

PROCLAMATION,

For the Suppression of the Mutinous and Treasonable Proceedings of the Crews of Our Ships at the Nore.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS, upon the Representation of Our Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty refpecting the Proceedings of the Seamen and Ma-rines on Board certain of Our Ships at the Norge-We were pleafed to command Our faid Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty to fignify to the faid Seamen and Marines Our gracious Intentions, expreffed in Our Royal Declaration, under Our Sign Manual, bearing Date at St. James's, the Twentyfeventh Day of May instant, in the Words following : "Whereas it has been reprefented unto Us, that, " notwithstanding the Declarations made in Our "Name, and by Our Authority, by Our Lords " Commiffioners of Our Admiralty, of Our gracious Intentions to recommend to the Confideration of " Parliament, to augment the Wages and Allow-" ances of the Seamen and Marines of Our Fleet, " which Our gracious Intentions and Declarations have fince been carried into Effect by an Act of " Parliament; and, notwithflanding the Communication made by Our Right Trufty and Right " Well-beloved Coufin and Councillor Richard Earl
Howe, Admiral of Our Fleet; of Our gracious
Intentions towards the Scamen and Marines of " Our Fleet, for the Pardon of the Offences by " them committed, and Our Royal Proclamation thereupon, bearing Date the Eleventh Day of " May instant ; and notwithstanding the Sentiments " of Duty and Gratitude with which the fame were received by the Seamen and Marines of Our other " Squadrons, yet the Crews on Board certain of " Our Ships at the Nore have not only fince the " Three of them, to fignify to all fuch Seamen and

tentions and Declarations been guilty of divers Acts of Mutiny and Difobedience of Orders, but have even proceeded to other Acts of the most heinous and treasonable Nature, by firing upon fome of Our Ships in order to compel them to fubmit to their Direction; have threatened " and taken Measures for stopping the Commerce " of the Kingdom passing to and from the Port of " London, and have, by Terror of their Force, " compelled Two Frigates to defift from executing " a particular Service, which by Our Orders they " were directed to perform : We, thinking it right " to warn all Our Seamen and Marines on Board the ". faid Ships of the heinous Nature of the Offences by " them committed, and of the dangerous Confe-" quences thereof to the Spirit and Difeipline of the "British Navy, and to the Welfare of their Country, " as well as their own Safety, do hereby earnessly require and enjoin all Our faid Seamen and Marines, immediately on the Notification of this " Our Royal Declaration, to return to the regular Discharge of their Duty, as has already been done by the Crews of Our other Squadrons and Fleets, " ** ftationed at Portfmouth and Plymouth, and elfewhere: And whereas We are well affured that a great Part of the Seamen and Marines on Board " " the faid Ships at the Nore abhor and deteft the Criminal Proceedings which are fill perfifted in on Board the faid Ships, and are defirous to return to their Duty: Now, We being defircus to ex-tend Our Gracious Intentions of Pardon to all " " " ~~ fuch Seamen and Marines fo ferving on Board " Our faid Ships at the Nore, who may have re-turned, or shall return, upon the Notification of " this Our Royal Declaration, to the regular and ordinary Discharge of their Duty, have authorized, 6.6 and do hereby authorize and empower Our faid Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty, or any " full Manifestation of all these Our gracious In- i Marines, who may have been guilty of any of the

* the treafonable Acts aforefaid, or of any Mutiny " or Difobedience of Orders or Neglect of Duty, " and who have returned, or who shall, upon "Notification hereof on Board their respective "Ships, return to the regular and ordinary Dif-" charge of their Duty, Our Royal Intentions to grant to all fuch Searten and Marines Our moft "Gracious Pardon, and to promile, in Our Name, " to all fuch Seamen and Marines, who have fo " returned, or shall fo return to the regular and " ordinary Difcharge of their Duty, Our most gracious Pardon accordingly : And We do hereby " declare, that all fuch Seamen and Marines, who " shall have fo returned, or shall fo return to their " Duty, and to whom the faid Lords Commiflioners " of Our Admiralty, or any Three of them, shall " fo promife Our Pardon, shall receive the fame " accordingly, and fhall be difcharged and releafed from all Profecutions, Impriforments and Penalties " incurred by reason of any of the Acts aforefaid, " or by reafon of any Act of Mutiny or Difubedience " of Orders, or any Breach or Neglect of Duty " previoufly committed by them or any of them; " hereby declaring at the fame Time, that all fuch " Seamen and Marines who fhall not take the " Benefit of this Our gracious Pardon, shall from - henceforth be confidered as liable, according to the " Nature of their Offences, to fuch Punishmennt as the "Articles of War and the Law have provided for the "fame." And whereas Our Right Trutty and Right Well-beloved Coulin and Councillor. George John Earl Spencer, Our Trufty and Well-beloved Charles George Lord Arden of Our Kingdom of Ireland, and William Young, Elquire, Rear-Admiral of the White, being Three of the Lords Commissioners of Our Admiraity, did caufe Our gracious Intentions expressed in fuch Our Declaration, to be fignified to the Crews of Our Ships at the Nore, and did require fuch Crews to return to their due Obedience accordingly : And whereas it has been reprefented to Us, that fome of the Crews of Our faid Ships have been defirous of returning to their Obedience accordingly, but have been prevented from fo doing by Violence; and others of Our Ships, in the actual Difcharge of their Duty, have been fired upon, and Attempts . have been made to prevent fome of Our Ships from proceeding according to the Orders of their Commanders : And whereas fuch continued Perfeverance in rebellious and treafonable Attempts against Our Crown and Dignity, after repeated Admonitions and offers of Our gracious Pardon, render it neceffary for us to call on all Our loving Subjects to be aiding and affifting in reprefling the fame; We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby firicity enjoin and command all Our Admirals, Generals, Commanders and Officers of Our Forces by Sea and Land, and all Magittrates whatfoever, and all others Our loving Subjects, that they, in their feveral Stations, do use their utmost Endeavouis, according to Law, to suppress all fuch mutinous and treafonable Proceedings, and to use all lawful Means to bring the Perfons concerned therein, their Aiders and Abettors, to Justice: And We do hereby firicity enjoin and command all Our loving Subjects whatfoever not to give any Aid, Comfort, Affiltance or Encouragement whatfoever to any Perfon or Perfons concerned in any fuch mutinous and treasonable Proceedings, as they will answer the

fame at their Peril; and alfo, to the utmost of their Power and according to Law, to prevent all other Perfons from giving any fuch Aid, Affistance, Comfort or Encouragement.

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Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtyfirst Day of May, One thousand feven hundred and ninety-feven, and in the Thirty-feventh Year of Our Reign.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majeity in Council. HEREAS by an Act made in the Twenty-third Vear of the D W third Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain "Intruments from being required from Ships "belonging to the United States of America; "and to give to His Majefty, for a limited "Time, certain Powers for the better carrying " on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects " of His Majefty's Dominions and the Inhabitants " of the faid United States ;" which faid Act has been continued by several subsequent Acts until the 5th Day of April, 1797. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to extend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year " of the Reign of His prefent Majelly, for giving " His Majefty certain Powers for the better carrying \$6 on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of " His Majelty's Dominions and the Inhabitants " of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British " Colonies and Plantations in America, with re-" fpect to cértain Articles therein mentioned," the Powers given by the faid recited Act were ex-tended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, fo far as the fame might relate to Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mentioned Act has also by several subfequent Acts been continued until the faid 5th Day of April, 1797.

And whereas by another Act passed in this prefent Seffion of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue " the Lawsnow in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majelly's Dominions " and the Inhabitants of the Territories, belonging to the United States of America, io far as the " " fame relate to the Trade and Commerce carried " on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants " of the Countries belonging to the faid United " States," it is declared to be expedient, that the faid Act of the Twenty-third Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, to far only as the fame extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the People and Territories belonging to the United States of America, and alfo that the faid Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, should be further continued and be n Force; and it is thereby enacted, that the faid Acts shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1798.

His Majefty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Cooncil, hereby order and declare, That, until further Order, any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law (except Tobacco, cor which Provision is herein after made, and exept Oil made from Fish or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber. Whale-Fins and Spermaceci) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rofin, Pot Afh, Pearl Afh, Indico, Mafts, Yards and Bowfprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built the Ports of this Kingdom, either in Brittin-built Ships, owned by His Majefty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, or in Ships taken by any of the Ships or Veffels of War belonging to the Government, or any of the Inhabitants of the faid United States, and condemned as lawful Prize in any Court of Admiralty of the faid United States (of which Condemnation due Proof shall be given) and owned by the Subjects of the faid United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Threefourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the faid United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Pay-ment of fuch Duties as the like Sorts of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Maiefty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the fame may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law.

And it is, in like Manner, further ordered, that all other Goods and Merchandize, not herein before enumerated or defcribed, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Snuff, for which Provision is herein after made) and alfo Oil made tro 10 Fifh or Creatures living in the Sea, and Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceti, being the Growth, Production or Manufacture of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be imported from thence into this Kingdom in British or American Ships, owned and navigated as herein before required, upon Payment of such Duties of Cuftoms and Excise as are payable on the like Goods and Merchandize upon their Importation into this Kingdom from Countries not under the Dominion of His Majelty, according to the Schedule and Tables, marked A. D and F. annexed to an Act passed in the Twenty-feventh Year of His present Majefty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for repealing the "feveral Duties of Cuftoms and Excife, and grant-"ing other Duties in Lieu thereof, and for apply-" ing the faid Duties together with the other Du-" ties composing the Public Revenue; for permit-" ting the Importation of certain Goods, Wares and Merchandize, the Produce or Manufacture " of the European Dominions of the French King, ". into this Kingdom; and for applying certain un-" claimed Monies remaining in the Exchequer, for " the Payment of Annuities on Lives, to the Re-" duftion of the National Debt;" or by any other Laws in Force paffed subsequent to the faid Act, touching the Duties contained in the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F.; and in Cafes

where different Duties are imposed upon the like Goods imported from different Countries not under the Dominion of His Majelty, then that such Goods shall be imported upon the lowest Duties which by the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. are required to be paid on the Importation of any such Goods from any European Country not under the Dominion of His Majelty.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that, until further Order, all fuch Goods and Merchandize shall be intitled to the fame Drawbacks as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods and Merchandize when exported from this Kingdom, according to the faid Schedule and Tables, marked A. D. and F. annexed to the before mentioned Act passed in the Twenty-feventh Year of His prefent Majelty's Reign, or according to any other Law in Force, paffed fublequent to the faid A&, touching Drawbacks. And it is hereby, in like Manner, further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks and Bounties on Goods and Merchandize exported from this Kingdom to the Territories of the faid United States, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America. And it is hereby, in like Manner, further ordered, that there shall be allowed and paid the fame Drawbacks upon the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from this Kingdom into any Britifh Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron to other Foreign Parts; and all fuch Drawbacks and Bousties respectively shall be allowed and paid in the fame Manner, and under the fame Rules, Regulations, Restrictions and Forfeitures, in all Refpects, as fuch Drawbacks and Bounties are allowed and paid, or are fubject and liable to by Law; provided always, and His Majesty is further pleafed to order, that nothing herein contained shall be conftrued to prevent the Importation of Rice and other Articles, without Payment of any Duty whatever, by virtue of an Act paffed in the prefent Seffion of Parliament. intituled, " An Act to continue. for a limited Time, and amend an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act .. to prohibit the Exportation of Corn, Meal, Flour and Potatoes, and to permit the Importation of Corn and other Articles of Provision, for a limited Time, in any Ships whatever, with-out Payment of Duty, and for permitting Wheat, Wheat Flour and Meal, imported in order to obtain the Bounties granted by an Act of 61 the last Session of Parliament, but which have not been found fit for making Bread, to be used in the Manufacture of Starch, Hair-Powder and Blue, or in the Diftillation of Low Wines and Spirits, and in the Manner in the faid Act mentioned."

And His Majetty is hereby further pleafed to order, that, until further Order, any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may be imported in Britifh or American Ships, owned and uavigated as herein before required, upon Payment of the fame Duties as Tobacco, imported by Britifh Subjects from any Britifh Colony or Plantation, is or may hereafter

be fubieft to; and that any Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of any of the faid Territories, may be imported in Manner before mentioned. upon Payment of fuch Duties as Snuff, being the Production or Manufacture of Europe, imported from Europe, is or hereafter may be fubject to, and may be warehoused and again exported ; subject refpectively neverthelefs to all and fingular the Regulations of an Act made and passed in the Twentyninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty, in-tituled, "An Act for repealing the Duties on To-" bacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in " Lieu thereof:" And another Act paffed in the Thirtieth Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to explain and amend an Act " made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, " An A& for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and " Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu " thereof :" And also another Act paffed in the Thirty-first Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, intituled, " An A& to prevent other Ships than those " laden with Tobacco from mooring and difcharg-"ing their Lading at the Places appointed by an "Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefly, intituled, An Act for " repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, " and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof; " to prohibit the Exportation of damaged or mean " Tobacco; and for permitting the Importation of " Tobacco and Snuff into the Port of Newcastle "** upon Tyne."

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That in cafe and as often as Rice shall not be allowed, by the faid Act paffed in the prefent Seffion of Parliament, to be imported without Payment of any Duty, any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America; which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Man. ner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight-pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the In portation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinaster excepted) under His Majesty's Locks, in fuch Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpole by the Commiffioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Pay. ment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of fuch Rice at the Time it shall be so landed : But it is His Majetty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any fuch Rice into the Ports of London, Briftol, Portfmouth. Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Faimouth, Pool, White-haven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glafgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty to enter and land the fame without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Cafe luch Rice shall be warehoused, under the joint Locks of His Majefty and the Proprietors, in fuch Warehouse or Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpofe by the Commissioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, or any Four or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called England, and any Three or more of them, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland; every Expence altending which Warehousing shall be borne by the faid Proprietors: And that fuch Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, st all feasonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Accels to fuch Warchoules, in the Presence

of fome proper Officer of the Cuftoms, for the Purpole of fkreening and fhifting the Rice, to prevent it's receiving Damage. And that if any Rice, which shall be fo imported from the Territories of the faid United States into any of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforefaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be fecured, under the joint Locks of His Majetty and the Proprietors as aforefaid; for Home Confumption, the full Duties, due and payable by Law upon the Importation of fuch Rice into this Kingdom for Home Confumption, fhall, previoufly to it's being taken out of fuch Warehoufes, be paid to the Collector of His Majefty's Cuftoms' at the Ports where fuch Rice shall be fo warehoused ; but that such Proprietor, if he intends to export fuch Rice, shall have Liberty to export the fame from fuch Warehoufes respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever: Provided that the Exportation of any fuch Rice, hereafter to be warehoused, be made within the faid Space of Eighteen Months; and if not within that Period, that the full Duties, payable by Law upon the Im-portation of fuch Rice, be paid for the fame, and not be afterwards drawn back : And that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond, in Manner aforefaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been to fecured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the faid Duties thereon shall be discharged and cancelled by Debenture or Debentures, made out and passed in the usual Manner, for the Quantity or Quantities of Rice duly exported. And if any Rice imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and warehoused in Manner aforefaid, shall be taken out of any fuch Warehouse for Home Confumption, the Remainder of the Duties, due and payable by Law, fhall, previoufly to it's being taken out of fuch Warehoufe, be paid to the Collector of His Majefty's Cuftoms at the Port where fuch Rice fhall be fo warehoused; and that such Payment shall be made, and the Warehouse cleared for such Rice hereafter to be warehoused, within the faid Space of Eighteen Months, otherwife the fame shall and may be fold for the Duties, in like Manner, and under the fame Rules, Regulations and Rellrictions, as any other Goods are now directed by Law to be fold for the Duties.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majetty's Treasury, and the Lords Commisfioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

DISPATCH, of which the following is a A DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, has been received by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, one of His Majetty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Sir Ralph Abercromby, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majefty's Forces in the Weft Indies.

> His Majefty's Ship Prince of Wales, off Porto Rico, May 2, 1797.

SIR, A FTER the Reduction of Trinidad, the Force defined for the Expediton against Porto Rico being affembled, on the 8th of April the Fleet failed from Martinico and arrived at St. Kitt's on the 1cth, where we waited the Arrival of Captain Woolley of His Majesty's Ship Arethusa, who had been sent to Tortola and St. Thomas to procure Pilots and Guides. This occasioned the Delay of a few Days

On Monday the 17th we made the Island of Porto Rico, and came to an Anchor off Congrejos Point. The Whole of the North Side of this Island is bounded by a Reef, and it was with much Difficulty that a narrow Channel was difcovered, about Three Leagues to the Eastward of the Town, through which His Majesty's Sloops the Beaver and Fury, with the lighter Veslels, passed into a small Bay, in which the Troops, on the next Morning, were difembarked with little Opposition from about a Hundred of the Enemy, who were concealed in the Bushes at the Landing Place. In the Afternoon of the fame Day the Troops advanced, and took a Polition very favourable for our Numbers, with our Right to the Sea, and the Left to a Lagoon, which extends far into the Country. The Artillery was brought up without Lofs of Time, and every Preparation made to force a Paffage into the Island on which the Town of Porto Rico is fituated. It is necessary here to observe, that as the Moro Castle completely commands the Paffage into the Harbour, the Enemy kept open their Communication with the Southern and Western Part of the Island, and even teazed and harrassed our Left Flank with their numerous Gun-Boats. The only Point, therefore, on which we could attack the Town was on the Eastern Side, where it is defended by the Caftle and Lines of St. Christopher, to approach which it was necessary to force our Way over the Lagoon, which forms this Side of the Illand. This Pallage was strongly de-fended by Two Redoubts and Gun Boats, and the Enemy had deftroyed the Bridge which connects in the narroweft Channel the Ifland with the Main Land. After every Effort on our Part, we never could fufficiently filence the Fire of the Enemy, (who had likewife entrenched themfelves in the Rear of thefe Redoubts,) to hazard forcing the Passage into the Island with so small a Force; and this indeed would have been in vain, as the Enemy could fupport a Fire ten Times more powerful, than we could have brought against them. The only Thing left was to endeavour to bombard the Town from a Point to the Southward of it, near to a large Magazine abandoned by the Enemy. This was tried for feveral Days without any great Effect on Account of the Diftance.

It appearing, therefore, that no Act of Vigour on our Part, nor that any combined Operation be-tween the Sea and Land Service; could in any Manner avail, I determined to withdraw, and to re-embark the Troops, which was done on the Night of the 30th of April, with the greatest Order and Regularity.

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· All our Artillery and Stores were brought off. except Seven Iron Guns, Four Iron Mortars, and Two Brafs Howitzers, which were rendered unferviceable, it being impossible to remove them. Not a fick or wounded Soldier was left behind, and nothing of any Value fell into the Hands of the Enemy.

During the Whole of our Operations, I have experienced from Admiral Harvey the most cordial Co-operation, and every Act of perfonal Kindnefs. At my Request he landed Three Hundred Seamen, under Captains Toddy and Browne, of the Royal Navy; to whole Exertions while on Shore we are under the greateft Obligations. From the Arrange-ments of the Admiral, the Landing and Re-embarkation of the Troops were conducted in the best Order. To Captain Renou, of the Royal Navy; principal Agent of the Transports, I defire to exprefs the Senfe I have of his good Conduct upon all Occafions.

I beg Leave to affure you, that the Behaviour of the Troops has been meritorious; they were patient under Labour, regular and orderly in their Conduct, and spirited when an Opportunity to shew it occurred. All the Departments of the Army exerted themfelves to my Satisfaction. A Return of our Killed and Wounded accompanies this Difpatch.

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Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir-Hyde Parker, Knt. Commander in Chief of His Majefly's Ships and Veffels at Jamaica, to Evan Nepean, Efg; dated on Board His Majefty's Ship Queen, at Cape Nicbola Mole, April 27, 1797.

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HAVING on the 16th Inftant received Informa-tion from Captain Biffett, of His Majefty's Ship Janus, that he had chaced into Maregot the French Frigate Harmonie the Evening Before, and being myielf obliged, for Want of Provisions, to return to this Port with the Queen, Thunderer, and Valiant, I directed Captain Ogilvy to make Sail in the Evening, and lay off the Bay of Maregot all Night; and, on not discovering the French Frigate there in the Morning, he was directed to proceed close along Shore between the Islands of Tortuga and Port au Paix; the Queen and Valiant keeping without Tor-"On opening the Thunderer to the Weitward tuga. of Tortuga, Captain Ogilvy made the Signal for an Enemy in the S. E. and, on his coming within Hail, had the Satisfaction to find he had chaced the Frigate into Mostique Bay; and it was his Opinion the might be destroyed, which I instantly gave him Orders to use his utmost Endeavours to execute, and directed the Valiant to affift. The Sequel their Lordships will best understand by a Copy of Captain Ogilvy's Report, (No. 1.) Although there was no Proportion as to Force, yet the Confequences will be attended, I truit, with the greatest Advantages to His Majesty's Service, as from the very great Scarcity of Provisions at Cape François, the French Deputies had forced, contrary to the Opinion of the Captain and Officers, this Frigate to go out, in order to convoy a Number of American Veffels, loaded with Provisions, that had been captured by their Privateers, and carried into the Port of Port au Paix and Jean Rabel up to Cape François.

In the Road of Jean Rabel I found on my Païfage down Fourteen laying there; and it appearing to me practicable to cut them out, I directed Captain Pigot, of the Hermione, to take under his Command the Mermaid, Quebec, Drake Brig, and Penelope Cutter, and execute that Service, which, a Copy of his Report, (No. 2.) will prove to their Lordthips he did in the moft complete Manner; and from Captain Pigot's able and Officer-like Difpofition, I have the Satisfaction of faying, was executed without a Man being hurt, although the Road was defended by a Battery of Five Guns (Thirty-Two Pounders), and the Veffels anchored within Half-Mufquet Shot of the Shore.

You will also be pleafed to lay before their Lordfhips the Report of Captains Ricketts and Pigot, (No. 3 and 4) of Vessels cut out and deftroyed from Two Anchorages at the West End of Porto Rico.

S J R, Thunderer, at Sea, April 16, 1797.

IN confequence of your Order to attend to the French Frigate I chafed into Moflique Yefterday Morning, I beg Leave to inform you, that, at a Quarter paft Four Yefterday Evening, the Valiant following in clofe Order, I bore up to examine the Entrance of Moflique Inlet, keeping fo clofe in Shore as to be in Four Fathom Water, when a breaft of the Frigate, but the Wind blew fo hard, it was impoffible to anchor, without a Certainty of driving on the Rocks. A little before Five I opened my Fire on the French Frigate and Battery, and fhortly after, the Valiant did the fame; but I was forry to find the Force of Wind did not allow the Ships to remain long in our Stations, though I had reduced

the Ship to her Top-Sails, and braced the Yards different Ways, for the Purpole of stopping her Way. Finding it too late to perform the fame Evolution that Evening, I hauled off, and took fuch a Station as I thought most likely to prevent her Escape; and this Morning I had the Satisfaction to find that the well-directed Fire of the Two Ships had induced her to quit her Anchorage, by which Means the feil into fuch a Situation between the Two Ships as made her Escape impossible. At Seven o'Clock this Morning, finding herfelf in that Situation, fhe was run on Shore, and fet Fire to by the Crew; and Forty-feven Minutes part Eight the blew up. What remains of the Wreck is close to the Shore, about Four Miles to Windward of Jean Rabel. I have every Reafon to think the was the Harmonie, of Forty-four Guns.. It is with the greatest Satisfaction I inform you, that this Service has been performed without the Lofs of a Man, though the Ships fuffered a little, in their Masts, Sails, Rigging and Hull. I am much indebted to Captain Crawley, of the Valiant, for the close Order in which he followed me, and the strict Attention he paid to the Orders I gave him before I bore up. From the fmall Specimen I have had of the Conduct of the Officers and Men belonging to His Majefty's Ship Thunderer, under my Command, I am convinced, that if an Oppor-tunity of real Service offered they would do Credit to the Country they belong to.

I Have the Honor to inform you, that, purfuant to your Order of the 18th Inftant, I have proceeded with His Majetty's Ship Mermaid off the Eaft End of Tortuda, to endeavour to fall in with the Drake and Penelope, and was joined by them and His Majefty's Ship Quebec at Sun-fet on the 19th.

jefty's Ship Quebec at Sun-fet on the 19th. The Wind being very light, and a frong Current fetting to the Eaftward, I judged we should not reach Jean Rabel before Day-light, therefore stood to the North-West until Three o'Clock in the Asternoon of the 20th, keeping far enough from the Land to prevent any Suspicion of our Intentions, having determined to attempt furprising the Vessels with the Boats under Cover of the Night.

I directed the feveral Captains to make the neceffary Preparations for that Purpofe, and flood in, carrying a Proportion of Sail to be close in Shore to the Eastward of Jean Rabel, before the Land Wind came off, in which we fucceeded to my Wishes, and kept running down to the Westward until I supposed we were within Two Miles of the Veffels, when the Boats were fent in with Directions to row close along Shore until they difcovered them, it being then to dark we could not fee them from the Ships; the Frigates followed under an eafy Sail, keeping about a Mile from the Shore, to draw the Attention of the Enemy, and thereby favour the Attempt of the Boats. At about One o'Clock I perceived a Fire of Mulquetry, at which Time the Enemy had difcovered the Boats, but not until they were in Poffeffion of many of the Veffels, and had One actually under Way. The Batteries almost immediately opened upon the Ships, which was occafionally returned by them, and about Four o'Clock the Veffels were all in Poffession of our People, and flanding out with the Land Breeze, except Two fmall Row-Boats, which were hauled upon the Beach, and could not be got off. I cannot omit expreffing

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my Thanks to Captains Cook, Otway, and Perkins, for their Advice and ready Affiftance in the Execution of the above Service, and my Approbation of the Conduct and Exertions of the Officers and Crews belonging to the different Ships, effectially thole employed in the Boats; and it is with particular Satiffaction I have to inform you, that it has been executed without a Man being hurt. Enclosed I have the Honor to transmit to you a Lift of the Nine, Veffels which were brought out by the Boats.

I Have the Honor to inform you, that, on the zzd of March, ftanding in between the Ifland of Zacheo and the Welt End of Porto Rico, I difcovered a Brig and feveral fmaller Veffels at Anchor clofe in Shore, and had the good Fortune to fucceed in bringing the Hermione to an Anchor within Half a Mile of them, and abreaft of a fmall Battery, which immediately opened a Fire upon the Ship, but was very florcly filenced.

I fent the Boats, under the Direction of Lieutenants Reid and Douglas, to take Poffeffion of the Veffels; and though they were aground, and a fmall Fire of Mulquetry kept up by the Enemy, they brought them all out but Two, which were funk, and I am happy to fay without a Man being hurt. The following Day I fent the Boats, under the Direction of Lieutenant Reid, to land and endeavour to fpike and difmount the Guns, which they effected without Lofs, and the Enemy had, on our first Appearance, taken the Sails of the Veffels away, and otherwife difmantled them. I fet Fire to them all but the Brig, Three of which were French Privateers, and the others their Prizes, making in all Fifteen, befides the Brig.

In executing the Service, I feel it but Juffice to the Officers and Ships Company under my Command, to express my Approbation of their Conduct and Exertions, particularly those employed in the Boats, which Service was attended with much Rifk and Fatigue, and executed with the greatest Chearfulness, Spirit, and good Judgment.

The Brig belongs to Bremen, and was captured by one of the Privateers a Month before; the is laded very deep, and is a very valuable Vessel.
