By the KING, A PROCLAMATION,

For a Publick Thankfgiving for the many fignal and important Naval Victories obtained in the prefent War. . . .

GEORGE R.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the indifpenfable Duty which We owe to Almighty God, for the manifold and ineffimable Bleffings which these Kingdoms have received at his Hands, and defiring to manifest to Our faithful and loving Subjects, and to the whole World, the deep and devout Senfe which We entertain of His great Mercies vouchfafed unto Us, by proftrating Ourfelves before His Divine Majefty, and offering up, in the most publick and folemn Manner, Our Praise and Thanksgiving for the Interpolition of His good Providence, in the many fignal and important Victories obtained by Our Navy in the Courfe of the prefent War, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding, that a Publick Thankfgiving to Almighty God, for thefe His Mercies, be observed throughout -that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, upon Tuelday the Nineteenth Day of December next: And We do firicity charge and command, that the faid Publick Thankfgiving be reverently and decently observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland on the faid Nineteenth Day of December next, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of fuch Punishment as We may justly inflict on all fuch as contemn or negleft the Performance of fo religious a Duty. Our Will and Pleafure is therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pais to the Market Crofs of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Igno-rance: And Our Will and Pleafure is, that Our Solicitor do caufe printed Copies hereof to be fent to the Sheriffs of the feveral Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to fee the fame published : And We appoint them to fend Copies thereof to the feveral Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned the fame may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

PROCLAMATION, Α

For giving Currency to a New Coinage of Seven Shilling Gold Pieces. . .

GEORGE R.

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HEREAS We have thought fit to order, that certain Pieces of Gold Money fhould be coined, which fhould be called "Seven Shilling Pieces," each of which should be of the Value of

Seven Shillings, and Three of which should be of the Value of One Guinea; and that each Piece should be be of the Weight of 1 Pennyweight 15 Grains 1860 Troy Weight, of Standard Gold, being One Third of the Weight of a Guinea; and that Three of fuch Pieces fhould be of the Weight of 5 Pennyweights 9 Grains $\frac{4385}{70005}$ Troy Weight, of Standard Gold, being the Weight of a Guinea, according to the Weights approved and confirmed by Us in Our Council; in pursuance of an Act made in the Fourteenth Year of Our Reign, intituled, " An Act for " regulating and afcertaining the Weights to be " made Use, of in weighing the Gold and Silver " Coin of this Kingdom!" And We have further thought fit to order, that every fuch Piece of Gold Money, fo ordered to be coined as aforefaid, fhould have; on one Side thereof, Our Effigies or Por-traiture, with Our Name, and the Words Dei Gratiâ, and on the Reverfe, the Regal Crown of England, with the following Legend, Mag. Bri. Fr. Et Hib. Rex. And whereas Pieces of Gold Money of the above Description have been coined at Our Tower of London, and will be coined there, in pursuance of Orders which we have given for that Purpole, We have therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby ordain, declare and command, that the faid Pieces of Gold Money fo coined and to be coined as aforefaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and fhall be called Seven Shilling Pieces, and fhall pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our faid Kingdom; and every of fuch Pieces shall pass and be received as of the Value of Seven Shillings of Our lawful Money of Our faid Kingdom, and Three of fuch Pieces shall pass and be received as of the Value of One Guinea of Our lawful Money of Our faid Kingdom, in all Payments whatfoever.
