From my First Lieutenant, Halliday, I experienced call the Support which I with Confidence expected from fo gallant and skilful an Officer, which, amidit the Difficulties to be contended with in a Night Action, was an incalculable Advantage ; and the Lieutenants Holland and Vaillant, Lieutenant Stewart, of the Marines, and Mr. Cole, the Master, were no lefs active and diffinguished at their feveral Stations. : Our Lofs, in Killed and Wounded, is 1 Seaman, 2 Marines, killed; 5 Seamen, 5 Marines, wounded: That of the Enemy amounts to 20 Men killed and 55 Men wounded.

I Inclose, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter from Captain Sotheron, of Hls Majesty's Ship the Latona, giving an Account of his having taken Two French Privateers, L'Aigle and L'Intrepide.

. My Lord,

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that His Majesty's Ship Latona, under my Command, captured, on the 29th Ultimo, in Latitude 39 deg. 24 min. N. Longitude 16 deg. W. Lifbon bearing E. by S. diftant 107 Leagues, L'Aigle, a French Privateer Schooner belonging to Bourdeaux, pierced for 14, mounting 12 small Carriage Guns, with 62 Men, commanded by Fran. Harimendy. She failed from Le Passaye, near Bayonne, on the 6th of last Month, had not taken any Thing.

I have also the Pleasure to inform your Lordship, the Latona captured, on the 3d Inftant, in Latitude 30 deg. 45 min. N. Longitude 11 deg. 33 min. W. Lifbon bearing E. S. E. diftant 40 Leagues, L'In-trepide, a French Corvette Brig, fitted out from Nantes as a Privateer, pierced for 18 Guns, carried 12 Six-Pounders, 2 Eighteen-Pound Carronades, and 1 long Brais Twelve-Pound Gun. She threw all of them overboard during the Chace, except the Brafs Gun, and r Six-Pounder, which the kept as Stern Chacers, and fired without Effect until we got nearly alongfide of her. She had 83 Men on Board, was commanded by Monf. Jean Candeau; had taken lawfully begotten,

One more fplendid and decifive does not grace the Annals of the Hiftory of Great Britain.

We acknowledge with grateful Hearts your Majefty's paternal Care in your repeated Endeavours to procure for your Subjects the Bleflings of a fafe and an honourable Peace, while we feel with Indignation the Infolence of Foes who feem to treat as a conquered People this great and powerful Nation, by rejecting the most moderate Propositions, and hold-ing out Terms little short of unconditional Sub-mission. The Infult offered to your Majesty's Ambaffador we feel as an Infult offered to your whole People.
