Acts agreed upon by both Hotjes, do defire the immediate Altendance of this Honourable Houfe in the Houfe of Peers, to bear the Commiffon read; and the Commons being come thither, the 'fiad Commifion, impowering the Lord Archbinop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was readaccordingly, and the Royal Afient given to
An Act for raifing a-certain Sum of Money by Loans or Exchequer Bjlls' for the Service of the Year One thouland feven hưndred and ninety-eight.
An Act to revive and continue, until the Firt Day of March, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-eight, an Act, paffed in the Seffion of Parliament holden in the Thirty-fixth and Thirty-feventh Years of His prefent Majefty, Chapter One hundred and (wo, videlicet, on the Nineteenth Day of Juiy, One thoufand feven hundred and ninery-feven, for granting to His Majefty additional Duties on Dintilleries in the feveral Parts of the Highlands of Scotland therein particularly deferibed, for a limited Time; and for regulating the Duties on Diftilleries in the refpective Diftritts in Scotland.

An Aet for the Regulation of His Majefy's Marine Forces while on shore, to continue until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thoufand feven hundred and nincty-nine.

An Adit to continue, until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Conmencement of the next Seffion of Pariament, fo much of an Act, pafied in the Seffion of Parliament of the Thirty-fixth and Thiryfeventh Years of Hhs prelent Majefy, ChapterSeven, videlicct, on the. Eieventh of November, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-fix, as relates to the Exportation and cairying Coathife of "Wheat and Rye, and to the Importation of feveral Articles of Provifion.

An Act to continue, until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Seffion of Pafliament, an AEt, pafled in the Thirty-fifth Year of His prefent Majefty, Chapter Fifteen, videlict, on the Sixteenth Day of March, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-five; and alfo an Act paded in the fame Year, Chapter Eighty, videlicet, on the Twenty-fecond Day of May, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-five ; and alfo another Ait, paffed in the Thirty-fixth Ycar of His preferit Majefty, Chapter Seventy-fix, videlicet, on the Fourteenth Day of May, One thoufand feven hundred ànd ninety.fix, relating to the Admifion of certain Arrieles of Merchandize in Neutral Ships, and the ifining of O:ders in Council for that Parpofe; and to continue, for the fame Period, an Act, paffed in the Seflion of Parliament holdea in the Thiry-fixth and Thirty-feventh Year; of Hi prefent Majelty, Chapter Twenty-one, videlicet, on the Twentyeighth Day of December, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-fix, antiorizing His Majetty to make Regulations refpeting the Trade and Conimerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope.

Members and Officers in Citics, Corporations and Borough Towns, whofe Admifions have been omitted to be flamped according to Law, or, having beers ftamped, have been lott or miflaid, and for allowing them until the Twenty-fifth Day of December, One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-eight, to provide Admifions duly ftamped; to permit fuch Perfons as have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to Atrornies and Solicitors, to make and file the fame on or before the Firft Day of Michaelmas Term One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-eight; and for indemnifying Deputy Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia, who have neglected to tranfmit Defcriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace, within the Time directed by Law, and for extending the Time limited for that Purpofe until the Firft Day of September One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-eight.

An Act to give further Time for executing, and for enlarging the Powers of an Act, made in the laft Seffion of Parliament, intituled, An Att to raife and embody a Militia Force in that Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland.

An:AEt to amend an ACt, made in the Twentyninth Year of the Reign of His lite Majelty King George the Second, intituled, An AGt to enable His Majetty to grant Committions to a certain Number of Foreign Proteltants, who have ferved Abroad as Officers or Engineers, to act and rank as Officers or Engineers in America only, under certain Reftrictions and Qualifications.

An Aet to amend Two Acts, made in the Thirtyfirt and Thiscy-third Years of the Reign of His pre. fent Majelty, for taking down and rebuilding the Parifh Church of Ali Saints, within the Town and. County of the Town of Southampton.

Copy of a Letter from Capiain Robert Barlow, Commander of His Majefty's Sbip Pbabe, to Evan Nepean, E/q; dute.t int Curw/and Bay the 25th Inftant.
SIR,

B$3^{E}$ pleafed to inform their Lordhips, that on the 2 it Intant, at Ten A. M. being with His Majefty's Ship under my Command in Lat. $4^{8}$ deg. 30 min . North, Long. 10 deg . Weft, we difcovered one of the Enemy's. Frigates, which, about Nine o'Clock the fame Evening, we had the good Fortune to come up with and capture, after an Action which hated upwards of Two Hours.

To account to their Lordfiips for it's continaing fo long, it will be neceflary to trouble them with fome Detail.

The Diffarence in Point of Sailing between the Two Ships being inconfiderable, fhe damaged our Matts, Sails and Rigging very much with her Stern Chace Guns, and at the Moment when we were nearly in a Situation to commence our Attack, ihe put in Stays, the Phobe being at this Time under a Crowd of Sail; and as, from the Darknefs of the Night, the Enemy's Difpofition for tacking could not be difcovered, a few Minutes neceffarily elapled before we could tack to follow her, after exchanging Broadfides on paifing. This Manowirre encreafed our Diftance, and fubjected us a fecond Time to the Fire of her Stern Chace, with which they were but too fucceffful in custing up our Sails and Rigging. At lengh, about Ten o'Clock, we got fainly along.
