Whitehall, December 16, 1797.

HIS Majesty is pleased to permit the Members of both Houses of Parliament to pass through the Gates of the Parks, at the Top of Constitution Hill and the Horse Guards, in their Way to the Two Houses, on Tuesday next, till Half past Eight o'Clock in the Morning.

THE Magistrates have been directed to place a sufficient Number of Constables in all the Streets leading into Pall-Mall, Cockspur-Street, Charing-Cross, and the Strand, to prevent all Carriages and Horses passing into those Streets, on Tuesday next, the 19th Instant, excepting such as are to compose a Part of the Procession to attend His Majesty to St. Paul's;

It is therefore expected, that no Person whatever will attempt to drive or ride into either of those Streets, on that Day, until the Procession shall have returned to St.

James's, or interrupt the Constables or Soldiers in the Execution of the Service which they are directed to perform.

The Peereffes, and other Persons, having a Right to Places in St. Paul's, are desired to pass down Holborn; and the like Orders are given to the Magistrates to provide for their free Passage, by that Route, to and from the Cathedral.

SUCH Inhabitants of Pall-Mall and the Strand as may intend to use their Carriages on the 19th Instant, are hereby desired to send them, very early in the Morning, into the Streets and Squares to the Northward of their respective Situations: Those of Pall-Mall, into St. James's-Street, St. James's-Square, &c. Those of Cockspur-Street, and that Neighbourhood, into the Haymarket and Leicester-Square: And those of the Strand and Streets leading from it towards the River, into Covent-Garden

and the Streets near it; and to walk to their Carriages when they want to use them.

The Lords and Members of the House of Commons living at the West End of the Town; and as far as Lincoln's-Inn-Fields, are hereby desired to go down to Westminster in the Morning, either by the Haymarket or Hedge-Lane, or by St. Martin's-Lane, the Entrances from which, into Cockspur-Street and the Strand, will be kept open until Nine o'Clock in the Morning, for that Purpose, or through the Parks; in which last Case they are requested to go down Constitution Hill: And such Members as live to the East of St. Paul's, are requested to go down to Westminster over London Bridge.

AS General Illuminations have already taken Place in Westminster, on Account of the several Victories obtained by His Majesty's Arms at Sea, over the Enemies of Great Britain, it is hereby particularly requested of all Persons not to repeat such Manifestations of their Loyalty upon Tuesday the 19th Instant.

PROCESSION TO ST. PAUL'S.

ANDERSON, MAYOR.

Ordered,

THAT the following Regulations be adopted for the Accommodation of their Majesties and the Royal Family, the Members of both Houses of Parliament, the Foreign Ministers, the Aldermen, &c. of London, and others passing to and returning from the Cathedral Church of St. Paul on Tuesday the 19th of December, 1797.

That there be Three Avenues to the Church kept with distinct Outlets from each, for the Carriages to pass off and return.

West Avenue for their Majesties, the Royal Family, the Members of both Houses of Parliament, and the Foreign Ministers.

That the great Street or Avenue from Temple-Bar to the Church be reserved entirely for the Pas-

sage of their Majesties, the Royal Family, the Members of both Houses of Parliament, and the Foreign Ministers; all their Carriages to pass in single Rank, and no other Carriage whatever to be admitted.

It being understood that their Majesties and the Royal Family will enter the Church at the West Door, their Carriages are to drive in at the West Gate of the Church-Yard, put down at the Bottom of the Steps, draw off to the North Side of the Church, and there wait until Divine Service is over; then return to the Bottom of the Steps, to take up.

It is recommended that the Carriages of the Members of both Houses of Parliament, and of the Foreign Ministers, put down at the South-West Gate of the Church-Yard; and that they order their Servants to proceed with their Carriages on the South Side of the Church-Yard, Eastward, through Watling-Street and Budge-Row; to turn up Walbrook, pass the West Side of the Mansion-House, and return through the Poultry into Cheapside; and to remain on the South Side of Cheapside, in Three Rows, with the Horses towards the Church, until called for.

North Avenue for the Nobility (not in Parliament) and other Persons from the West End of the Town.

That the Nobility, Gentry, and others, coming into Holborn from the West End of the Town, be requested to proceed along Snow-Hill and Newgate-Street; turn to the Right down Warwick-Lane, and then to the Left along Paternoster-Row, and be set down at Canon-Alley, opposite the North Door of the Church; then to order their Servants to proceed with their Carriages to the End of Paternoster-Row, and turn round to the Left into Newgate-Street, then down St. Martin's-le-Grand into Aldersgate-Street (keeping the Left Side of the Street) to Long-Lane, and return on the Right; there to remain in a double Row, with the Horses towards Newgate-Street, until Divine Service is ended, and then to return the same Way to take up.

Eastern Avenue for the Corporation.

That the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs and Four Gentlemen of the Common Council, deputed to represent the Corporation, proceed from the Mansion-House rather before Nine o'Clock, through Cheapside, round the South Side of St. Paul's Church Yard, and up Fleet-Street to Temple-Bar; put down at Messrs. Child and Company's; then direct their Carriages to turn short about (within Temple-Bar, if possible,) and follow each other down Fleet-Street round St. Paul's Church Yard, and along Cheapside, turn to the Left down King-Street, and wait in Guildhall-Yard till called for.

That the Aldermen and City Officers immediately follow the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs and Deputation to the South Side of St. Paul's Church Yard, set down at the South Door of the Church, and order their Carriages to turn short about, and return the same Way they came to the Top of King-Street, then turning down King-Street into Guildhall-Yard, continue there till called for.

That the Members of the Court of Common Council, and their Ladies, do proceed to the North Door of the Church, along the South Side of Cheap-

side,

side, set down at the North-East Corner of St. Paul's Church-Yard; go along the North Side of the Church-Yard, and enter the Cathedral at the North Door, and direct their Carriages to go down Foster-Lane to Finsbury-Square; and wait there till wanted.

That the Deputation of the Court of Lieutenancy of this City do proceed from Guildhall in Carriages, along the South Side of Cheap-side, set down at the North-East Corner of St. Paul's Church-Yard, go along the North Side of the Church-Yard, and enter the Cathedral at the North Door, and direct their Carriages to go down Foster-Lane to Finsbury-Square, and wait there till wanted.

That Direction Boards be fixed up, and Constables, &c. placed at all the Turnings where necessary, to prevent the Coachmen mistaking their Lines.

Hours of Admission.

That it be recommended

To the Minor Canons and their Friends, to enter the Church at the Dean's Gate, by Eight o'Clock at the latest.

To the Deputation of the Court of Lieutenancy to be in the Church by Eight o'Clock at the latest.

To the Members of the Court of Common-Council, and their Ladies, to be in the Church by Eight o'Clock at the latest.

To the Aldermen and their Ladies to be in the Church by Nine o'Clock at the latest.

To the Foreign Ministers to be in the Church rather before Nine o'Clock, in order that their Carriage may not break into or interfere with the Procession of the Members of the Houses of Parliament and the Royal Family.

To the Members of both Houses of Parliament to be in the Church before Ten o'Clock, that their Majesties and the Royal Family may not be stopped or impeded in going to the Church.

General Directions.

That in order to keep the Avenues to and from the Church as clear and open as possible, Posts with Bars be fixed at the Entrance of all the Streets and Passages on the North and South Sides of Fleet-Street, Ludgate-Hill, Ludgate-Street, St. Paul's Church-Yard, Watling-Street, Budge-Row, the Poultry, Cheap-side, Newgate-Street, Show-Hill, Holborn up to the Bars, and Paternoster-Row, and at the Entrance of all the Streets and Passages on the East and West Sides of Walbrook, King-Street, St. Martin's-le-Grand, and Aldersgate-Street, as far Northward as the Corner of Barbican.

That Posts and Rails be fixed from the South-East Corner of Paternoster-Row, rounding to the North-Side of Newgate-Street; from the North-East Corner of Dowgate-Hill cross Cannon-Street to the South-East Corner of Walbrook; and from the North-East Corner of the Mansion House cross the Street to the South-West Corner of Prince's-Street; and from the South-West Corner of Barbican, cross Aldersgate-Street to the South-East Corner of Long-Lane; and from the North-East Corner of Warwick-Lane cross Newgate-Street: And that at the Ends of all other Streets and Passages communicating with the Lines of the different Processions Posts and Rails be fixed in like Manner.

That all the said Posts, Rails and Bars be fixed by Two of the Clock in the Morning, and con-

tinued until the whole Company shall have left the Church; and that no Coach or other Carriage, (except those belonging to the Persons above-mentioned) be suffered to remain in any Street or Passage within the Extent of such Posts and Bars on any Pretence whatever.

That where Two or more Lines of Carriages coming from different Streets, in order to proceed towards the Church, are to fall into One Line, Constables and other proper Persons be stationed, who shall direct the several Lines to advance alternately, One Carriage from each, into the single Line; and shall immediately take into Custody any Coachman or other Person who shall resist or disobey such Orders as may be given for the Observance of this Regulation.

That all Carriages in the North-West Avenue shall advance in a single Line from Holborn-Bars; and that all Carriages in the Eastern Avenue shall advance in a single Line from the Mansion-House.

That Constables and other proper Persons be placed to secure all the Bars, Posts and Rails in every Passage where they shall be fixed.

That Constables and other proper Persons be placed to keep clear and uninterrupted the Footway from the North-West Avenue through Canon-Alley; and the Footway from the Eastern Avenue along the Church-Yard to the Church.

That no Hackney Coach be permitted, on any Pretence whatsoever, to be drawn within those Parts of the City to be inclosed with Posts and Rails; and that the Commissioners for Hackney Coaches be requested to take away the Licence from every Coachman who shall attempt the Breach of this Regulation.

Ordered, That a Copy of the said Resolution be transmitted to the Postmaster-General, on Account of the Mail Coaches.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be signed by the Town Clerk, and published in all the Newspapers; and that a sufficient Number of Copies thereof be also printed, and affixed in all publick Places within this City and Liberties.

Ordered, That Mr. Dance, the Clerk of this City's Works, do cause Posts, Bars, and Rails to be fixed and continued in the several Places therein mentioned, and at such other Places as shall appear to be necessary for the Purposes of the said Resolution.

Ordered, That the Two Marshals of this City do provide such a Number of Constables as the Lord Mayor shall direct, and station them in such Manner as shall effectually carry the said Resolution into Execution.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For giving Currency to a New Coinage of Seven Shilling Gold Pieces.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit to order, that certain Pieces of Gold Money should be coined, which should be called "Seven Shilling Pieces,"

Pieces," each of which should be of the Value of Seven Shillings, and Three of which should be of the Value of One Guinea; and that each Piece should be of the Weight of 1 Pennyweight 19 Grains $\frac{460}{10000}$ Troy Weight, of Standard Gold, being One Third of the Weight of a Guinea; and that Three of such Pieces should be of the Weight of 5 Pennyweights 9 Grains $\frac{4382}{10000}$ Troy Weight, of Standard Gold, being the Weight of a Guinea, according to the Weights approved and confirmed by Us in Our Council, in pursuance of an Act made in the Fourteenth Year of Our Reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating and ascertaining the Weights to be made Use of in weighing the Gold and Silver Coin of this Kingdom." And We have further thought fit to order, that every such Piece of Gold Money, so ordered to be coined as aforesaid, should have, on one Side thereof, Our Effigies or Portraiture, with Our Name, and the Words Dei Gratia, and on the Reverse, the Regal Crown of England, with the following Legend, Mag. Bri. Fr. Et Hib. Rex. And whereas Pieces of Gold Money of the above Description have been coined at Our Tower of London, and will be coined there, in pursuance of Orders which we have given for that Purpose, We have therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby ordain, declare and command, that the said Pieces of Gold Money so coined and to be coined as aforesaid, shall be current and lawful Money of Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall be called Seven Shilling Pieces, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful Money of Our said Kingdom; and every of such Pieces shall pass and be received as of the Value of Seven Shillings of Our lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, and Three of such Pieces shall pass and be received as of the Value of One Guinea of Our lawful Money of Our said Kingdom, in all Payments whatsoever.

Given at Our Court at St. James's the Twentyninth Day of November, One thousand seven hundred and nine-seven, in the Thirty-eighth Year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 7th Day of June last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 7th Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to com-

mence from the 7th Day of this instant December, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties, inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 7th Day of June last, prohibiting the Transportation into any Parts out of this Kingdom any of the Wood called Lignum-Vitæ, will expire upon the 10th Day of this instant December: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 10th Day of this instant December, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry or convey, or lade or lay on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum-Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorizing His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provisions relative

"relative thereto." But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board any of the said Wood called Lignum-Vitæ which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, nor to prevent the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum-Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Wood called Lignum-Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Wood called Lignum-Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Wood called Lignum-Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Wood called Lignum-Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was entered Outwards.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *W. Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Gentlemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Naírn, beg Leave humbly to approach your Throne, and to renew our Professions of Loyalty and Attachment to your sacred Person, and Veneration of that happy Constitution which has been the Pride and Security of our Ancestors.

We have seen, with a Mixture of Regret and Indignation, the reasonable Overtures made by your Majesty for restoring Peace to these Realms rejected by our hostile and implacable Foe; that Openness and Moderation have been met by unexampled Evasion, Subterfuge and Duplicity; and that the Designs, and now the Language of our Enemies, have been inimical to the Existence of our Liberties, and the Government and Constitution of the Country.

Animated with the same Spirit which at this momentous Crisis seems to pervade every Description of your Majesty's Subjects, and fully impressed with the baneful Effects of French Fraternity, we consider it a Duty which we owe to God, ourselves and our Posterity, to repel and defeat their hostile Intentions, by Unanimity, Courage and Perseverance in the arduous Contest; and relying upon the Blessing of Divine Providence, the Justice of the Cause, and Strength and Resource of the Country, we are determined

I Have the Honor to acquaint you, that, after delivering your Dispatches to the Governor of Demerary, and Captain Manwaring of the Babet, on the 1st Instant, we immediately, in pursuance of your Orders, made Sail for Barbadoes, and at Day-Light on the 4th, that Island then bearing West Five or Six Leagues, we observed a Schooner on our Quarter making Sail after an American Brig to Leeward; we continued our Course, but she discovering us to be an Armed Vessel, hauled her Wind to the Northward, as we did in Chace of her; and at Nine A. M. brought her to a close Action of Fifty Minutes, when she struck, proving to be L'Epicharis French Privateer, mounting 8 Carriage Guns, and having on Board 74 Men, belonging to Guadaloupe.

It is with Regret I add, that this was not accomplished without the Loss of an excellent Seaman, and Four others wounded, One I fear mortally. The Loss of the Enemy, I have Reasons to think, was great, as on our taking Possession of her Four Men were found laying dead on her Deck, and Twelve severely wounded.

The Muster Roll of the Privateer being lost, and the Captain's Account not agreeing with the Number found, I have mentioned 74, as the Number actually counted by us when she struck.
