7E, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, for the Maintenance of the Independence of Our Crown, for the Defence and Protection of the Commerce, and of the Rights and Liberties, Civil and Religious, of Our Subjects, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God, that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Wednesday the Seventh Day of March next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and may, in the most devout and folemn Manner, fend up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most juttly deferved; and imploring His Bleffing and Affiftance on Our Arms, and for reitoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Faft be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of fuch Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as

contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship; and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

Pravers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for arriving from the Town or Port of Gibraltar, pro-Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and imploring His Blesling and Assistance on Our Arms, and for reftoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, that the faid Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Fa your of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of fuch Punishment as We may jufly inflict on all fuch as contemn and neglect the Performance of to religious and necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation feen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Crofs of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the feveral Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to fee the fame published: And We appoint them to fend Copies hereof to the feveral Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned the fame may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. 7HEREAS His Majesty hath received Information, that the Plague has broken out in the Island of Corfica, in consequence of Communication with a Veffel from Barbary, and that many Vessels had left Corfica on the Alarm, and even some from the very Port where the infected Veffel came in, and where the Infection raged; and that some of these Vessels are probably bound through the Straits of Gibraltar: His Majesty this Day took the fame into Confideration, and although it appeared, that a Quarantine of Forty Days is at this Time fubfifting, by Orders of this Board, upon all Ships coming from or through the Mediterranean, except those coming directly from any of the Ports of the Kingdom of Spain within the Mediterranean, or from the Island of Minorca, laden with the Products of Spain only, and also except Ships and Vessels

averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold vided the Cargo on Board all such Ships or Vessels' do coasist entirely of non-enumerated Articles, (except any Bags, Straw, Matting and Platting on Jars, which were folely made Use of as Package for such non-enumerated Articles) yet His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, judges it necessary upon this Occasion to cause His Orders for the Performance of Quarantine to be enforced and extended: And to that End His Majesty, with the Advice aforefaid, doth hereby order, require and command, that the subfishing Quarantine be strictly enforced, and that all the Officers appointed for the Service of Quarantine do use their utmost Care and Diligence in causing the several Rules and Regulations established for the due Performance of Quarantine to be punctually and strictly observed and carried into Execution. And His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, is further pleafed to order, require and command, that all Ships and Veffels arrived, or that shall arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Islands of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, from any of the Ports of the Kingdom of Spain within the Mediterranean, or from the Island of Minorca, or from the Town or Port of Gibraltar, although the Cargo of fuch Ships shall consist of non-enumerated Articles only, and also all Ships and Vessels arrived, or that shall arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Islands of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, from the Island of Majorca, or from the Island of Corfica and all Goods and Merchandize on Board the fame, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do likewise strictly conform themselves in all Respects to the Rules and Regulations now in Force, and required to be observed by Ships and Vessels subject to Quarantine.—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively apper-W. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHERAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliaffient, intituled, "An Act to authorize His Majesty, for a limited Time, to make Regulations

Regulations respecting the Trade and Commerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope," it is cnacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders to be issued from Time to Time, to give fuch Directions, and make fuch Regulations, touching the Tarde and Commerce to and from the Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, as to His Majesty, in Council, shall appear most expedient and falutary, any of the Acts of Parliament therein referred to, or any Ulage, Law or Cultom to the contrary notwithstanding: And whereas the faid Act has, by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, been continued for a further limited Time, and is now in Force: And whereas during the Time the faid Settlement, with the Territories and Dependencies thereof, were in the Possession, and under the Government of the States General of the United Provinces, or of the Honourable the General East India Company in the Netherlands, it was usual to admit the Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of Countries in Amity with the faid United Provinces into the Ports of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, for Repair and Refreshment, and with that View to permit the faid Ships and Veffels to earry on Trade with the Inhabitants of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof i His Majesty is hereby pleased to order, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by the above recited Act; and it is hereby ordered, that it shall be lawful until further Order, for all Ships and Vessels belonging to Hfs Majesty's Subjects, as well as for all Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of any Country or State in Amity with His Majesty, to enter into the Ports of the faid Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and to carry on Trade and Traffick with the Inhabitants of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and to import and export, to and from the Ports of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, any Goods, Wares or Merchandize whatfoever, subject to the following Exceptions, and subject also to such Duties, Rules, Regulations and Restrictions, as shall be established by His Majesty, or hy the Governor of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, by Virtue of Authority derived from His Majelly; and in the mean Time, subject to such Duties, Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as subsisted and were in Force before

and at the Time of the Conquett of the faid Settlement by the Arms of His Majesty, with such Alterations as have been since made under the Authority of the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces at the said Settlement: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that no Goods, Wares or Merchandize, which shall be imported into the said Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, shall be subject to any Duty.

And it is His Majefty's Pleafure; that no Goods; Wares or Merchandize; the Growth, Produce or Manufacture of the Countries to the Eastward of the Cape of Good Hope, be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof; except by the United Company of Merchants trading to the East Indies; and that no fuch Goods; Wares or Merchandize be permitted to be exported from them, except for Sea Stores only, or by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or by their Licente.

But it is His Majesty's Pleasure; that nothing in this Order contained, shall extend to prevent Ships or Vessels employed in the Southern Whale Fishery; from carrying on the same, in such and the same Manner as might have been done; if this Order had not been made.

And it is also His Majesty's Pleasure; that no Arms or Artillery, Gunpowder, or Ammunition of any Sort, be allowed to be imported into the said Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except by the said United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or by Licence from His Majesty.

And it is His Majesty's further Pleasure, that the Trade and Commerce to and from the said Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, shall be subject to such of the Laws of Trade and Navigation as would have affected the same, if this Order had not been made, except so far as such Laws are contrary to this present Order.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentieth of July last, prohibiting the transporting into

Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Twenty fifth Day of this instant January: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Sasety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Twenty-fifth Day of this instant January, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or ship or lade any of the Articles above mentioned on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first thad and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Na-" val Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exor portation of Salt-Petre, Arms and Ammunition, " when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in " Council." But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats, in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesly's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on Board fuch Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of fuch Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Ex portation of the faid several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa. or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies; provided that, upon the Exportation of any of the laid Articles, for the Purposes of Trade, to Ire- Majesty's Vice-Conful at Gibraltar.

any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar- I land, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up, until Proof be made, to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The King has been pleased to approve of the Appointment of John Ross, Esq; to be his Sicilian Dublin Castle, January 19, 1798.

HE Houses of Lords and Commons having refolved upon humble Addresses to His Ma-julty, the same were this Day presented to the Lord Lieutenant for Transmission; and also Addresses from both Houses to his Excellency, which, with his Excellency's Answers, are as follow:

To his Excellency John Jeffries, Earl Camden, Lord Lieutenant General and General Covernor. of Ireland,

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament affembled.

May it please your Excellency

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to approach your Excellency with unfeigned Thanks for your excellent Speech from the Throne.

We are fenfibly alive to the Confidence His Majesty reposes in his Parliament by convening us at this critical Period, and reforting to us for Advice. His Majesty may rely on our dutiful and affectionate Attachment to his facred Person and Government; and we shall enter upon our Deliberations with a Confidence peculiarly arising from the Experience we have had of the Wisdom and Firmness of your Excellency's Councils. The Tranquillity which attended the late General Election affords the most incontestible Proof, that the wife and firm Meafures adopted by the last Parliament were approved of by the Nation at large; and your Excellency may rest affured, that our Conduct shall be actuated by fimilar Principles in Defence of our happy Constitution.

We have to acknowledge His Majesty's gracious Attention in directing his Royal Declaration, and the Papers relative to the late Negotiation, to be laid before us. We join with your Excellency in regretting that His Majesty's Endeavours to restore the Blessings of Peace have again been frustrated by the desperate Amoition of the Enemy; at the same Time it cannot but prove a Consolation to your Excellency, as it is to us, that His Majesty's Magnanimity and Moderation have been fo eminently dis-played in the Progress of the Negotiation, as to leave no Pretext or Colour for the infidious Statements of the Enemy, and to prove, beyond a Doubt, to all Europe, that no other Alternative is left for His Majesty, than to oppose the Valour of his People to the boundless and extravagant Pretensions of the

We are well convinced the People of Ireland will never fail their Sovereign in a Contest, upon the Issue of which depends their dearest Rights and Liberties. The Valour of His Majesty's Regular and Militia Forces, the active Loyalty of the District Corps, the Prowess of his Fleets, and the Courage of the Nation, animated by a Sense of Duty to their God, their Sovereign, and their Country, will oppose an invincible Barrier to every hostile Attempt against the Peace and Safety of this Kingdom.

We offer our fincere and heartfelt Congratulations to your Excellency upon the late fignal and brilliant Victory, gained by Admiral Lord Duncan over the Dutch Fleet, which has added fresh Lustre to the Glory of His Majesty's Navy, and given new Strength

and Safety to His Majesty's Dominions.

It affords us the greatest Satisfaction to learn, that the vigorous Measures adopted by your Excellency, in confequence of the Addresses of the Houses of Lords and Commons in May last, have, in the Northern Parts of the Kingdom, been productive of the happiest Effects, in repressing Disaffection, and in restoring Security and Considence to the Well disposed. The Return of Subordination and Industry in that Quarter is the strongest Proof that these Vigorous Measures were conceived and executed with equal Wisdom.

We learn, with a Mixture of Indiguation and Horror, that the Leaders of the Disaffected have attempted to make the Midland and Southern Districts the Scenes of Enormities and Outrage, by employing Emissaries to deceive and corrupt the People, and by the Circulation of Publications calculated to revive Religious Animosities, and to excite the lower Classes, under the Prospects of Plunder, to commit Acts of the most horrid Violence and Barbarity. It is to be lamented that the Exertions of the Magiftrates, aided by the Troops, have not as yet been able entirely to put a Stop to those Disturbances, but we rely that the same constant Vigilance and unremitting Exertions, which have proved fuccessful in restoring Peace to other Parts of the Kingdom, will equally in these Districts prove a Protection to the Loyal and Well-disposed, and ultimately rescue the Misguided and Misled from the Influence of those wicked and designing Men, who, by a systematic Plan of Assassination, have endeavoured to impede and prevent the Administration of Public Justice, and to excite the People to Rebellion and Revolt.

We shall continue our accustomed Attention to the Commerce, the Agriculture and Manufactures of the Country, and shall not fail to make a suitable Provision for the Protestant Charter Schools and other

charitable Institutions.

The Declaration of His Majesty, that, in the prefent arduous Contest, he will stand or fall with his faithful People, must fill the Hearts of every loyal Subject with Sentiments of enthusiastic Veneration and Gratitude to their King for a Pledge so generous and affecting. His Majesty may be assured, that our Determination is equally decided to devote our Lives and Fortunes to the Defence of His Majesty's facred Person and our invaluable Constitution, and to stand or fall with our Sovereign in a Contest, which we are bound to prosecute, for the Maintenance of our Religion, and for the Preservation of the Independence, Laws and Liberties of the Kingdom.

Deeply feeling the great and important Interests for which we contend, and calling to Mind the arduous Task we have to perform, it is an inexpresfible Satisfaction and Relief to our Minds to find the Chief Government of Ireland committed to a Nobleman fo eminently qualified as your Excellency to conduct the Country through it's present Dissicuties. The Vigilance and Firmness your Excellency has displayed, added to the high Respect entertained for your Excellency's private Character and public Talents, has caused every Class and Description of the People, really attached to the Constitution, to confider your Excellency's Continuance in the exalted Station you now fill, as effectially con-nected with the Peace and Security of Ireland, and

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with the Maintenance of our happy Constitution in Church and State. We trust we shall long remain under your Excellency's auspicious Protection, and we look forward with Considence, through a steady Perseverance and the Favour of Divine Providence, that the present Contest may be brought to an happy Termination.

The generous and endearing Confidence which His Majesty reposes in the Spirit of his People of Ireland will, we are fully persuaded, be justified by the most convincing Proofs, that they are actuated by the same ardent Sense of Duty to their God, Loyalty to their Sovereign, and Attachment to their Country, which has in former Times carried this Nation through so many Perils and Dissiputives; and His Majesty's Expressions of implicit Reliance on the Valour of his Regular and Militia Forces, the active Loyalty of the District Corps, the Courage of the Nation, and the Prowess of his Fleets and Armies, must redouble that Zeal, extend that Insuence, and increase those personal Exertions, which are so essential to the Protection and Security of the Country.

We offer to your Excellency our most sincere and heartfelt Congratulations, on the late signal and distinguished Victory obtained over the Dutch Squadron by Admiral Lord Duncan, which has added new Splendor to the Glory of His Majesty's Navy, and which is a fresh and animating Instance of that Skill and Intrepidity which have so often enabled our Ancestors to defend their own Rights and Liberties, and those of other States, against the united Efforts of the most powerful and dangerous Confederacies.

Every Motive and every Interest that can influence the Hearts of Loyal Subjects, call on His Majesty, saithful Commons to grant such Supplies as the Exigency of the Affairs of the Empire may require; and being fully convinced that the Security of every Benefit and Advantage we enjoy, is involved in the present Contest, we should be wanting in the Duty we owe to our Constituents, to ourselves, and to our Posserity, if we did not engage, with our Lives and Fortunes to support this awful and important Cause. We shall therefore cheerfully make such Provision as may be necessary for this great Purpose, firmly relying on your Excellency's Wissom and Justice, that it will be applied in such Manner as will be most effectually adapted to the Ends which it is intended to answer, and with the utmost Economy that the Extent and Nature of the Service will allow.

We learn, with the greatest Satisfaction, that the prompt and vigorous Meafures which your Excellency adopted, in consequence of the Addresses of the Houses of Lords and Commons in May last, for repressing Disastection in the Northern Parts of this Kingdom, and for restoring Security and Confidence to the loyal and well-disposed, have effected the Re-establishment of Subordination and Industry in that Quarter. We feel the utmost Abhorrence and Indignation at those seditious Leaders, who. by their infidious Practices have deluded our Fellow-Subjects in some Parts of the Midland and Southern Districts, into a Conduct no less subversive of their own Happiness and real Interests than injurious to the Prosperity and Safety of their Country. We cannot hear, without the deepest Regret, that Emissaries have been employed, and that Publications have been circulated by them, to revive religious Animolities, and to open Prospects of Plunder, and that the lower Classes have been by these Means excited to commit Acts of the most horrid Outrage

and Barbarity. We participate in your Excellency's Concern, that the Diligence and Activity of the Magistrates, though affilied by the Troops which have been ordered into that Part of the Kingdom, have not yet been able entirely to suppress those Disturbances. We agree with the Opinion expressed by your Exeellency, that unremitting Exertions continue to be necessary, when all Means are employed to excite the People to Rebellion and Revolt, when a fystematic Plan of Assailination is adopted and encouraged, and when the most audacious Attempts are made to impede and prevent the Administration of Justice; and we beg Leave to asfure your Excellency, of our zealous Concurrence in such just and necessary Measures as may be best calculated to repress this daring Spirit of Disobedience, and enforce a due Submission to the Laws.

We humbly thank your Excellency for the Regard which your Excellency has evinced for the Interest of this Country, in recommending to our Consideration its Commerce, its Agriculture, and its Manufactures, and especially that of the Linen; we shall not fail to direct our Attention to these great Objects of National Prosperity; and we shall not omit to extend that Protection to the Charter Schools, and the other Charitable Institutions, under

which they have so long stourished.

We acknowledge, with the liveliest Sentiments of Duty and Gratitude, the affecting Declaration of our most gracious Sovereign, that his firm Resolution is taken in the present arduous Contest, he will not be wanting to his People, but with them will stand or fall in the Defence of their Religion, and in the Preservation of the Independence, Laws and Liberties of his Kingdom. These animating Words kindle in us Emotions of the most enthusiastic Veneration, Loyalty and Attachment to the facred Person of His Majesty. Our Decision is also made; we will not fail in Fidelity and Allegiance to our King; and it is our fixed and inviolable Determination, with our Lives and Properties, to co-operate with your Excellency, in maintaining the Honour of His Majesty's Crown, and in afferting and defending the Religion, Rights, Liberties and Independence of this Kingdom.
