The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, sit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor

under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Nayy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to ferve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raife Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged

and extended to the Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February to the Thirtieth Day of April next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

TATHEREAS by an Act passed in the Twentyeighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade " between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies " and Plantations in North America and in the " West India Islands, and the Countries belonging 44 to the United States of America, and between " His Majesty's faid Subjects and the Foreign Islands " in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be iffued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to impower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Scason only; provided always, that fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, fliall not be imported except in conformity to fuch Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the enfuing Season, with Bread, Flour, In-

dian Corn and Live Stock; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the enfuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn and Live Stock be imported into the faid Island from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of fuch Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer . provided that no fuch Licence as aforefaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-feven, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any"Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfound. land where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn and Live Stock, deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the fame to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted. Now be it known that the faid [Perfon's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the faid Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, the Produce of the faid United States, and no other Article whatfoever, and to carry the faid Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the faid Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the faid Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the faid Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

THE following Address has been presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Burgesses, Clergy, Merchants, Traders and Inhabitants of the City of Bristol, at the Guildhall of the said City assembled, beg Leave to approach your Majesty in the present important Criss, and to renew our Professions of unshaken Loyalty to your Royal Person, and steady Attachment to our invaluable Constitution. We entreat your Majesty to accept our grateful Acknowledgments for that paternal Regard for the Interests of your People, so often displayed by your Majesty, and particularly for that Instance of it recently manifested in your Majesty's sincere and earnest Eudeavours to restore to your Subjects the Blessings of

Peace. Satisfied as we are, and convinced as all Europe must be, that nothing has been wanting on the Part of your Majesty to bring to a happy Conclusion those Overtures for Peace which no mistaken Sense of Dignity, or Apprehension of Danger from the Opennels of such Conduct, has prevented your Majesty from submitting to the Consideration of a captious and arrogant Enemy; and lamenting, as we do, that Infatuation of their Rulers, which has led them, in Abandonment of their first and great Duty, the promoting the Happiness and Prosperity of their Country, to reject, under the most unjustifiable Pretensions, the Grounds of Negotiation to which they had themselves acceded, we feel ourselves called upon to stand forth in Defence of every Tning most dear to us, and to declare our Readiness to support your Majesty to the utmost of our Power in prosecuting the War with renewed Vigour, as the only Means now left for fecuring the Dignity and Independence of Great Britain and the general Tranquillity of Europe. With that Fortitude of Mind and determined Perseverance, which have ever formed Part of the national Character, we view with just Indignation the destructive Policy and presumptuous Hope entertained by the Enemy of reducing this Country to the same desperate Situation as themselves, by a Continuation of Expence and progressive Accumula-tion of the National Deht, We are fully sensible of the peculiar Nature of the Contest which we have to maintain, in which the Efforts of the Enemy are not directed merely against our territorial Possessions, but with more pointed Inveteracy against the Source of all our Prosperity, the Frame and Principles of our free Constitution. We know that this Attack is supported by the Propagation of Opinions as well as by the Force of Arms, and it is against each of these that we profess ourselves determined to oppose a firm and adequate Resistance. Not unapprized of the Sacrifices which may be required of us in the further Profecution of this awful Struggle, but supported under them by a thorough Conviction of the Importance of the Objects which are at Stake, and of the substantial Resources of the Country when called into Action by a just Sense of our Situation, we beg Leave to assure your Majetty that no Consideration of temporary Inconvenience which we may be called upon to share with the rest of our Fellow Subjects will deter us from offering to your Majesty fuch Support as may be deemed requisite for carrying on the War with the utmost Energy and Essect until the Enemy shall be disposed to treat with us on Principles of fair Accommodation, confiding with that perfect Assurance which we profess to repose in your Majesty's paternal Goodness that the Blessings of Peace will be restored to your faithful People as foon as it can be obtained upon just and honourable Terms, and established upon a Basis secure and permanent.

Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Onflow to Ewan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board His Mujesty's Ship Nassau, in Yarmouth Roads, February 17, 1797.

BE pleased to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Ship Espion is just arrived in these Roads; she separated from the Martin Sloop on the Night of the 14th Instant, in a heavy Gale of Wind; the latter has Charge of the Buonaparté, French Ship Privateer. I inclose, for their Lordships further Information, Captain Dixon's Letter.

Espion at Sea, February 16, 1797.

SIR, Have the Honour to inform you, that at Ten, A. M. on the 14th Instant, the Texel bearing S. E. distant Eighteen Leagues, Chace was given to a Ship under Danish Colours on the Weather Bow, which, after making every Effort to get away, was overpressed with Sail, and at Six P. M. brought to by the Espion and Martin. She proved to be Le Buonaparte French Privateer, mounting Sixteen Six-Pounders and One long Twelve-Pounder, with a Complement of One Hundred and Ten Men, but had only Eighty-two on Board; she sailed from Cherbourg on the 1st Instant, fince which she had cruized on the Coast of Scotland, and had only captured a Sloop in Ballast, which was liberated; Eight Six-Pounders were thrown overboard during the Pursuit; all the Day the Weather was extremely boisterous, and it was with infinite Difficulty and Hazard the Exchange of Prisoners was effected. One Boat belonging to the Espion was lost, but happily no Lives; and it is but Justice to the Officers and Seamen of both Ships to declare they performed the Service with manly Spirit and Determination; as during the Night it blew very hard at N. N. W. the Martin and Prize unavoidably separated from the Espion; Captain Sutton had been previously desired to stay by the Prize, and see her into Yarmouth.

The Privateer is quite new, fails remarkably fast, and is in every Respect well found as a Vessel of War.

I have also to acquaint you, for their Lordships further Information, that the Triton captured the French Privateer Cutter Recovery, of Fourteen-Guns and Forty-fix Men, on the 10th Instant, which had been a few Days from Havre, and had

taken an English Smuggler, and an American Ship bound to Bombay; the latter was retaken a few Hours afterwards by the Stag.
