Acts agreed upon by both Houfes, do defire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable Houfe in the Houfe of Peers, to bear the Commiffion read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commiffion, impowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An Act for raising a certain Sum of Money by Loans or Exchequer Bills for the Service of the Year One thousand feven hundred and ninety-eight.

An Act to revive and continue, until the Firft Day of March, One thousand feven hundred and ninety-eight, an Act, passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Thirty-fixth and Thirty-feventh Years of His present Majesty, Chapter One hundred and two, videlicet, on the Nineteenth Day of Juiy, One thousand feven hundred and ninety-feven, for granting to His Majesty additional Duties on Distilleries in the feveral Parts of the Highlands of Scotland therein particularly described, for a limited Time; and for regulating the Duties on Distilleries in the respective Districts in Scotland.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majefly's Marine Forces while on Shore, to continue until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and nincty-nine.

An Act to continue, until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Seffion of Parliament, fo much of an Act, pafied in the Seffion of Parliament of the Thirty-fixth and Thirtyfeventh Years of His prefent Majefty, Chapter Seven, videlicct, on the Eleventh of November, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-fix, as relates to the Exportation and carrying Coaftwife of Wheat and Rye, and to the Importation of feveral Articles of Provision.

An Act to continue, until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Seffion of Patliament, an Act, passed in the Thirty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, Chapter Fifteen, videlicet, on the Sixteenth Day of March, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-five ; and alfo an Act paffed in the fame Year, Chapter Eighty, videlicet, on the Twenty-fecond Day of May, One thousand feven hundred and ninety-five; and also another AS, paffed in the Thirty-fixth Year of His prefent Majefty, Chapter Seventy-fix, videlicet, on the Four-teenth Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-fix, relating to the Admission of certain Articles of Merchandize in Neutral Ships, and the ifluing of Orders in Council for that Purpole; and to continue, for the fame Period, an Act, paffed in the Selfion of Parliament holden in the Thirty-fixth and Thirty-feventh Years of His prefent Majefty, Chapter Twenty-one, videlicet, on the Twentyeighth Day of December, One thousand feven hundred and ninety-fix, authorizing His Majetty to make Regulations respecting the Trade and Commerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope.

An Act to indemnify fuch Perfons as have omitted to qualify themfelves for Offices and Employments, and to indemnify Juffices of the Peace, or others, who have omitted to register or deliver in their Qualifications within the Time directed by Law, and for extending the Time limited for those Purposes until the Twenty-fifth Day of December, One thoufand seven hundred and ninety-eight; to indemnify

Members and Officers in Citics, Corporations and Borough Towns, whole Admissions have been omitted to be stamped according to Law, or, having been stamped, have been lost or mislaid, and for allowing them until the Twenty-fifth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, to provide Admissions duly stamped ; to permit fuch Perfons as have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to Attornies and Solicitors, to make and file the fame on or before the First Day of Michaelmas Term One thousand feven hundred and ninety-eight; and for indemnifying Deputy Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia, who have neglected to transmit Descriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace, within the Time directed by Law, and for extending the Time limited for that Purpole until the First Day of September One thousand feven hundred and ninety-eight.

An Act to give further Time for executing, and for enlarging the Powers of an Act, made in the laft Seffion of Parliament, intituled, An Act to raife and embody a Militia Force in that Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland.

An Act to amend an Act, made in the Twentyninth Year of the Reign of His late Majelty King George the Second, intituled, An Act to enable His Majelty to grant Commillions to a certain Number of Foreign Proteitants, who have ferved Abroad as Officers or Engineers, to act and rank as Officers or Engineers in America only, under certain Reftrictions and Qualifications.

An Act to amend Two Acts, made in the Thirtyfirst and Thirty-third Years of the Reign of His prefent Majesty, for taking down and rebuilding the Parish Church of All Saints, within the Town and County of the Town of Southampton.

## Admiralty-Office, December 30, 1797.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Robert Barlow, Commander of His Majejty's Ship Phæbe, to Evan Nepean, Efq; duted in Cawjand Bay the 26th Inftant. S I R,

BE pleafed to inform their Lordships, that on the 2tft Inflant, at Ten A. M. being with His Majefty's Ship under my Command in Lat. 48 deg. 30 min. North, Long. 10 deg. Weft, we difcovered one of the Enemy's Frigates, which, about Nine o'Clock the fame Evening, we had the good Fortune to come up with and capture, after an Action which lafted upwards of Two Hours.

To account to their Lordships for it's continuing fo long, it will be necessary to trouble them with fome Detail.

The Difference in Point of Sailing between the Two Ships being inconfiderable, fhe damaged our Mails, Sails and Rigging very much with her Stern Chace Guns, and at the Moment when we were nearly in a Situation to commence our Attack, the put in Stays, the Phoebe being at this Time under a Crowd of Sail; and as, from the Darkness of the Night, the Enemy's Disposition for tacking could not be discovered, a few Minutes necessarily elapsed before we could tack to follow her, after exchanging Broadfides on paifing. This Manœuvre encreased our Distance, and subjected us a second Time to the Fire of her Stern Chace, with which they were but too fuccelsful in cutting up our Sails and Rigging. At length, about Ten o'Clock, we got fairly along-"fide

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
