THE following Address has been presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Burgesses, Clergy, Merchants, Traders and Inhabitants of the City of Bristol, at the Guildhall of the said City assembled, beg Leave to approach your Majesty in the present important Crisis, and to renew our Professions of unshaken Loyalty to your Royal Person, and steady Attachment to our invaluable Constitution. We entreat your Majesty to accept our grateful Acknowledgments for that paternal Regard for the Interests of your People, so often displayed by your Majesty, and particularly for that Instance of it recently manifested in your Majesty's sincere and earnest Endeavours to restore to your Subjects the Blessings of

Peace. Satisfied as we are, and convinced as all Europe must be, that nothing has been wanting on the Part of your Majesty to bring to a happy Conclusion those Overtures for Peace which no mistaken Sense of Dignity, or Apprehension of Danger from the Openness of such Conduct, has prevented your Majesty from submitting to the Consideration of a captious and arrogant Enemy; and lamenting, as we do, that Infatuation of their Rulers, which has led them, in Abandonment of their first and great Duty, the promoting the Happiness and Prosperity of their Country, to reject, under the most unjustifiable Pretensions, the Grounds of Negotiation to which they had themselves acceded, we feel ourselves called upon to stand forth in Defence of every Thing most dear to us, and to declare our Readiness to support your Majesty to the utmost of our Power in prosecuting the War with renewed Vigour, as the only Means now left for securing the Dignity and Independence of Great Britain and the general Tranquillity of Europe. With that Fortitude of Mind and determined Perseverance, which have never formed Part of the national Character, we view with just Indignation the destructive Policy and presumptuous Hope entertained by the Enemy of reducing this Country to the same desperate Situation as themselves, by a Continuation of Expence and progressive Accumulation of the National Debt. We are fully sensible of the peculiar Nature of the Contest which we have to maintain, in which the Efforts of the Enemy are not directed merely against our territorial Possessions, but with more pointed Inveteracy against the Source of all our Prosperity, the Frame and Principles of our free Constitution. We know that this Attack is supported by the Propagation of Opinions as well as by the Force of Arms, and it is against each of these that we profess ourselves determined to oppose a firm and adequate Resistance. Not unapprized of the Sacrifices which may be required of us in the further Prosecution of this awful Struggle, but supported under them by a thorough Conviction of the Importance of the Objects which are at Stake, and of the substantial Resources of the Country when called into Action by a just Sense of our Situation, we beg Leave to assure your Majesty that no Consideration of temporary Inconvenience which we may be called upon to share with the rest of our Fellow Subjects will deter us from offering to your Majesty such Support as may be deemed requisite for carrying on the War with the utmost Energy and Effect until the Enemy shall be disposed to treat with us on Principles of fair Accommodation, confiding with that perfect Assurance which we profess to repose in your Majesty's paternal Goodness that the Blessings of Peace will be restored to your faithful People as soon as it can be obtained upon just and honourable Terms, and established upon a Basis secure and permanent.
