Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Kingmill, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the Coast of Ireland, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board the Penguin, Cork Harbour, the 3d of September, 1797.

PLEASE to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Ship Doris has sent in a Spanish Privateer Lugger, of 4 Guns, besides Swivels and Small Arms, and 85 Men, El Derrepente, of Bilboa, which she captured in Latitude 46 deg. 30 min. Longitude 10 deg. 36 min. This Privateer had taken Two Danish Vessels.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Henry Carew, Commander of His Majesty's Sloop Swan, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated in Yarmouth Roads, the 6th of September, 1797.

I Have the Honor to communicate to you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on the 12th Ultimo, at Nine P. M. the Fly bearing S.W. Six Leagues, I fell in with and captured the Goede Verwayteng Sloop Privateer, of 8 Guns and 28 Men, belonging to Amsterdam, out Fifteen Weeks, and has taken Three Prizes.

YOU will receive herewith a Letter from Captain Parker, of the Orestes Sloop, giving an Account of his having captured Le Furet French Lugger Privateer.

Orestes, at Sea, September 4, 1797.

SIR,

YESTERDAY Evening, Portland bearing N. N. W. Distance Nine Leagues, I saw a Lugger standing to the Southward, which we gave Chace to; it coming light Winds, and finding she gained on us, I manned and armed our Six-oared Boat, and sent the Master of the Orestes, Mr. Craddock, in Chace of her, who captured her and brought her down to the Brig about Three o'Clock this Morning: She proves to be the French Lugger Privateer Le Furet, commanded by Citizen Vianon, manned with 17 Men, armed with 4 Swivels and 1 Small Arms; she has been Two Days from Cherbourg, and taken nothing.

THE Commissioners for carrying into Effect the Sixth Article of the Treaty of Amity, Commerce and Navigation, concluded between His Britannick Majesty and the United States of America, on the 19th Day of November, 1794, having this Day constituted their Board, pursuant and agreeably to the said Treaty, do hereby give Notice, that they are ready to proceed to Business accordingly; and they desire that all Claims under the said Article (which so far as the same describes the Cases thereby provided for is herunto annexed) may be lodged with their Secretary without Delay.

They further desire that all such Claims may not only state in what Manner the several Cases come within the Description of the said Article, but also specially set forth the Nature of the Evidence by which the Claimants respectively undertake to substantiate the same.

EXTRACT from the said ARTICLE.

"Whereas it is alledged by divers British Merchants and others, His Majesty's Subjects, that Debts to a considerable Amount, which were bona fide contracted before the Peace, still remain owing to them by Citizens or Inhabitants of the United States; and that, by the Operation of various lawful Impediments since the Peace, not only the full Recovery of the said Debts has been delayed, but also the Value and Security thereof have been in several Instances impaired and lessened; so that, by the ordinary Course of judicial Proceedings, the British Creditors cannot now obtain and actually have and receive full and adequate Compensation for the Losses and Damages which they have thereby sustained: It is agreed that in all such Cases, where full Compensation for such Losses and Damages cannot, for whatever Reason, be actually obtained, had and received by the said Creditors, in the ordinary Course of Justice, the United States will make full and complete Compensation for the same to the said Creditors; but it is distinctly understood that this Provision is to extend to such Losses only as have been occasioned by the lawful Impediments aforesaid, and is not to extend to Losses occasioned by such Insolvency of the Debtors, or other Causes, as would equally have operated to produce such Loss, if the said Impediments had not existed; nor to such Losses or Damages as have been occasioned by the manifest Delay or Negligence, or wilful Omission of the Claimant."
