A PROCLAMATION,

*For giving Currency to a new Coinage of Copper
Money of One Penny and Two Penny Pieces.*

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS in consequence of the unanimous Address of Our Commons of Great Britain, in Parliament assembled, praying that We would be graciously pleased to give Directions that Measures might be taken for an immediate Supply of such Copper Coinage as might be best adapted to the Payment of the Laborious Poor in the present Exigency; We have thought fit to order, that certain Pieces of Copper should be coined, which should go and pass for One Penny and Two Pennies, and that each of such Pieces of One Penny should weigh One Ounce Avoirdupois, and that each of such Two Penny Pieces should weigh Two Ounces Avoirdupois; the intrinsic Value of such Pieces of One Penny and Two Pennies, Workmanship included, corresponding as nearly as possible with the nominal Value of the same respectively; every such Piece having, on one Side thereof, Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name or Title, and on the Reverse, the Figure of Britannia, represented sitting on a Rock in the Sea, holding a Trident in her Left Hand, and a Branch of Olive in her Right Hand, with the Year of our Lord.—And whereas Penny and Two Penny Pieces of Copper, of the Weight and Description aforesaid, have been coined, and will be soon ready for Delivery, according to the Orders which We have given for that Purpose: We have therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby ordain, declare and command, that the said Pieces of Copper Money, so coined as aforesaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful Money of

Our said Kingdom; that is to say, such Penny Pieces as of the Value of One Penny, and such Two Penny Pieces as of the Value of Two Pennies, in all Payments and Transactions of Money; provided that no Person shall be obliged to take more of such Copper Money in any one Payment, than shall be of the Value of One Shilling, after the Rate aforesaid.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-sixth Day of July, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, in the Thirty-seventh Year of Our Reign.

Address of His Majesty's Consul and the Members of the British Factory at Leghorn to the Honourable William Frederick Wyndham, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of Florence, published at the Request of the Factory.

S I R, Leghorn, July 4, 1797.

WE, the Consul and Members of the British Factory of Leghorn, being returned to our Place of Residence, and for the first Time legally assembled, embrace with Pleasure the earliest Opportunity to express our grateful Acknowledgments to you, Sir, for the kind Concern you have ever been pleased to shew towards our Welfare and Prosperity. But we feel ourselves more particularly called upon to mark our Gratitude for the Zeal and Activity you displayed last Year in discovering and communicating to us the execrable Intentions of the French Army to violate the Neutrality of Tuscany, and seize upon the Property, as well of the English Nation as of the English Individuals in this Place. To your Advice, Sir, and to that alone, is due the Merit of saving all the English Merchantmen in our Port, besides the Property embarked on these and other Vessels, making in all a Convoy of Forty-nine Sail; that departed from hence for Corsica on the 27th of June last Year: And had it not been for a Notification of the

the Government of this City, published only Forty Hours before the Entrance of the French Troops, declaring that the Rumours spread of their coming here were false, and informing the Inhabitants in general of it's having had Ministerial Assurances that the Neutrality of Tuscany would be respected, much more would have been saved. But considering the Force of the said Notification, which kept People in Suspence until it was too late, by the rapid Approach of the Enemy, and the Confusion incident to so extraordinary and unprecedented a Case, it was to be rather wondered at that so much was done in the short Space of Sixty Hours, including the Jews and Christian Sabbath.

To commemorate the Epoch of these eminent Services and our Obligations and Gratitude, we have desired one of our Members, now in London, to get a Piece of Plate prepared, with an Inscription engraved upon it suitable to the Purpose and Occasion, and whereof we shall, in due Time, request your Acceptance.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that an anonymous threatening Letter, of which the following is a Copy, was received by Mr. Snipe, Surgeon of His Majesty's Ship the Sandwich, in consequence of the Evidence he had given on the Trial of Richard Parker, viz.

" Sir,

" We are sure if you have any Conscience, it must fly in your Face and and give you no rest for what you have done against Mr. Parker, you swore falsely against him and took his Life you and that infernal villian Barry who was bribed to swear against him, and your vile diabolical Captain Moss the villainous Prosecutor, do you suppose you will escape, no, your destruction is higher than you imagine Mr. Parker has Friends and more of them than you are aware of who will not suffer you to escape, and in such an Hour as you think not it will come upon you even sudden destruction thank God all your diabolical Malice is now terminated with respect unto him, he is we hope where such infernal villains as you can never enter for hell is made for such base abominable miscreants and such as your vile Captain and Barry and yourself are vessels of wrath fitted to everlasting destruction o how will it gall your souls thro' all Eternity to See Blessed Parker full of Joy and happiness and Glory in the blissful presence of God and Christ and Holly Angels, when you will be company to devils and damned Souls, and full of wrath, Misery and Woe for ever and ever.—We are &c. &c. &c."

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the Letter above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

THE Commissioners for carrying into Effect the Sixth Article of the Treaty of Amity, Commerce and Navigation, concluded between His Britannic Majesty and the United States of America, on the 19th Day of November, 1794, having this Day constituted their Board, pursuant and agreeably to the said Treaty, do hereby give Notice, that they are ready to proceed to Business accordingly; and they desire that all Claims under the said Article, (which so far as the same describes the Cases thereby provided for is hereunto annexed) may be lodged with their Secretary without Delay.

They further desire that all such Claims may not only state in what Manner the several Cases come within the Description of the said Article, but also, specially set forth the Nature of the Evidence by which the Claimants respectively undertake to substantiate the same.

EXTRACT FROM THE SAID ARTICLE.

"Whereas it is alledged by divers British Merchants and others, His Majesty's Subjects, that Debts to a considerable Amount, which were bona fide contracted before the Peace, still remain owing to them by Citizens or Inhabitants of the United States; and that, by the Operation of various lawful Impediments since the Peace, not only the full Recovery of the said Debts has been delayed, but also the Value and Security thereof have been in several Instances impaired and lessened; so that, by the ordinary Course of judicial Proceedings, the British Creditors cannot now obtain and actually have and receive full and adequate Compensation for the Losses and Damages which they have thereby sustained: It is agreed that in all such Cases, where

full Compensation for such Losses and Damages cannot, for whatever Reason, be actually obtained, had and received by the said Creditors, in the ordinary Course of Justice, the United States will make full and complete Compensation for the same to the said Creditors; but it is distinctly understood that this Provision is to extend to such Losses only as have been occasioned by the lawful Impediments aforesaid, and is not to extend to Losses occasioned by such Insolvency of the Debtors, or other Causes, as would equally have operated to produce such Loss; if the said Impediments had not existed; nor to such Losses or Damages as have been occasioned by the manifest Delay or Negligence, or wilful Omission of the Claimant."
