E, taking into Our most serious Consideration the indispensable Duty which We owe to Almighty God for the manifold and inestimable Bleffings which these Kingdoms have received at his Hands, and desiring to manifest to Our faithful and loving Subjects, and to the whole World, the deep and devout Sense which we entertain of His great Mercies vouchsafed unto Us, by prostrating Ourselves before His Divine Majesty, and offering up, in the most Publick and solemn Manner, Our Praise and Thanksgiving for the Interposition of His good Providence, in the many fignal and important Victories obtained by Our Navy, in the Course of the present War, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding that a General Thankfgiving to Almighty God for these His Mercies, be observed throughout England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Tucfday the Nineteenth Day of December next: And for the better and more orderly fo-lemnizing the fame, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to the Occasion, to be used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of Publick Worship, and to take Care for the timely dispersing of the same throughout their respective Dioceses; and We do strictly charge and command, that the said Publick Day of Thanksgiving be religiously observed by all Our loving Subjects, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pain

of fuffering such Punishment as We may justly inflict upon all such who shall contemn or neglect the same.

Our Will and Pleasure is therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation feen, ye forthwith pais to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewarts artries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to fee the same published: And We appoint them to fend Copies thereof to the feveral Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned the fame may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

For giving Currency to a New Coinage of Seven Shilling Gold Pieces.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We have thought fit to order, that certain Pieces of Gold Money should be coined, which should be called " Seven Shilling Pieces," each of which should be of the Value of Seven Shillings, and Three of which should be of the Value of One Guinea; and that each Piece should be of the Weight of, a Guinea; and that Three of such Pieces should be of the Weight of 5 Pennyweights of Grains $\frac{4380}{2000}$ Troy Weight, of Standard Gold, being the Weight of a Guinea, according to the Weights approved and confirmed by Us in Our Council, in pursuance of an Act made in the Fourteenth Year of Our Reign, inituled, "An Act for regulating and afcertaining the Weights to be made Use of in weighing the Gold and Silver Coin of this Kingdom." And We have further thought fit to order, that every fuch Piece of Gold Money, so ordered to be coined as aforesaid, should have, on one Side thereof, Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name, and the Words Dei Gratia, and on the Reverse, the Regal Crown of England, with the following Legend, Mag. Bri. Fr. Et Hib. Rex. And whereas Pieces of Gold Money of the above Description have been coined at Our Tower of London, and will be coined there, in pursuance of Orders which we have given for that Purpose, We have therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby ordain, declare and

command, that the said Pieces of Gold Money so coined and to be coined as aforesaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall be called Seven Shilling Pieces, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our said Kingdom; and every of such Pieces shall pass and be received as of the Value of Seven Shillings of Our lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, and Three of such Pieces shall pass and be received as of the Value of Our said Kingdom, and Three of such Pieces shall pass and be received as of the Value of One Guinea of Our lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, in all Payments whatsoever.

And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Priyy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Perfon or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the 7th Day of this instant December, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingcom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunrowder or Saltperre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or fhip or lade any tGunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coass-wise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Counncil, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the re-spective Forseitures and Penalties, inslicted by an A& passed in the Twenty ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to impower His Maiefly to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpere, and to enforce the Law for impowering His Ma-" jesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Ma-jesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7 HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 7th Day of June last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom any of the Wood called Lignum-Vitæ, will expire upon the 10th Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; . His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and .command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do. at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 10th Day of this instant December, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood cailed Lignum-Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majelly or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesly's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all " Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; -66 for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; " for authorizing His Majelty to prohibit the Ex" portation or carrying Coastwife of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Ma-:jesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board any of the said Wood called Lignum-Vitæ which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, nor to prevent the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum-Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majetly's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majetly's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to New-foundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum-Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Setetlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Wood -called Lignum-Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Com-emissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Wood called Lignum-Vitæ to the Flaces for
