WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to

any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirty-first Day of August next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For the Suppression of the Mutinous and Treasonable Proceedings of the Crews of Our Ships at the Nore.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS, upon the Representation of Our Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty respecting the Proceedings of the Seamen and Marines

yines on Board certain of Our Ships at the Nore. We were pleased to command Our said Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty to signify to the said Seamen and Marines Our gracious Intentions, expressed in Our Royal Declaration, under Our Sign Manual, bearing Date at St. James's, the Twenty-seventh Day of May instant, in the Words following:

"Whereas it has been represented unto Us, that, notwithstanding the Declarations made in Our Name, and by Our Authority, by Our Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty, of Our gracious Intentions to recommend to the Consideration of Parliament, to augment the Wages and Allowances of the Seamen and Marines of Our Fleet, which Our gracious Intentions and Declarations have since been carried into Effect by an Act of Parliament; and, notwithstanding the Communication made by Our Right Trusty and Right Well-beloved Cousin and Councillor Richard Earl Howe, Admiral of Our Fleet, of Our gracious Intentions towards the Seamen and Marines of Our Fleet, for the Pardon of the Offences by them committed, and Our Royal Proclamation thereupon, bearing Date the Eleventh Day of May instant; and notwithstanding the Sentiments of Duty and Gratitude with which the same were received by the Seamen and Marines of Our other Squadrons, yet the Crews on Board certain of Our Ships at the Nore have not only since the full Manifestation of all these Our gracious Intentions and Declarations been guilty of divers Acts of Mutiny and Disobedience of Orders, but have even proceeded to other Acts of the most heinous and treasonable Nature, by firing upon some of Our Ships in order to compel them to submit to their Direction; have threatened and taken Measures for stopping the Commerce of the Kingdom passing to and from the Port of London, and have, by Terror of their Force, compelled Two Frigates to desist from executing a particular Service, which by Our Orders they were directed to perform: We, thinking it right to warn all Our Seamen and Marines on Board the said Ships of the heinous Nature of the Offences by them committed, and of the dangerous Consequences thereof to the Spirit and Discipline of the British Navy, and to the Welfare of their Country, as well as their own Safety, do hereby earnestly require and enjoin all Our said Seamen and Marines, immediately on the Notification of this Our Royal Declaration, to return to the regular Discharge of their Duty, as has already been done by the Crews of Our other Squadrons and Fleets, stationed at Portsmouth and Plymouth, and elsewhere: And whereas We are well assured that a great Part of the Seamen and Marines on Board the said Ships at the Nore abhor and detest the Criminal Proceedings which are still persisted in on Board the said Ships, and are desirous to return to their Duty: Now, We being desirous to extend Our Gracious Intentions of Pardon to all such Seamen and Marines so serving on Board Our said Ships at the Nore, who may have returned, or shall return, upon the Notification of this Our Royal Declaration, to the regular and ordinary Discharge of their Duty, have authorized, and do hereby authorize and empower Our said Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty, or any

Three of them, to signify to all such Seamen and Marines, who may have been guilty of any of the treasonable Acts aforesaid, or of any Mutiny or Disobedience of Orders or Neglect of Duty, and who have returned, or who shall, upon Notification hereof on Board their respective Ships, return to the regular and ordinary Discharge of their Duty, Our Royal Intentions to grant to all such Seamen and Marines Our most Gracious Pardon, and to promise, in Our Name, to all such Seamen and Marines, who have so returned, or shall so return to the regular and ordinary Discharge of their Duty, Our most gracious Pardon accordingly: And We do hereby declare, that all such Seamen and Marines, who shall have so returned, or shall so return to their Duty, and to whom the said Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty, or any Three of them, shall so promise Our Pardon, shall receive the same accordingly, and shall be discharged and released from all Prosecutions, Imprisonments and Penalties incurred by reason of any of the Acts aforesaid, or by reason of any Act of Mutiny or Disobedience of Orders, or any Breach or Neglect of Duty previously committed by them or any of them; hereby declaring at the same Time, that all such Seamen and Marines who shall not take the Benefit of this Our gracious Pardon, shall from henceforth be considered as liable, according to the Nature of their Offences, to such Punishment as the Articles of War and the Law have provided for the same." And whereas Our Right Trusty and Right Well-beloved Cousin and Councillor George John Earl Spencer, Our Trusty and Well-beloved Charles George Lord Arden of Our Kingdom of Ireland, and William Young, Esquire, Rear-Admiral of the White, being Three of the Lords Commissioners of Our Admiralty, did cause Our gracious Intentions expressed in such Our Declaration, to be signified to the Crews of Our Ships at the Nore, and did require such Crews to return to their due Obedience accordingly: And whereas it has been represented to Us, that some of the Crews of Our said Ships have been desirous of returning to their Obedience accordingly, but have been prevented from so doing by Violence; and others of Our Ships, in the actual Discharge of their Duty, have been fired upon, and Attempts have been made to prevent some of Our Ships from proceeding according to the Orders of their Commanders: And whereas such continued Perseverance in rebellious and treasonable Attempts against Our Crown and Dignity, after repeated Admonitions and offers of Our gracious Pardon, render it necessary for us to call on all Our loving Subjects to be aiding and assisting in repressing the same; We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby strictly enjoin and command all Our Admirals, Generals, Commanders and Officers of Our Forces by Sea and Land, and all Magistrates whatsoever, and all others Our loving Subjects, that they, in their several Stations, do use their utmost Endeavours, according to Law, to suppress all such mutinous and treasonable Proceedings, and to use all lawful Means to bring the Persons concerned therein, their Aiders and Abettors, to Justice: And We do hereby strictly enjoin and command all Our loving Subjects whatsoever not to give any Aid, Comfort,

Assistance

Assistance or Encouragement whatsoever to any Person or Persons concerned in any such mutinous and treasonable Proceedings, as they will answer the same at their Peril; and also, to the utmost of their Power and according to Law, to prevent all other Persons from giving any such Aid, Assistance, Comfort or Encouragement.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirty-first Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, and in the Thirty-seventh Year of Our Reign.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarme, the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Stamp Duties on the several Matters therein mentioned; and for better securing the Duties on Certificates to be taken out by Solicitors, Attornies, and others, practising in certain Courts of Justice in Great Britain.

An Act to continue for a limited Time an Act made in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for confirming and continuing for a limited Time the Restriction contained in the Minute of Council of the 26th Day of February, 1797, on Payments of Cash by the Bank, under certain Regulations and Restrictions.

An Act to continue for a limited Time an Act made in the Thirty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein, in certain Cases.

An Act to indemnify such Persons as have omitted to obtain their Certificates of Inrollment, Admission or Registry in the several Courts of this Kingdom.

An Act to continue an Act made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for the Encouragement of the Pilchard Fishery, by allowing further Bounty upon Pilchards taken, cured and exported.

An Act to amend Two Acts made in the Fourth Year of the Reign of Queen Anne, and the First Year of the Reign of King George the First, for the Preservation of Salmon and other Fish in the Rivers within the Counties of Southampton and Wilts.

An Act for amending and rendering more effectual an Act passed in the Thirteenth Year of His late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for the effectual Draining and Preservation of Haddenham Level, in the Isle of Ely, and for more effectually draining and preserving the Fen Land and Low Grounds lying within the said Level.

An Act for more effectually repairing the Roads between the House commonly called the Horseshoe House, in the Parish of Stoke Goldington, in the County of Buckingham, and the Town of Northampton, and from the North Bridge of Newport Pagnel, in the said County of Buckingham, to the said Horseshoe House.

THE following Address and Resolutions having been transmitted by the Earl of Eglington to his Grace the Duke of Portland, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department; have been by him presented to the King, and most graciously received by His Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbytery of Irvine, this Day met in Presbytery, think ourselves called upon, at this awful Crisis, to express our unshaken Loyalty and Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and our deep Affliction for that Spirit of Mutiny and Revolt which has manifested itself among the Crews of some of your Majesty's Ships. The Character which the British Navy have hitherto sustained for unalterable Loyalty and determined Bravery, leave us no Room to doubt that this Defection has been occasioned through the Artifices of base and unprincipled Men. We sincerely feel for that Anxiety and Distress of Mind which an Event so alarming must occasion to your Majesty, and devoutly pray that these deluded Men may soon be induced to return to their Duty, and by their future Conduct repair the Dishonour they have done to their Country. We are happy to assure your Majesty of the Loyalty of the People under our Charge, and their Attachment to our glorious Constitution, and we will not cease by every Mean in our Power to cherish these Sentiments among them. That He who stilleth the Noise of the Seas, and the Tumult of the People, may turn Wars into Peace unto the End of the Earth, and bless your Majesty with everlasting Consolation and good Hope through Grace, is the earnest Prayer of,

The Meeting having heard with the deepest Concern of the present disgraceful and criminal Conduct of some of the Seamen of His Majesty's Fleet, most sincerely hope and trust, that none of the seamen or others, who have gone from this Port to serve in the Navy, have been induced to take Part in such mutinous and treasonable Conduct: And being

ing fully determined to express their utmost Indignation against this foul and unnatural Treason, they do

Unanimously resolve, that they will not employ in their Ships or otherways countenance any Seamen or others on their Return from serving in the Navy, unless they shall produce a Certificate of their good and orderly Behaviour during such Service, or that (having been for a Time missed) their future Conduct had merited and procured them His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

Resolved, That this Meeting will, to the utmost of their Power, collectively and individually, aid and assist the Civil Magistrates in apprehending and securing all Persons concerned in such treasonable and rebellious Proceedings, and in detecting and bringing to condign Punishment all Persons who have attempted, or who shall hereafter attempt, to seduce from their Duty and Allegiance, His Majesty's Forces by Sea or Land; and, generally, that they will give their Aid to such Measures as His Majesty, in his Wisdom and paternal Care of his People, may be pleased to direct for the Suppression and Punishment of Offences of so high and dangerous a Nature,

It was moved, and unanimously agreed to, that the Thanks of this Meeting be given to Provost Ballantine for calling the same, and which was done accordingly.

JOHN WEBB, Esq; of Towerlands, in the Chair,

The whole Persons convened being firmly attached to His Majesty and the British Constitution, and having a sincere Love for their Country, are deeply concerned at the disorderly and mutinous Proceedings of Part of His Majesty's Fleet at the Nore, which the Meeting regret and behold with Abhorrence; they consider it to be their Duty, and the Duty of all other Persons who love their Country, to publish and openly declare their constitutional Sentiments on the present important Crisis, whereby they may, as far as in them lies, discourage the said disorderly and mutinous Proceedings of the Seamen.

The Meeting, to shew their Disapprobation of the Conduct of these deluded Men, have unanimously resolved, That after the Blessings of Peace shall be restored to this Kingdom, they will not employ any of the Seamen who are at present on Board the Ships of War declared to be mutinous, unless they bring with them and produce a Certificate from a Navy Officer, bearing that they returned to their Duty, and thereafter behaved as dutiful and loyal Subjects: And, for carrying this Resolution into Effect, the Meeting desire their Præses to request the Lords Commissioners of Admiralty to give the necessary Directions, when the Seamen are discharged, that Certificates, in the Manner proposed, may be given to them, in case such Seamen shall have merited the same by their good Conduct and Behaviour after Return to their Duty.

The Meeting request the Præses to sign this Minute in their Name, and to transmit these Resolutions to the Lord Lieutenant of the County of Ayr,

with a Request that his Lordship may transmit the same to the Secretary of State.

Lastly, The Meeting returned Thanks to the Præses for calling them together, and for his Attention to all Public Affairs.

The Meeting request their Præses to subscribe the above Resolutions in their Name, and to transmit the same to the Lord Lieutenant of the County, with a Request that his Lordship transmit the same to the Secretary of State for the Home Department, and these Resolutions to be published, if his Lordship thinks proper.
