Extract of a Letter from Admiral Lord Bridgort, K.B. to Mr. Nepean, dated Royal George at Sea, March 10, 1707.

Am now to acquaint you, for their Lordships Information, that on the 7th Instant Sir Harry Neale, in the St. Fiorenzo, recaptured the Cynthia Brig, from Lisbon to Poole, laden with Fruit, which had been taken Eight Days before by a Privateer Brig. On the 8th Instant the Impetueux captured La Vatout, a small Cutter Privateer, armed with Musquets, having Twenty-eight Men on Board, and only One Day from Brett. In the Asternoon of that Day, the Wind coming to the Northward, I bore up for Ushant, and detached the St. Fiorenzo and Nymphe to look into Brest; and I have the Satisfaction to inform their Lordships, that, on the St. Fiorenzo and Nymphe's returning to join the Squadron, they sell in with and captured La Resistance and La Constance, French Frigates. The taking these Ships does Sir Harry Neale, with Captain Cooke, and their Officers and Men, the highest Honor, and I hope their skilful and spirited Conduct will meet their Lordships Approbation, as I warmly feel they have merited my particular Thanks. Herewith you will also receive a Copy of Sir Harry Neale's Letter to me on this Occasion.

St. Fiorenzo, at Sea, March 9, 1797.

My Lord,

I Have the Satisfaction to acquaint you, that after having, (agreeable to your Direction) with the Affistance of Captain Cooke, of His Majesty's Ship La Nymphe, under my Orders, reconnoitered the Enemy's Force in the outer Road of Brest Harbour, Captain Cooke informed me he saw Two Ships to the Westward, standing in for Brest; in consequence of which we tacked, and made Sail, close on a Wind, for the Purpose of gaining the Weather Gage, which being with Ease accomplished, we bore down upon

the Ships together, having ascertained them to be Two French Frigates; and as we were not more than Two or Three Leagues from Point St. Matthew's, with a leading Wind out of Brest, and the French Fleet in Sight from our Tops, it was an Object of great Importance to be as decisive as possible in our Mode of Attack. As the largest Ship was the headmost, we both engaged her very warmly, at the Distance of about Forty Yards, and compelled her to surrender, after a short Resistance. By this Time the smaller Frigate had arrived up, and being immediately astacked by both Ships in the same Manner as the former, her Resistance, though better made, was not long: She struck her Colours about Nine o'Clock A. M. The whole of the Action was a running Fight, and did not last more than Half an Hour.

I have great Pleasure in expressing to your Lordship that I feel particularly obliged to my Friend Captain Cooke, for his judicious and active Conduct during the Time we jointly engaged the Enemy. I have long known his Abilities and Zeal for the Service, and am happy to have this Opportunity of tessifying it both as an Act grateful to myself, and as a Duty I owe to His Majesty's Service.

I should be wanting in Gratitude to all my Officers and Ship's Company, if I did not acknowledge myself much indebted to them for their steady Zeal, and the Assistance I received from them during the Action. Lieutenants Durell, Farnall and Renwick, Mr. Kitcatt the Master, and Lieutenant Caruthers, the Officer of Marines, are particularly entitled to my Thanks for their Activity at their different Stations. Mr. Durell, my First Lieutenant, who has been an Officer Eighteen Years, merits my warmest Recommendation. And it is with equal Pleasure I express myself obliged to the Officers and Ship's Company of La Nymphe; Captain Cooke speaks of the Assistance he received from them in Terms highly to their Honor, and in particular of Lieutenants Irvine, Lawrence, and Massers, and Mr. Dyer, the

Master, and Lieutenant Campbell, the Marine Officer: In mentioning them to your Lordship I comply with their Captain's Wish. I beg your Lordship will mention Lieutenant Durell and Lieutenant Irvine to my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty as Officers deferving of the highest Commendation.

The Ships taken are La Refiftance, commanded by Monfieur Montagne, mounting 48 Guns, Eighteen Pounders on her Main Deck, and marined with 345 Men. She is only Six Months old, built upon a new Construction, and is in every Respect one of the finest Frigates the French had, and certainly the largest, measuring 45 Feet Beam. The other Frigate La Constance, commanded by Monsieur Desauncy, mounting 24 Nine-Pounders upon the Main Deck, and manned with 189 Men: She is Two Years old, and a very fine Ship. These are Two of the Frigates which landed Troops in Wales: It is a pleasing Circumstance to have completed the Failure of that Expedition. I am particularly happy to inform your Lordship that neither the St. Fiorenzo or La Nymphe have had any Men killed or wounded, or the Ships hurt. The St. Fio-renzo only having received Two Shot in her Hull. La Resistance had Ten Men killed, the First Lieutenant and Eight Men wounded. La Constance had Eight Men killed and Six wounded,

Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral King Smill Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Veffels at Gork, to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated on Board His Majesty's Ship Polyphomus in Cork Harbour, the 10th of March, 1797.

PLEASE to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that His Majesty's Ship Acimene arrived here last Evening from Lough Swilly by the Westward, and in her Way has captured a French Privateer Ship of Sixteen Guns and 156 Men, off the Skelligs, as will be further explained in the accompanying Letter from Captain Brown.

Alemene, Cork Cove, March 9, 1797.

SIR, BE pleased to communicate to the Lords Commis-D figners of the Admiralty, that being off the Skelligs Rocks on the 6th of March, making the best of my Way to Cork, I saw a Ship standing for the S. W. which I immediately purfued, and, after a Seventeen Hours Chace, captured her; she proves to be the Surveillant Privateer of Sixteen Guns and 156 Men; had been out Thirty-two Days from Bourdeaux, had taken Two Brigs, the one from Lisbon and the other from Liverpool; the latter of which (loaded with Coals) I had the good Fortune to recapture, and have allowed her Mailer to proceed to his original Destination.

#### Whitehall, March 18. ...

As several Artificers and Manufadurers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second and of His present Mujesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incat by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artistters or Manufacturers themfelves.

#### Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Atificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Informa-tion in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Per-fon having been once convicted shall offend again he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Maesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercifing any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase, and shall sorfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty'a Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His

Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace; that any Person is endeavour-ing to seduce any such Artisteer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforc-said, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before, some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath. of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Sef-fions: And, if such Person shall result to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Courte of Law, And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majetty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artiscer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forseit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impriforment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or feduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and thall fuffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

\* If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manusactures or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c.

Ihall be allowed. It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majeity's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize

and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Ossence, forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inslicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also sorfeit his i

Employment, and be incapable of any Employ-

ment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Custom's in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forseitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the

Statutes 14, 21, 25 and 26 of His present
Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel or 100 Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines of Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any fuch Articles, with an Intent to export the fame to Foreign Parts, and all Custom house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above mentioned, in the Cafe of Tools and Utenfils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
