That Commodores, with Captains under them, shall be efteemed as Fiag Officers with respect to the Eighth Part of Prizes taken, whether commanding in Chief, or seving under Command: Eighthly, That the First Captain to the Admiral and Commander in Chief of Our Fleet, and also the First Captain to Our Flag Osticer appointed, or hereafter to be appointed, to command a Fleet or Squadron of Twenty Ships of the Line of Battle, and also the First Captain to Our Flag Officer appointed, or hereafter to be appointed, to command a Fleet or Squadron of Fifteen Ships of the Line of Battle (provided such last mentioned Fleet or Squadron shall be composed of His Majesty's own Ships,) shall be deemed and taken to be a Flag Officer, and shall be entitled to a Part or Share of Prizes as the junior Flag Officer of fuch Fleet or Squadron. And We do hereby further Order, That in case of Cutters, Schooners, and other armed Vesfels commanded by Lieutenants, the Share of such Lieutenants shall be Three Eighth Parts of the Prize, unless such Lieutenants shall be under the Command of a Flag Officer or Officers; in which Cafe the Flag Officer or Officers shall have One of the said Three Eighths, to be divided among such Flag Officer or Officers in the Manner herein before directed in the Case of Captains serving under Flag Officers: Secondly, We direct that the Share of the Master, or other Person acting as Second in Command, and the Pilot (if there happens to be One on Board) shall be One Eighth Part, to be divided into Three equal Parts, of which Two Thirds shall go to the Master or other Person acting as Second in Command, and the remaining One Third to the Pilot; but if there is no Pilot, then such Eighth Part to go wholly to the Master or Person acting as Second in Command: That the Share of the Chirurgeon or Chirurgeon's Mate (where there is no Chirurgeon) Midshipmen, and Clerk and Steward, shall be One Eighth; that the Share of the Boatswain's, Gunner's and Carpenter's Mates, Yeoman of the Sheets, Sailmaker, Quarter Master and Quarter Master's Mate, shall be One Eighth; and the Share of the Seamen, Marines, and other Persons on Board, assisting in the Capture, shall be Two Eighth Parts. But it is Our Intention, nevertheless, that the above Distribution shall only extend to fuch Captures as shall be made by any Cutter, Schooner or armed Vessel, without any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels of War being present or within Sight of, and adding to the Encouragement of the Captors, and Terror of the Enemy: But in case any of His Majetty's Ships or Vessels of War shall be present or in Sight, that then the Officers, Pilots, Petty Officers and Men on Board fuch Cutters and Schooners, or armed Veffels, shall share in the same Proportion as is allowed to Persons of the like Rank and Denomination on Board His Majesty's Ships and Vessels of War.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council affembled.

May it please your Majesty,
WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects,
the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council affembled, humbly beg Leave to approach the Throne with the fincerest Expressions of Gratitude to your Majesty, for the repeated Proofs of your Majesty's unceasing Solicitude for the general Interests and Prosperity of these Realms, and for your Majelly's anxious and constant Concern for the Safety and Happiness of your Subjects; and more especially to offer our unfeigned Thanks to your Majesty for your most gracious and benign Wish to restore the invaluable Blessings of Peace to this Country and her Allies, incontestibly proved by your Majesty's Endeavours to promote and establish a Negociation for that Purpose; whilst we express our deepest Regret that your Majesty's sincere Defire of effecting the Restoration of a general Peace, on Principles effential to the Interest of your Kingdoms and the permanent Tranquility of Europe, has been rendered ineffectual from the unreasonable Pretensions of the Enemy and the abrupt and haughty Dismissal of your Majesty's Ambassador, we eagerly encourage and cherish the And on Sunday consolatory Resection that every Means consistent out of Mourning.

with the Dignity and Honor of your Majesty's Crown and the Welfare of your Dominions have been exerted to terminate the Calamities of War. Your faithful Cittzens earnestly entreat your Majesty to place the firmest Reliance on the Zeal and Loyalty of this Corporation for every prompt and vigorous Support it's Resources may be capable of in prosecuting a just and unavoidable War, the Continuance of which can only be imputed to the inordinate Ambition and tyrannical Views of an Enemy who presumptuously aim at the general Overthrow of the Liberties of Europe, but more particularly meditate the Destruction of this Country; and the Subversion of it's Constitution.

Relying on Divine Providence for Protection, we still confidently hope that the Unanimity of a loyal and public-spirited People, added to the Efforts of the tried Ardour and Valour of your Majesty's Fleets and Armies, may, under the Guidance of your Majesty's vigilant and firm Councils, not only successfully oppose and render ruinous to themselves any rash Attempt, on the Part of the Enemy, to invade these Kingdoms, but also enable your Majesty to vindicate the Honor and affert the Rights of the British Empire, in the ultimate Establishment of Peace, upon just and reasonable Terms.
