An Act for continuing and granting to His Majesty certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder and Perry for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight.

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax, to be raised in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight.

An Act to amend and continue, until One Month after the Conclusion of the present War, the Provisions contained in an Act passed in the Session of Parliament of the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, Chapter Ninety-one, videlicet, on the Twenty-second of June, One thousand seven hundred and Ninety-seven, for the Restriction on Payments of Cash by the Bank.

An Act to continue, until the Expiration of Thirty Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, an Act passed in the Session of Parliament of the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, Chapter One Hundred and Thirty-seven, videlicet, on the Twentieth of July, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, intituled, An Act to continue an Act made in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to revive and continue, for a limited Time, and amend an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to allow the Banks and certain Banking Companies in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, to issue Notes for Sums under a certain Amount, for a limited Time, and for indemnifying all Persons who have issued Notes for small Sums of Money in that Part of the United Kingdom for a limited Time.

An Act to continue, until the First Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, an Act passed in the Session of Parliament of the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, Chapter Seventy-two, videlicet, on the Sixth of June, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, for prohibiting the Importation of Cambricks and French Lawns into this Kingdom, not being of the Manufacture of Ireland, except for the Purpose of being warehoused for Exportation.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarme, the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to continue, until the Expiration of Six

Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, Chapter Seventy, videlicet, on the Sixth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, for the better Prevention and Punishment of Attempts to seduce Persons serving in His Majesty's Forces by Sea or Land from their Duty and Allegiance to His Majesty, or to incite them to Mutiny or Disobedience.

An Act to continue, until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, Two several Acts passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, the one Chapter Thirty-two, on the Tenth Day of March, and the other Chapter Sixty-one, on the Twenty-fifth Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, for suspending, for a limited Time, the Operation of certain Acts made in the Fifteenth and Seventeenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for restraining the Negotiation of Promissory Notes and Bills of Exchange, under a limited Sum, within that Part of Great Britain called England.

ORDERS for the Court's going into Mourning on Sunday next, the 3d of December, for the late King of Prussia, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, plain Muffin or long Lawn, Cape or Love Hoods, Black Silk Shoes, Black glazed Gloves, and Black paper Fans.

Undress, Black or Dark Grey unwatered Tabbies.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Cloth, without Buttons on the Sleeves or Pockets, plain Mullin or long Lawn Cravats and Weepers, Black Swords and Buckles.

Undress, Dark Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning on Sunday the 31st of December, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, fringed or plain Linen, White Gloves, Necklaces and Earrings, Black or White Shoes, Fans and Tippets.

Undress, White or Grey Lustrings, Tabbies or Damasks.

The Gentlemen to wear Black, full trimmed, fringed or plain Linen, Black Swords and Buckles.

Undress, Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning further on Sunday the 7th of January next, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippets; or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuffs, with Black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black, or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuff Waistcoats full trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Sunday the 14th of January the Court to go out of Mourning.

N. B. The Mourning to be left off on Tuesday the 19th of December, the Day appointed for a General Thanksgiving, and to be resumed the next Day.
