Mosco, April 2.

Wo days fince arrived here a perion fent with Letters from the Grand Signior to the Czar, containing, as we are informed, a demand, That the Czar do yield the whole Okraine, and the City of Kiof, to the Turks; and declaring, in cafe that be not done, that the Grand Signior will take the Field in perfon, and attack this Countrey with all the Forces of his Empire, and bring his Arms even to the Gates of this City. But thefe lofty menaces are not like to have any effect here, but on the contrary this Court applies its felf for the putting things everywhere into fuch a pollure, as that the War may be continued with the fame fuccefs we have hitherto had; and particularly its care is employed to perfect the Alliance with the King of *Poland*, from whom we are expecting Ambaffadors in order to it.

Genoua, May 3. The 26th paft arrived here the Diamond from Legorn. The 29th, the Dolfin from Palermo. The 30th, the St. Lucar Merchant, and the Recovery, from Alicam. And the first instant, the Welcome from Cadiz. The fame day failed from hence two Dutch Men of War, with about 20 Sail of Merchant Ships, of which 8 were English, homeward bound. The apprehensions of the defigns of the French and Savoyards upon Savona, continue fiil, and mere Soldiere have been lately fent, bither, to reinforce the Garlfon.

Dantzick, May 6. In our last we told you, that Prince Radzevil was appointed to go to Mojcovy, with the Character of Ambaffador from the Crown of Po'and, but that proves a miftake, he b. ing d.figned for Fienna, to perfuse the Emperor to take part in the War against the Turks, that fo they may attack them on all fides, and reduce them to a condition not fo formidable to their Neighbors, as their prefent is, the faid Prince is come hither, to give Qrders for the providing his Equipage, intending to begin his Journey very speedily; and Ambassadors will be likewife fent as well by the Poles, as the Mofoovites, to other Princes, to folligite affiliances from them in a War, in the fuccels of which all Chriftendom may be fo much concerned; but the advice which comes from feveral Parts, that the Mofcovites are treating undershand with the Turks, and the diffrust that it occasions among the Poles, that they will not be firm to their Engagements, will probably cool the zeal with which this affair ought to be purfued.

Copenhagen, May 6. Our Flect, confifting in 32 capital Ships, and in near the lame number of Tenders and Firefhips, is now in the Soundt, but Admiral Fuels is not yet gone on Board, expecting first the return of the King hither from Holflein, to receive his aft O rders. There are about 10 men of War more, which as yet remain here, and are, it's believed, defigned for the *Baltick*. We continue fill wholly in the dark concerning the King of *Sueden*, that is, whether he be alive or dead: fome will fay, that the report of his death was raifed by thole who thought it might in the prefent juncture of affairs turn to their advantage, while others fill affure us of the truth of it. In this uncertainty we mult fulpend believing either, and leave it to time to fatisfie us in this particular.

Copenhagen, May 13. The roth inflant the King returned hither from Holfein, and the next day, being accompanied with his Brother Prince George, weat to Cronenbarg, to fee the Fleet, and having done that, paffed over to Schonen. Yefterday arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from Nimeguen, with Letters from our Ambaffador's there, who, without making any flay here, followed the King to Schonen, to deliver them. There are now feveral perfons here in Town, who lately come from Cbriftianftadt, and faw, as they roport, the King of Sueden there, and in his Camp not many days fluce, being pretty well recovered of his late ficknefs.

Wefel, May 9. Yesser and the Brandenburg Troops that were in Garilon here, marched ont, and this day 4000. French came and supplied their places; they are quartered upon the Burghers, who mult provide them with Provisions. for they brought note with them; but we hope this will not last long.

Hamburgh, May 12. Two days fince paifed through this City a Courier with Letters from Monfieur Mey-ercroon the Danifh Minister at Paris, to the King of Denmark s and it is reported that he carried a Project for the Peace of the North, which there are those who tell us some Articles of, viz. That & Million of Crowns shall be paid to Denmirk for the charge of the War; that the Suedes shall, like other Nations, pay Toll in the Sounds; and that the King of Denmark (hall keep W.f.n.tr, &c. but without certainty enough to have any credit given to them. From Pomeren they write, that the Elector of Bean-denburgh had given Orders for the removing all the Cannon from Straelfond, Gripfwaldt and Stetin; fiom which, people are ready to conclude his Electoral Highnels has refolved with himfelf to reftore those places. Count Coning marke, who has remained with 1000, Or 1100 men in Pomeren, ever lince the Surrender of Straelfonds to the Elector, has at length obtair . ed a Pals from the King of Denmark, to return with those men for Sueden. It is faid that Monsieur Rabe-nze, the French Minister, who is now at Zell, is labourd ing to dispose that Duke to take some resolution in favor of the Duke of Holftein, that he may berefto-

red to his Countrey. Liege, May 16. Yefferday the Prince of Orange arrived at Maestricht, as did the same day foveral Vessels laden with Ammunition, and other Military Provisions. The French Troops in these Parts received Orders yesterday to march, accordingly they this day begin to quit their quarters, and to take their way way to surds the Rbine. It is iaid that the Marefchal de Grequi is coming down with more Forces from Lorrain, and thole that pretend to know very well, adure us, that the French will attack the Elector of Brandenburgb with in Army of above 40000 men, if not prevented by a Peace, which the French fay they will make upon no other collitions, than fuch as reflore to Sueden whitever has been taken from that Crown in this War.

Amsterdam, May 14. Wesel and L'pstadt are now in the hands of the French, as Schealcans might have been, had not they declined it, to avoid giving jealoufie to this State, which is, as we are informed, much diffatistied with the Flector of Brandenburgh, for having affered to give the French pofferion of a Poff, of fo great concernment to theie Provinces, as Schen-Joans is. The Sicur Meinders, the Brandenburgh Minister, not having been able to come to a conclusion with the French Ambaffadors at Nimeguen, upon the terms he was infructed in, is gone for Paris, to try whether he may not find more favourable dispolitions there, being, as is laid, fully empowred to conclude the Peace. And at the fame time we understand, that the King of Denmark has a Minister at Paris, who has made feveral Overtures to that Court on his part, fo that no body doubts, but that a fhort time will produce the Peace of the North. The news of the death of the King of Sueden, though it is not post rively contradicted, yet is now believed by very few.

Amflerdam, May 20. The appearances of 2 fudden Peace in the North begin to leffen, ficing Monfieur Meinders has not been able to effect any thing with the French Ambaflador at Nimeguen, who on the contrary lath declared, That Monneur Calop had Orders, fo foon as the Ceffation expired, to pais the Rhine with his Forces, a id to attack the Electros Territories, and from Gologne they write, that the French Troops which had hitherto continued in the Countrey of Juliers, were in motion, having Orders to Rend zvous the 18th inflant near Wefel.

Hague, May 20. The Prince of Orange has been at Marstricht. at Grave, Bolduc, and other places, to wifit the Fortifications, and to fee that they are in the condition they ought to be, cfpecially at a time when to confiderable an Army is in our Neighborhood, and about the middle of the next week, his Highnels is expected back here. We are affured that the Suedes Ambaffador, and the Deputies of this State, have finally adjusted the Points in difference of the Treaty of Commerce. From Nimeguen they write, that the Sieur Meinders, the Brandenburgh Minister, was parted firm thence for Paris, not having been able to conclude any thing with Mouficur Colbert the French Ambaffador there, upon the terms he was inftructed by his Electoral Highnels to confent to in his name, or fo much as to obtain a prolongation of the Ceffation, which expires this day; fo that we must expect to hear that Monfieur Calvo has renewed the Hoffilities, according to the Orders received from his Court_

Parie, May 19. The Bilhop of Strucburgh took Jus leave of the King long days fince, in order to his re urn fot Germany; the King has made him a Prefent of 100 thousand Livres. The Marquis de Villars, who is going in quality of Ambassador Extraordinary for Spain, has received the Kings commands to part forthwith. We are told that the Marriage of Madamoiscelle d' Orleans with the King of Spain, will now very fuddenly be declared. On Monday laft Madam Philbert being Condenued for having poyfoned her Hüsband, to have her Hahd cut off, then to be Hanged and Burnt, was according to that Sentence Executed. The 15th inflat the Sieur Meyercroone, Envoy from the King of Denmark, had Audience of his Majefly, to whom he reprefented the great defire of his Mailer to put an end to the War he was engaged in, and to renew his ancient friendlhip and good correfpondence with his Maj:fly, and to that end made feveral Propofals to his Majefly concerning the terms the King of Denmark is willing to conclude the Peace upon.

Plymouth, May II. Yefferday came into this Port a Merchant Ship bound for London from Libbon, the Maffer reports, that 8 days fines, in the Lititude of 42, he met with a French Ship, the Maffer whereof told him, that the day before he met with Canarr, Admiral of Argiers, with $\frac{7}{7}$ Sail more; that the Turks came on Board him, but finding him French, (with whom those Pyrats are at present in Peace) left him to purfue his Voyage, having told him, that they were going for the Channel; of which this Mafler gave Sir Robert Robinson, whom he met Cruissing off of the Lizerd, an account; upon which he, with the Ships under his command, thood over for the French Coasts, in fearch of the fard Pyrats.

• Portfmouth, May 13. Yefterday came to an anchor a finall Pink laden with Oyls from Portugal; the Mafter fays, he met with a French Veffel, from whom he understood, that 7 or 8 Algierin Men of War were coming for the Channel.
