PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 26th Day of April last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom of any Sort of Rock Salt, expired upon the 29th Day of last Month: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition thould be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 29th Day of last Month, export or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or load or lay on board of any Ship, Veffel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act paffed in the Thirty-fixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intitued, "An Act for indemnisying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of His Majesty in Council respecting the Exportation for Rock Salt; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty " jesty to probibit the Exportation or carrying "Coaltwife of Rock Salt; and for making further Provisions relative thereto;" His Majetty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwife under the usual Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, nor the ExportaRegulations, and upon Security being given, by the Exporter and Two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Vessel shall be one) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the faid Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if such Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, and within Twelve Months if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies, and within Eighteen Months if for any of the British Settlements or Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Customs at the Port or Place where such Rock Salt shall be so landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Customs, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, testifying that the faid Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the same was entered out. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 3d of May last probibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom

Kingdom any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, (except as in the faid Order is mentioned) will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant November: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Councili hereby order, require, probibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from, the faid 7th Day of this instant November, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all " Persons who have been concerned in advising " or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords
Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respect-" ing the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; " for preventing Suits in confequence of the same; " for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Ex-" portation or carrying Coastwife of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions " relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs; to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commis sioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Eorm and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards .- And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively ap-, ; ;

Saturday being the Anniversary of the Birth of the late King William the Third, of Glorious Memory in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower; at Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant; after which his Excellency, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William. On his Excellency's Return to the Castle the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phœnix were fired Three Rounds, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in College Green. And at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy.
