I Have to acquaint you, that Yefferday at Noon, St. Vallery de Homme bearing S. E. Three Miles, we captured, after a Chace of Four Hours, L'Espe-

rance, a large French Row-Boat, belonging to Calais, 58 Feet long, armed with 10 Swivels, Mulkets, &c. manned with 32 Men, and rowing 30 Oars, Two Days from Dieppe, and had not taken Oars, Two any Thing.

I beg, by this Opportunity, to inform you, that we have chafed feveral Veffels of the above Defeription into different Ports in the Courle of the last Week.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Gunter, of His Majefty's Sloop Nautilus, to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated at Sea, off Flackery in Norway, June V2, 1797.

I Beg you will be pleafed to inform my Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, that this Morning His Majesty's Sloop Nautilus, under my Com-mand, and Fox Hired Cutter, (after a Chace of Ten Hours) captured the Brutal, a Nutch Lugger Privateer, of Six Guns and Thirty-two Men, and the Syren French Cutter Privateer, of Six Guns and Twenty-feven Men, who were cruizing in Company for the Homeward-bound Baltic Convoy. The catching these Two Vessels gives me much Pleasure, as they have infested this Coast feveral Months, and done an infinite deal of Mischief.

I Beg to acquaint you, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on the 20th Inflant, St. Ive's bearing S. W. Ten Leagues, I fell in with and captured, after a Chace of Twenty-four Hours, L'Audacieux French Lugger Privateer, M. Jacques de Bon, Commander, mounting One Eighteen-Pounder and Two Swivels, and | manned with Forty-fix Men, from St. Mao, out Six Days; had only taken a Danish Brig, from Liverpool bound to Hamburgh, which I had the Satisfaction to retake also a few Hours afterwards.

We fincerely lament the late Diflurbances and Mutiny in a Part of your Royal Navy, and that British Seamen fhould have ever fuffered themfelves to be deluded by the Machinations of hidden Agents of our inveterate Enemy, into Acts of Treafon and open Rebellion against the best of Sovereigns and the We truft, however, most indulgent Government. that your Majesty, in Compliance with the unani-mous Senfe and Wishes of this great and loyal Nation, will take fuch vigorous Meafures as shall speedily reftore the necessary Difcipline of the Navy, and bring the Infligators and Ringleaders of the prefent unprovoked Rebellion to condign Punishment; and we do folemnly pledge onrielves to fupport and affift your Majefty, in all fuch Meafures as shall be requisite for this Purpofe, with our Lives and Fortunes.

We are determined on this and on every other Occafion to maintain the facred Fabric of the British Conftitution, fully convinced that to it alone we owe the ineftimable Bleffings we have hitherto enjoyed; and we fincerely hope and pray that your Majefty may be able, in fpite of all Enemies, to transmit it unimpaired to our Posterity.
