BOARD OF GREEN CLOTH, St. James's, May 15, 1797. By His MAJESTY's Command,

Ordered,

THAT no Coaches (those of the Royal Family. excepted) be admitted into any of the Courts of His Majesty's Palace at St. James's on the Day of the Nuptials of Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, Lady of the Imperial Order of Russia of St. Catherine, with His Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Wirtemberg, or on the Day of the Draw-

ing-Room enfuing.

And that all Chairs do come in at the Gate in Cleveland-Row, from whence they are to proceed through the Green Cloth Court to the Bar at the Passage leading to the Great Court, where they are to fet down, and return through the Piazza under the Ball Room into the other Courts, where they are to attend, being placed in Order.

The Footmen attending Chairs are to wait in the Green Cloth Court, ranging themselves on each Side the Broad Pavement, so as to leave Room for

the Chairs to pass,

His Majesty's Serjeant Porter, Yeoman and Groom Porters, and Marshal-Men are strictly required to put these Orders in Execution, and to take into their Custody all Persons who shall offend against the same, or behave in an indecent or riotous Manner. Such Offenders will be proceeded against in the

most exemplary Manner.

It is farther ordered, that the Serjeant Porter, Yeomen and Groom Porters and Marshal-Men do shut all the Gates and Avenues to the Palace, upon the first Notice that the Procession is coming from the Apartments to the Chapel, and that they take particular Care that no Servants come within any of

the Great Council Chamber, will be opened for the Admission of Company coming in Chairs to the Drawing Room,

N. B. All Coaches are to come up to the Great Gate, with the Horses Heads towards Cleveland-Row. No Coaches will be permitted to go into Cleveland-Row after having fet down.

I Have the Honor to acquaint you of the Capture of Le Trompeuse French Schooner Privateer, (of Morlaix) of Six Guns and Forty Men, out Five Days, and had only taken Two Prussian Vessels belonging to Embden; one bound to Liverpool, the other to Oporto. The Spitfire was present Sunday last at the Recapture of a Brig by the Unité.
