A PROCLAMATION,  
*For the Suppression of the Mutinous and Treasonable  
Proceedings of the Crews of Our Ships at the Nore.*

WHEREAS, upon the Representation of Our Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty respecting the Proceedings of the Seamen and Marines on Board certain of Our Ships at the Nore; We were pleased to command Our said Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty to signify to the said Seamen and Marines Our gracious Intentions, expressed in Our Royal Declaration, under Our Sign Manual, bearing Date at St. James's, the Twenty-seventh Day of May instant, in the Words following: "Whereas it has been represented unto Us, that, notwithstanding the Declarations made in Our Name, and by Our Authority, by Our Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty, of Our gracious Intentions to recommend to the Consideration of Parliament, to augment the Wages and Allowances of the Seamen and Marines of Our Fleet, which Our gracious Intentions and Declarations have since been carried into Effect by an Act of Parliament; and, notwithstanding the Communication made by Our Right Trusty and Right Well-beloved Cousin and Councillor Richard Earl Howe, Admiral of Our Fleet, of Our gracious Intentions towards the Seamen and Marines of Our Fleet, for the Pardon of the Offences by them committed, and Our Royal Proclamation thereupon, bearing Date the Eleventh Day of May instant; and notwithstanding the Sentiments of Duty and Gratitude with which the same were received by the Seamen and Marines of Our other Squadrons, yet the Crews on Board certain of Our Ships at the Nore have not only since the

tentions and Declarations been guilty of divers Acts of Mutiny and Disobedience of Orders, but have even proceeded to other Acts of the most heinous and treasonable Nature, by firing upon some of Our Ships in order to compel them to submit to their Direction; have threatened and taken Measures for stopping the Commerce of the Kingdom passing to and from the Port of London, and have, by Terror of their Force, compelled Two Frigates to desist from executing a particular Service, which by Our Orders they were directed to perform: We, thinking it right to warn all Our Seamen and Marines on Board the said Ships of the heinous Nature of the Offences by them committed, and of the dangerous Consequences thereof to the Spirit and Discipline of the British Navy, and to the Welfare of their Country, as well as their own Safety, do hereby earnestly require and enjoin all Our said Seamen and Marines, immediately on the Notification of this Our Royal Declaration, to return to the regular Discharge of their Duty, as has already been done by the Crews of Our other Squadrons and Fleets, stationed at Portsmouth and Plymouth, and elsewhere: And whereas We are well assured that a great Part of the Seamen and Marines on Board the said Ships at the Nore abhor and detest the Criminal Proceedings which are still persisted in on Board the said Ships, and are desirous to return to their Duty: Now, We being desirous to extend Our Gracious Intentions of Pardon to all such Seamen and Marines so serving on Board Our said Ships at the Nore, who may have returned, or shall return, upon the Notification of this Our Royal Declaration, to the regular and ordinary Discharge of their Duty, have authorized, and do hereby authorize and empower Our said Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty, or any Three of them, to signify to all such Seamen and Marines, who may have been guilty of any of the

“ the treasonable Acts aforesaid, or of any Mutiny  
 “ or Disobedience of Orders or Neglect of Duty,  
 “ and who have returned, or who shall, upon  
 “ Notification hereof on Board their respective  
 “ Ships, return to the regular and ordinary Dis-  
 “ charge of their Duty, Our Royal Intentions to  
 “ grant to all such Seamen and Marines Our most  
 “ Gracious Pardon, and to promise, in Our Name,  
 “ to all such Seamen and Marines, who have so  
 “ returned, or shall so return to the regular and  
 “ ordinary Discharge of their Duty, Our most  
 “ gracious Pardon accordingly: And We do hereby  
 “ declare, that all such Seamen and Marines, who  
 “ shall have so returned, or shall so return to their  
 “ Duty, and to whom the said Lords Commissioners  
 “ of Our Admiralty, or any Three of them, shall  
 “ so promise Our Pardon, shall receive the same  
 “ accordingly, and shall be discharged and released  
 “ from all Prosecutions, Imprisonments and Penalties  
 “ incurred by reason of any of the Acts aforesaid,  
 “ or by reason of any Act of Mutiny or Disobedience  
 “ of Orders, or any Breach or Neglect of Duty  
 “ previously committed by them or any of them;  
 “ hereby declaring at the same Time, that all such  
 “ Seamen and Marines who shall not take the  
 “ Benefit of this Our gracious Pardon, shall from  
 “ henceforth be considered as liable, according to the  
 “ Nature of their Offences, to such Punishment as the  
 “ Articles of War and the Law have provided for the  
 “ same.” And whereas Our Right Trusty and Right  
 “ Well-beloved Cousin and Councillor, George John  
 “ Earl Spencer, Our Trusty and Well-beloved Charles  
 “ George Lord Arden of Our Kingdom of Ireland,  
 “ and William Young, Esquire, Rear-Admiral of the  
 “ White, being Three of the Lords Commissioners of  
 “ Our Admiralty, did cause Our gracious Intentions  
 “ expressed in such Our Declaration, to be signified to  
 “ the Crews of Our Ships at the Nore, and did require  
 “ such Crews to return to their due Obedience accord-  
 “ ingly: And whereas it has been represented to Us,  
 “ that some of the Crews of Our said Ships have been  
 “ desirous of returning to their Obedience accordingly,  
 “ but have been prevented from so doing by Violence;  
 “ and others of Our Ships, in the actual Discharge of  
 “ their Duty, have been fired upon, and Attempts  
 “ have been made to prevent some of Our Ships from  
 “ proceeding according to the Orders of their Com-  
 “ manders: And whereas such continued Perseverance  
 “ in rebellious and treasonable Attempts against Our  
 “ Crown and Dignity, after repeated Admonitions  
 “ and offers of Our gracious Pardon, render it necessary  
 “ for us to call on all Our loving Subjects to be  
 “ aiding and assisting in repressing the same; We have  
 “ thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council,  
 “ to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do  
 “ hereby strictly enjoin and command all Our Admi-  
 “ rals, Generals, Commanders and Officers of Our  
 “ Forces by Sea and Land, and all Magistrates what-  
 “ soever, and all others Our loving Subjects, that they,  
 “ in their several Stations, do use their utmost Endeav-  
 “ ours, according to Law, to suppress all such muti-  
 “ nous and treasonable Proceedings, and to use all law-  
 “ ful Means to bring the Persons concerned therein,  
 “ their Aiders and Abettors, to Justice: And We do  
 “ hereby strictly enjoin and command all Our loving  
 “ Subjects whatsoever not to give any Aid, Comfort,  
 “ Assistance or Encouragement whatsoever to any Per-  
 “ son or Persons concerned in any such mutinous and  
 “ treasonable Proceedings, as they will answer the

same at their Peril; and also, to the utmost of their  
 Power and according to Law, to prevent all other  
 Persons from giving any such Aid, Assistance, Com-  
 fort or Encouragement.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirty-  
 first Day of May, One thousand seven hundred  
 and ninety-seven, and in the Thirty-seventh  
 Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W H E R E A S by an Act made in the Twenty-  
 third Year of the Reign of His present  
 Majesty, intituled, “ An Act for preventing certain  
 “ Instruments from being required from Ships  
 “ belonging to the United States of America;  
 “ and to give to His Majesty, for a limited  
 “ Time, certain Powers for the better carrying  
 “ on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects  
 “ of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants  
 “ of the said United States;” which said Act has  
 “ been continued by several subsequent Acts until the  
 “ 5th Day of April, 1797. And whereas by an  
 “ Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His present  
 “ Majesty's Reign, intituled, “ An Act to extend the  
 “ Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year  
 “ of the Reign of His present Majesty, for giving  
 “ His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying  
 “ on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of  
 “ His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants  
 “ of the United States of America, to the Trade  
 “ and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British  
 “ Colonies and Plantations in America, with re-  
 “ spect to certain Articles therein mentioned,”  
 “ the Powers given by the said recited Act were ex-  
 “ tended to the Trade and Intercourse between this  
 “ Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations  
 “ in America, so far as the same might relate to  
 “ Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of  
 “ the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic,  
 “ which might be exported from this Kingdom;  
 “ which last mentioned Act has also by several sub-  
 “ sequent Acts been continued until the said 5th Day  
 “ of April, 1797.

And whereas by another Act passed in this present  
 Session of Parliament, intituled, “ An Act to continue  
 “ the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade be-  
 “ tween the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions  
 “ and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging  
 “ to the United States of America, so far as the  
 “ same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried  
 “ on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants  
 “ of the Countries belonging to the said United  
 “ States,” it is declared to be expedient, that the  
 “ said Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present  
 “ Majesty's Reign, so far only as the same extends to  
 “ the Trade and Commerce carried on between this  
 “ Kingdom and the People and Territories belong-  
 “ ing to the United States of America, and also that  
 “ the said Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His present  
 “ Majesty's Reign, should be further continued and be  
 “ in Force; and it is thereby enacted, that the said Acts  
 “ shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of  
 “ April, 1798.

His

His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, until further Order, any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law (except Tobacco, for which Provision is herein after made, and except Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermacei) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rosin, Pot Ash, Pearl Ash, Indico, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, or in Ships taken by any of the Ships or Vessels of War belonging to the Government, or any of the Inhabitants of the said United States, and condemned as lawful Prize in any Court of Admiralty of the said United States (of which Condemnation due Proof shall be given) and owned by the Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Three-fourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of such Duties as the like Sorts of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law.

And it is, in like Manner, further ordered, that all other Goods and Merchandize, not herein before enumerated or described, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Snuff, for which Provision is herein after made) and also Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermacei, being the Growth, Production or Manufacture of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may be imported from thence into this Kingdom in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of such Duties of Customs and Excise as are payable on the like Goods and Merchandize upon their Importation into this Kingdom from Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, according to the Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to an Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for repealing the several Duties of Customs and Excise, and granting other Duties in Lieu thereof, and for applying the said Duties together with the other Duties composing the Public Revenue; for permitting the Importation of certain Goods, Wares and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture of the European Dominions of the French King, into this Kingdom; and for applying certain unclaimed Monies remaining in the Exchequer, for the Payment of Annuities on Lives, to the Reduction of the National Debt;" or by any other Law's in Force passed subsequent to the said Act, touching the Duties contained in the said Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F.; and in Cafes

where different Duties are imposed upon the like Goods imported from different Countries not under the Dominion of His Majesty, then that such Goods shall be imported upon the lowest Duties which by the said Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. are required to be paid on the Importation of any such Goods from any European Country not under the Dominion of His Majesty.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that, until further Order, all such Goods and Merchandize shall be intitled to the same Drawbacks as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandize when exported from this Kingdom, according to the said Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to the before mentioned Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, or according to any other Law in Force, passed subsequent to the said Act, touching Drawbacks. And it is hereby, in like Manner, further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks and Bounties on Goods and Merchandize exported from this Kingdom to the Territories of the said United States, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America. And it is hereby, in like Manner, further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks upon the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from this Kingdom into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron to other Foreign Parts; and all such Drawbacks and Bounties respectively shall be allowed and paid in the same Manner, and under the same Rules, Regulations, Restrictions and Forfeitures, in all Respects, as such Drawbacks and Bounties are allowed and paid, or are subject and liable to by Law; provided always, and His Majesty is further pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the Importation of Rice and other Articles, without Payment of any Duty whatever, by virtue of an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue, for a limited Time, and amend an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to prohibit the Exportation of Corn, Meal, Flour and Potatoes, and to permit the Importation of Corn and other Articles of Provision, for a limited Time, in any Ships whatever, without Payment of Duty, and for permitting Wheat, Wheat Flour and Meal, imported in order to obtain the Bounties granted by an Act of the last Session of Parliament, but which have not been found fit for making Bread, to be used in the Manufacture of Starch, Hair-Powder and Blue, or in the Distillation of Low Wines and Spirits, and in the Manner in the said Act mentioned."

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that, until further Order, any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may be imported in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of the same Duties as Tobacco, imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation, is or may hereafter be

be subject to; and that any Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of any of the said Territories, may be imported in Manner before mentioned, upon Payment of such Duties as Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of Europe, imported from Europe, is or hereafter may be subject to, and may be warehoused and again exported; subject respectively nevertheless to all and singular the Regulations of an Act made and passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof:" And another Act passed in the Thirtieth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof:" And also another Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to prevent other Ships than those laden with Tobacco from mooring and discharging their Lading at the Places appointed by an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof; to prohibit the Exportation of damaged or mean Tobacco; and for permitting the Importation of Tobacco and Snuff into the Port of Newcastle upon Tyne."

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That in case and as often as Rice shall not be allowed, by the said Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, to be imported without Payment of any Duty, any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America; which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight-pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinafter excepted) under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall be so landed: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Pool, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty to enter and land the same without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Case such Rice shall be warehoused, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors, in such Warehouse or Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called England, and any Three or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; every Expence attending which Warehousing shall be borne by the said Proprietors: And that such Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, at all reasonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to such Warehouses, in the Presence

of some proper Officer of the Customs, for the Purpose of Screening and shifting the Rice, to prevent it's receiving Damage. And that if any Rice, which shall be so imported from the Territories of the said United States into any of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforesaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors as aforesaid, for Home Consumption, the full Duties, due and payable by Law upon the Importation of such Rice into this Kingdom for Home Consumption, shall, previously to it's being taken out of such Warehouses, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Ports where such Rice shall be so warehoused; but that such Proprietor, if he intends to export such Rice, shall have Liberty to export the same from such Warehouses respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever: Provided that the Exportation of any such Rice, hereafter to be warehoused, be made within the said Space of Eighteen Months; and if not within that Period, that the full Duties, payable by Law upon the Importation of such Rice, be paid for the same, and not be afterwards drawn back: And that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond, in Manner aforesaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been so secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the said Duties thereon shall be discharged and cancelled by Debenture or Debeatures, made out and passed in the usual Manner, for the Quantity or Quantities of Rice duly exported. And if any Rice imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and warehoused in Manner aforesaid, shall be taken out of any such Warehouse for Home Consumption, the Remainder of the Duties, due and payable by Law, shall, previously to it's being taken out of such Warehouse, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Port where such Rice shall be so warehoused; and that such Payment shall be made, and the Warehouse cleared for such Rice hereafter to be warehoused, within the said Space of Eighteen Months, otherwise the same shall and may be sold for the Duties, in like Manner, and under the same Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, as any other Goods are now directed by Law to be sold for the Duties.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

*Extract of a Letter from Admiral Sir Peter Parker, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Portsmouth, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board His Majesty's Ship Royal William, at Spithead, June 4, 1797.*

THE St. Fiorenzo arrived this Morning from the Nore, and has brought in L'Unité French Lugger Privateer, carrying Fourteen Guns and Fifty-eight Men. Inclosed is a Letter from Sir Harry Neale, giving an Account of the Capture of the said Privateer.

*St. Fiorenzo, Spithead, June 4, 1797.*

S I R,

I Am to beg you will be pleased to acquaint my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that I Yesterday Morning, off the Owers, captured L'Unité French Lugger Privateer, commanded by Citizen Charles Roberts, carrying Fourteen Guns, and manned with Fifty-eight Men. She had been out from Morlaix Three Days, and had not captured any Thing.

A DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, has been received by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Sir Ralph Abercromby, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces in the West Indies.

*His Majesty's Ship Prince of Wales,  
off Porto Rico, May 2, 1797.*

S I R,

AFTER the Reduction of Trinidad, the Force destined for the Expedition against Porto Rico being assembled, on the 8th of April the Fleet sailed from Martinico and arrived at St. Kitt's on the 10th, where we waited the Arrival of Captain Woolley of His Majesty's Ship Arethusa, who had been sent to Tortola and St. Thomas to procure Pilots and Guides. This occasioned the Delay of a few Days.

On Monday the 17th we made the Island of Porto Rico, and came to an Anchor off Congrejos Point. The Whole of the North Side of this Island is bounded by a Reef, and it was with much Difficulty that a narrow Channel was discovered, about Three Leagues to the Eastward of the Town, through which His Majesty's Sloops the Beaver and Fury, with the lighter Vessels, passed into a small Bay, in which the Troops, on the next Morning, were disembarked with little Opposition from about a Hundred of the Enemy, who were concealed in the Bushes at the Landing Place. In the Afternoon of the same Day the Troops advanced, and took a Position very favourable for our Numbers, with our Right to the Sea, and the Left to a Lagoon, which extends far into the Country. The Artillery was brought up without Loss of Time, and every Preparation made to force a Passage into the Island on which the Town of Porto Rico is situated. It is necessary here to observe, that as the Moró Castle completely commands the Passage into the Harbour, the Enemy kept open their Communication with the Southern and Western Part of the Island, and even teased and harassed our Left Flank with their numerous Gun-Boats. The only Point, therefore, on which we could attack the Town was on the Eastern Side, where it is defended by the Castle and Lines of St. Christopher, to approach which it was necessary to force our Way over the Lagoon, which forms this Side of the Island. This Passage was strongly defended by Two Redoubts and Gun-Boats, and the Enemy had destroyed the Bridge which connects in the narrowest Channel the Island with the Main Land. After every Effort on our Part, we never could sufficiently silence the Fire of the Enemy, (who had likewise entrenched themselves in the Rear of these Redoubts,) to hazard forcing the Passage into the Island with so small a Force; and this indeed would have been in vain, as the Enemy could support a Fire ten Times more powerful than we could have brought against them. The only Thing left was to endeavour to bombard the Town from a Point to the Southward of it, near to a large Magazine abandoned by the Enemy. This was tried for several Days without any great Effect on Account of the Distance.

It appearing, therefore, that no Act of Vigour on our Part, nor that any combined Operation between the Sea and Land Service, could in any Manner avail, I determined to withdraw, and to re-embark the Troops, which was done on the Night of the 30th of April, with the greatest Order and Regularity.

All our Artillery and Stores were brought off, except Seven Iron Guns, Four Iron Mortars, and Two Brass Howitzers, which were rendered unserviceable, it being impossible to remove them. Not a sick or wounded Soldier was left behind, and nothing of any Value fell into the Hands of the Enemy.

During the Whole of our Operations, I have experienced from Admiral Harvey the most cordial Co-operation, and every Act of personal Kindness. At my Request he landed Three Hundred Seamen, under Captains Toddy and Browne, of the Royal Navy, to whose Exertions while on Shore we are under the greatest Obligations. From the Arrangements of the Admiral, the Landing and Re-embarkation of the Troops were conducted in the best Order. To Captain Renou, of the Royal Navy, principal Agent of the Transports, I desire to express the Sense I have of his good Conduct upon all Occasions.

I beg Leave to assure you, that the Behaviour of the Troops has been meritorious; they were patient under Labour, regular and orderly in their Conduct, and spirited when an Opportunity to shew it occurred. All the Departments of the Army exerted themselves to my Satisfaction. A Return of our Killed and Wounded accompanies this Dispatch.

*Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir-Hyde Parker, Knt. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board His Majesty's Ship Queen, at Cape Nichola Mole, April 27, 1797.*

HAVING on the 16th Instant received Information from Captain Bissett, of His Majesty's Ship Janus, that he had chased into Maregot the French Frigate Harmonie the Evening before, and being myself obliged, for Want of Provisions, to return to this Port with the Queen, Thunderer, and Valiant, I directed Captain Ogilvy to make Sail in the Evening, and lay off the Bay of Maregot all Night; and, on not discovering the French Frigate there in the Morning, he was directed to proceed close along Shore between the Islands of Tortuga and Port au Paix; the Queen and Valiant keeping without Tortuga. On opening the Thunderer to the Westward of Tortuga, Captain Ogilvy made the Signal for an Enemy in the S. E. and, on his coming within Hail, had the Satisfaction to find he had chased the Frigate into Mottique Bay; and it was his Opinion she might be destroyed, which I instantly gave him Orders to use his utmost Endeavours to execute, and directed the Valiant to assist. The Sequel their Lordships will best understand by a Copy of Captain Ogilvy's Report, (No. 1.) Although there was no Proportion as to Force, yet the Consequences will be attended, I trust, with the greatest Advantages to His Majesty's Service, as from the very great Scarcity of Provisions at Cape François, the French Deputies had forced, contrary to the Opinion of the Captain and Officers, this Frigate to go out, in order to convoy a Number of American Vessels, loaded with Provisions, that had been captured by their Privateers, and carried into the Port of Port au Paix and Jean Rabel up to Cape François.

In the Road of Jean Rabel I found on my Passage down Fourteen laying there; and it appearing to me practicable to cut them out, I directed Captain Pigot, of the Hermione, to take under his Command the Mermaid, Quebec, Drake Brig, and Penelope Cutter, and execute that Service, which, a Copy of his Report, (No. 2.) will prove to their Lordships he did in the most complete Manner; and from Captain Pigot's able and Officer-like Disposition, I have the Satisfaction of saying, was executed without a Man being hurt, although the Road was defended by a Battery of Five Guns (Thirty-Two Pounds), and the Vessels anchored within Half-Musquet Shot of the Shore.

You will also be pleased to lay before their Lordships the Report of Captains Ricketts and Pigot, (No. 3 and 4.) of Vessels cut out and destroyed from Two Anchorages at the West End of Porto Rico.

S I R, *Thunderer, at Sea, April 16, 1797.*

IN consequence of your Order to attend to the French Frigate I chased into Mottique Yesterday Morning, I beg Leave to inform you, that, at a Quarter past Four Yesterday Evening, the Valiant following in close Order, I bore up to examine the Entrance of Mottique Inlet, keeping so close in Shore as to be in Four Fathom Water, when a-breast of the Frigate, but the Wind blew so hard, it was impossible to anchor, without a Certainty of driving on the Rocks. A little before Five I opened my Fire on the French Frigate and Battery, and shortly after, the Valiant did the same; but I was sorry to find the Force of Wind did not allow the Ships to remain long in our Stations, though I had reduced

the Ship to her Top-Sails, and braced the Yards different Ways, for the Purpose of stopping her Way. Finding it too late to perform the same Evolution that Evening, I hauled off, and took such a Station as I thought most likely to prevent her Escape; and this Morning I had the Satisfaction to find that the well-directed Fire of the Two Ships had induced her to quit her Anchorage, by which Means she fell into such a Situation between the Two Ships as made her Escape impossible. At Seven o'Clock this Morning, finding herself in that Situation, she was run on Shore, and set Fire to by the Crew; and Forty-seven Minutes past Eight she blew up. What remains of the Wreck is close to the Shore, about Four Miles to Windward of Jean Rabel. I have every Reason to think she was the Harmonie, of Forty-four Guns. It is with the greatest Satisfaction I inform you, that this Service has been performed without the Loss of a Man, though the Ships suffered a little, in their Masts, Sails, Rigging and Hull. I am much indebted to Captain Crawley, of the Valiant, for the close Order in which he followed me, and the strict Attention he paid to the Orders I gave him before I bore up. From the small Specimen I have had of the Conduct of the Officers and Men belonging to His Majesty's Ship Thunderer, under my Command, I am convinced, that if an Opportunity of real Service offered they would do Credit to the Country they belong to.

S I R,

I Have the Honor to inform you, that, pursuant to your Order of the 18th Instant, I have proceeded with His Majesty's Ship Mermaid off the East End of Tortuga, to endeavour to fall in with the Drake and Penelope, and was joined by them and His Majesty's Ship Quebec at Sun-set on the 19th.

The Wind being very light, and a strong Current setting to the Eastward, I judged we should not reach Jean Rabel before Day-light, therefore stood to the North-West until Three o'Clock in the Afternoon of the 20th, keeping far enough from the Land to prevent any Suspicion of our Intentions, having determined to attempt surprising the Vessels with the Boats under Cover of the Night.

I directed the several Captains to make the necessary Preparations for that Purpose, and stood in, carrying a Proportion of Sail to be close in Shore to the Eastward of Jean Rabel, before the Land Wind came off, in which we succeeded to my Wishes, and kept running down to the Westward until I supposed we were within Two Miles of the Vessels, when the Boats were sent in with Directions to row close along Shore until they discovered them, it being then so dark we could not see them from the Ships; the Frigates followed under an easy Sail, keeping about a Mile from the Shore, to draw the Attention of the Enemy, and thereby favour the Attempt of the Boats. At about One o'Clock I perceived a Fire of Musquetry, at which Time the Enemy had discovered the Boats, but not until they were in Possession of many of the Vessels, and had One actually under Way. The Batteries almost immediately opened upon the Ships, which was occasionally returned by them, and about Four o'Clock the Vessels were all in Possession of our People, and standing out with the Land Breeze, except Two small Row-Boats, which were hauled upon the Beach, and could not be got off. I cannot omit expressing

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my Thanks to Captains Cook, Otway, and Perkins, for their Advice and ready Assistance in the Execution of the above Service, and my Approbation of the Conduct and Exertions of the Officers and Crews belonging to the different Ships, especially those employed in the Boats; and it is with particular Satisfaction I have to inform you, that it has been executed without a Man being hurt. Enclosed I have the Honor to transmit to you a List of the Nine Vessels which were brought out by the Boats.

I Have the Satisfaction to inform you, that the Boats belonging to the Magicienne and Regulus, officered and manned by Volunteers from the Two Ships, in the Night of the 6th Instant, entered the Harbour of Cape Roxo in this Island, the great Receptacle for French Privateers and their Prizes, when they captured, sunk and burnt Thirteen Sail of square-rigged Vessels and Schooners, the whole in the Port, (except a Danish Ship) and destroyed Two

Batteries of Two Guns each, Six and Four Pounders, at the Entrance and Head of the Harbour, without the Loss of a Man.

This Service was so admirably well executed, that I think it a Duty incumbent upon me to make known to you the Names of every Officer employed on it.

*Hermione, at Cape Nichola, April 15, 1797.*

I Have the Honor to inform you, that, on the 22d of March, standing in between the Island of Zacheo and the West End of Porto Rico, I discovered a Brig and several smaller Vessels at Anchor close in Shore, and had the good Fortune to succeed in bringing the Hermione to an Anchor within Half a Mile of them, and abreast of a small Battery, which immediately opened a Fire upon the Ship, but was very shortly silenced.

I sent the Boats, under the Direction of Lieutenants Reid and Douglas, to take Possession of the Vessels; and though they were aground, and a small Fire of Musquetry kept up by the Enemy, they brought them all out but Two, which were sunk, and I am happy to say without a Man being hurt. The following Day I sent the Boats, under the Direction of Lieutenant Reid, to land and endeavour to spike and dismount the Guns, which they effected without Loss, and the Enemy had, on our first Appearance, taken the Sails of the Vessels away, and otherwise dismantled them. I set Fire to them all but the Brig, Three of which were French Privateers, and the others their Prizes, making in all Fifteen, besides the Brig.

In executing the Service, I feel it but Justice to the Officers and Ships Company under my Command, to express my Approbation of their Conduct and Exertions, particularly those employed in the Boats, which Service was attended with much Risk and Fatigue, and executed with the greatest Chearfulness, Spirit, and good Judgment.

The Brig belongs to Bremen, and was captured by one of the Privateers a Month before; she is laden very deep, and is a very valuable Vessel.
