oully planted to receive him ; and afterwards with Mortar Pieces and Granado's, that falling into some disorder, the Garrison at the same time making a stout Sally upon them, forced them to quit the place with a confiderable iols of men, and to fave themselves by flight; the Visier himself, with one Troop of Ho.se onely in his company, recovering Can dia Nova. In this Days Service, the Visier amongst other confilerabde Persons and Officers, lost one of his Naphews, slain by a Cannon-shot from the Walls. Upon the great loss of men received by him in this and several other Sallies, which were alwayes made with great disadvantages to the Turks, the Visier has resolved to retire himself for some time to Canea, and to expect there the Saccers promised him by the G. and Seignior : It the mean time; the Garrison hath made such good use of their success, that they have thrown down all the Works cast up by the Turks for the straining of the Town, and have leveled their Trenchas; which will cost them many weeks pains to make good, if their Defign continues.

From Constantinople we are informed, that they are there con inuing their Preparations for the War, deligning 20000 Turks for the succor of the Visier; who for their Transporration, are to be attended by 20 Ships from Confluxtinople, 20 from Afia, and 20 more from Africh, with whom are to be fent over all forts of Provisions of Victuals as well as Ammunition, of which the Turks in that Island are in much want 3 and by reason thereof, their Army grown very weak

and fickly.

Five Vessels from Barbary, cruising about Sapienza, have been by force of Storms and contrary Winds, driven a-

shore and cast away.

Rome, March 7. His Holineis is again faln so very ill, that he was scarcely able to compleat the Ceremony of the late promotion of Cardinals; fince which, his voice begins to fail him, which makes us generally dispair of his reco-

Hamburgh, March 14: Some persons arrived here from Ertfort inform us, that his Electoral Highnels of Menty was there expected; and 'twas discoursed there, that he intended to lend some Troops of Horle and Companies of Foot into the Town; and the Baron de Reiffenburg Rill continues close prisoner at Wurtsburg.

The intention of the Swedes forces is not yet known, but feveral Soldiers come cally to them out of Pomerania. Some Deputies are expected at Stradt from the City of Bremen, their butinels not known.

From Copenhagen we are informed, that his Majesty of Denmark continues his care for the speedy putting out his Fleet to S:23 and that Count Paulus de la Guarde, with a great company of the Nobility, a train of at the least 50 persons, is arrived at Elsenburg expecting there the arrival of the Quien Chriftina, and to attend her into swedeland, where her lodgings are appointed in the Castle, where she

formerly lived before the religned her Crown.

Part, March 23. The 21 instant, in the afternoon the Cardinal de Retz left this City, and went post by Chariot for Lyons, intending from thence to pals by Boat for Provence, and (if the Cardinals Grimaldi and de Vendofm be not already gone) will embarque with them for Rome. His Majesty has presented him with 24000 Growns for the arrears of his Pension, and to detray the expences of his voy-

On Friday last, the Spanish Ambassador had his last audience from his Majesty, and took his leave, the King being plealed in very obliging language, to express the great affection and efteem he has for his person; desiring him, to assure her Msjesty of spain of his Friendship, by which, he refolved religiously to preserve the peace between those two Crowns. The Ambassador went afterwards to take his leave of her Majesty, where he was received with the usual Cere-

His Majerty has lately bought the estate of Vaujour in Anjou, of the Count de Sanserres Creditors, for the sum of 820000 Livres; to which, he intends to adde some other Lands, and of all jogether, to erect a new Dutchy. He in-

tends very fuddenly to come to the Parliment, in order to this new Erection, as also to take some 'order for his Domains; and at the same time, to receive there the Count de Fueillade in quality of Dake of Roannois, and Peer of France.

His Majesty (as cis said) has commanded home Monsieut, de Schomberg from Portugal, the Marque's d'Haluin being ordered to command in his absence : 'Tis believed, his Majesty will at his arrivals confer on him the dignity of Marcthat of France.

This Court is a little surprized at the resurn of all those French that attended the Queen of Portugal to Lisbonne, the Queen onely remaining her Physician, her Nurse, and one of the Ladies of her Chamber.

The Count de la Trinite is here arrived Ambassador from the Duke of Savoy!

Monsieur de Louvoy, who takes the eare of the Attillety, has already bought 1600 Horses to attend the Train, besides a considerable number he has ordered to be bought in Germany for the same service. His Majesty has ordered all his Magazins to be stored with Corn for three years, and that Provisions be sent into all the Frontier Towns, to lerve them two years; and has moreover lent 120 pieces of Cannon into Abbeville and Amiens.

He has also made this alteration in Religious Houses, That no person be for the suttre admitted into any of them, without his Majekies Letters Patents for their admittance. Ordering likewise, that all Nunnerics established since the year 1635. that prefum: to admit any persons without his Letters Patents, shall be immediately supplessed, and the Religious persons in them sent home to their nearest relations, except onely such as have a sufficient portion, to enter themselves in some other Convent.

Hague, March 24.

From Antwerp we are affured that all places of any confideration under the Spanish Jurisdiction, are taken care of and fortified, and such flore of Military Provisions, with good Garrilons put into them, that will be able to defend them from any sudden attempt; and that in the Castle of the City they are making great quantities of Powder, for the necellery

The Ginivezer, a States Man of War, is lately cast and formula to get way upon Pampus, but the men had the good fortune to get fafe to land. A Bark was also cast away near the Texel at with a confiderable number of Pailengers. Another Veffel going out for Swedeland, ran on ground upon the Isle of Hre in the South Sea, with confiderable damage, and with much diffi-

culty escaped a Wreck.

Plymouth, March 17. Yesterday arrived here Captain Urbert with his Squadron, bringing with him four prixes; whereof two Dutch, the other two French, all ofthemla-den with Salt, Wines, and Brandy. They have also taken four thers which were separated from them by storm, and have not yet recovered their Harbour, but are daily expected. Here are also arrived a Fleet of Colliers from Wales.

West-Comes, March 18. On Saturday Night last arrived here a small Billander belonging to Gaunt, called the Fortune, laden homewards from Mantes with Wine and Brandy ; from whence he came out with leven Bretagners laden with Salt for the Grand Partie, coming out of Conquest Road, a French Buls, a Privateer of eight Guns of St. Milo's plundered him and his Company of a confiderable quantity of Merchants Goods, and told him he intended to cruife in St. Georges Channel. He speaks likewise of above seventy Men of War and Fire-ships, that are fitting up at Press with all the expedicion imaginable, and that they are pressing both Land-men and Sea-men, to send aboard

Dover, March 18. This day was sent in here by Captain John Holmes in the Lenox, now call'd the Dover-Castle, & Dutch Pink of an hundred Tuns, a fine Vellel, newly walk and tallowed, with four Guns, bound from Holland to the French Fleet, laden with Cables.
