WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, for the Maintenance of the Independence of Our Crown, for the Defence and Protection of the Commerce, and of the Rights and Liberties, Civil and Religious, of Our Subjects, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God, that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a Publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, on Wednesday the Seventh Day of March next; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgements which Our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved; and imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to Us and Our Kingdoms: And We do strictly charge and command, That the said Publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England, Our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so religious and necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be read in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick

Worship; and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

Our Will is therefore, and We charge,

that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewards of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We appoint them to send Copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

THE following Addresses have been presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's loyal Subjects, the Gentlemen, Clergy, Merchants, Manufacturers and other Inhabitants of the Town and Neighbourhood of Manchester, humbly presume to approach your Majesty's Person with the most grateful Impressions for that paternal Care which has uniformly distinguished your Majesty's Reign, and was so particularly exemplified in the late gracious Communication of the desperate Project, conceived by an unexampled Foe, to invade this favoured Country.

At a Period so momentous, we feel ourselves called upon to express, in a public Manner, our decided Approbation of those Efforts which, under your Majesty's Direction, were recently exerted to restore the Blessings of Peace upon an honourable and permanent Basis. We are convinced that nothing but the rooted Animosity of an implacable Enemy impeded

the Negotiation, and so abruptly rejected the pacific Overtures on the Part of Great Britain.

The various and now unprecedented Views of the Persons exercising Dominion in France, to annihilate the Commerce of this Kingdom, as well as its Government, clearly evince their determined Hatred to the Welfare of all your Majesty's Subjects, and cannot fail to excite in the latter decisive Sentiments of national and individual Energy.

Sensible as we are of our Dependence upon the Freedom of Trade, we cannot hesitate to embrace this Opportunity of declaring our most cordial Assent to the late legislative Provisions for raising a Proportion of the Supplies within the Year; a Mode calculated not only to protect our Trade, but to convince the Enemy of our Ability to withstand every hostile Attempt.

And may we, at this important Juncture, be permitted to repeat the former Assurances of our fixed and unalterable Determination to defend, to the last Moment of our Existence, the Constitution, the Laws and the Liberties of Britons.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Assistants of the Borough of Leeds, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with the most unfeigned Assurances of our sincere Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person, Family and Government.

At a Time when our inveterate Enemy is avowedly employed in Preparations to invade our Land, destroy our Commerce, and enslave our Persons, we feel it to be our indispensable Duty, to offer to your Majesty our fixed Determination, in Conjunction with the rest of our Fellow Subjects, to repel the tyrannical Efforts of our Enemies by the most vigorous Means in our Power.

And that your Majesty may have ample Supplies to provide for the effectual Protection and Safety of these Kingdoms, we humbly beg Leave to suggest our deliberate Opinion, that the Finances of the Government ought to be strengthened at this important Crisis by such a legal, but general Contribution, out of the annual Income of all Property, Real and Personal, by a rateable Proportion, as may be fully adequate (under the Blessing of Divine Providence) to defeat all the Machinations of our Foes, and induce them to consent, at length, to terminate the Calamities of the War, and conclude a Peace upon reasonable Terms.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Inhabitants of the Town and Neighbourhood of Leeds, beg Leave at this Time, when your Majesty hath thought it necessary to communicate to both Houses of Parliament the Intentions of the Enemy

Enemy to invade this Country, to approach your Majesty with Assurances of supporting your Majesty's Government against all your Enemies to the utmost of our Power.

As Commercial Men, we feel ourselves peculiarly called upon to stand forwards, at a Time when an inveterate Enemy tells us, that the Commerce of Great Britain, together with that Navy, upon which our Existence as a Nation so much depends, shall be annihilated.

At a Crisis like the present, when the Preservation of all we hold dear is at Stake, we hope the Legislature will adopt and enforce the wise and salutary Measure of raising the whole Supplies within the Year, as far as such a Measure may be practicable, and repeating the same so long as the Defence of our Country may require it, being heartily willing, on our Parts, to submit to any effectual Plan that will accomplish equal Taxation upon all Real and Personal Property, whatever may be the Inconveniences resulting therefrom to us as Commercial Men.

With the Constitution of our Country, with your Majesty's Government, which is inseparable from that Constitution, we are determined to live or fall; nor shall the Independence of the Nation be forfeited or lost, so long as our Resistance can prevent it.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Inhabitants of the Town and Neighbourhood of Huddersfield, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with our hearty Prayers, that the Blessings of God may rest upon your Royal Person, and to assure your Majesty of our Determination to support, to the utmost of our Ability, your Majesty's Person and Government against all your Enemies.

Struck with Horror at the manifest Inveteracy of your insulting Enemy, and their Ambition in prosecuting such Plans as have an eminent Tendency to subjugate Europe to their uncontrolled Dominion, we, as a Commercial District, feel ourselves, by such Proceedings, particularly called upon to step forwards, to oppose the meditated Ruin of our Navy, and our Commerce, which, under Divine Providence, are the Bulwark and Support of this highly favoured Nation.

At a Crisis so alarming, when we are threatened with a Deprivation of our dearest Civil Privileges, and with the Introduction of Principles destructive of our still more valuable Religious Advantages, we feel solicitous that every necessary Means of Defence may be adopted, and such adequate Supplies raised, as the Exigencies of the State may require; assuring your Majesty, that, however inconvenient it may prove to ourselves, we will cheerfully contribute our equitable Proportion to any Plan which the Wisdom of the Legislature may deem necessary to the public Safety and Welfare.

Depending upon the Protection and Support of the Sovereign Disposer of all Events, we are determined to stand or fall with the Constitution of our Country, and to transmit to Posterity, unimpaired, the distinguishing Blessings we, as a Nation, have the Happiness to possess under your Majesty's mild and paternal Government.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, the Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of your ancient Borough of Doncaster, in the County of York, beg Leave at this Time, when your Majesty has thought it necessary to inform your Parliament that our inveterate Enemy threatens to invade us, for the avowed Purpose of overturning the Government and destroying the Liberty and Independence of our Country, to assure your Majesty that we will, with unshaken Resolution, exert our utmost Endeavours to defend your Royal Person, the Lives and Properties of our Fellow Subjects, the Government and Constitution of our Country, and the Honor and Independence of the British Empire.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Inhabitants of the Town and Parish of Halifax, beg Leave to approach your Majesty, with cordial Assurances of our sincerest and most zealous Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person, Family, and Government.

Personal, and continuing the same so long as may be necessary for the Defence and Security of the Nation.

Not less sensible of the incalculable Value of our Constitution than of the faithful Adherence which your Majesty has invariably manifested to it, and animated by the same Sentiments which your Majesty has lately been pleased to declare to your Parliament and People, we are ready to discharge the Duty we owe to your Majesty, our Country and ourselves, and to stand or fall with your Majesty in Defence of our Religion, and of the Independence, Liberty, Constitution and Commerce of these Kingdoms.

Extract of a Letter from the Right Hon. Lord Bridport, K. B. to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated the 27th of February, 1798.

Herewith you will receive, for their Lordships Information, Copies of Two Letters of the 21st Instant from the Hon. Captain Stopford, of His Majesty's Ship Phaeton, stating the Capture of La Legere French Ship Privateer; also with the Capture of the American Ship Eliza, from Boston to Amsterdam, with a valuable Cargo on Board.

These Letters were transmitted to me by Captain Frazer, of His Majesty's Ship Nymph, who saw the above Vessels into Plymouth in Safety.

Phaeton, at Sea, February 21, 1798.

My Lord,

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that on the 19th Instant, in consequence of the Vigilance of Captain White, in keeping Sight of and making Signals for a Sail in the S. E. in very thick

and squally Weather, I was enabled, in His Majesty's Ship under my Command, to come up with and capture a French Ship Privateer, called La Legere, out Twenty-four Hours from L'Orient, bound to the West Indies, mounting 14 Eight-Pounders and 4 Thirty-two lb. Carronades, and manned with 130 Men. La Legere was built for a Corvette, and has been employed as such until these few Months, when she was fitted for a Privateer, and sails so well, that her Capture would have been considerably delayed, if she had not carried away her Fore and Main Topmasts during the Chace.

IN Addition to my Letter to your Lordship of this Day's Date, I have to inform you, that the Mermaid and Sylph being in Chace in the S. W. have returned with an American Ship from Boston to Amsterdam, that had been taken by a French Privateer. The American Ship (called the Eliza) is originally from Batavia, with a valuable Cargo, and stopped at Boston for fresh Papers, without changing her Cargo. I send the Nymph into Port with the Two captured Vessels.

Copy of a Letter from Robert M'Douall, Esq; Captain of His Majesty's Ship Ganges, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Yarmouth, the 27th of February, 1798.

S I R,

BE pleased to inform the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that the Marquis Cobourg Cutter arrived here this Morning, after an Engagement with La Revanche French Privateer, of 16 Guns and 62 Men, which Vessel sunk soon after she struck, and, greatly to Lieutenant Webb's Honor, he saved the Prisoners, and has brought them in here.

His Majesty's Armed Cutter Cobourg, February 26, 1798.

S I R,

I Have the Honor to inform you, that Yesterday Morning, at Seven o'Clock, having Cromer bearing S. 67 W. distant Sixteen Leagues, we fell in with, and, after Nine Hours Chace, (during which we ran One Hundred Miles, one Half the Time blowing a hard Gale of Wind at W. N. W.) we came up alongside and captured La Revanche French Lugger Privateer, of 16 Guns and 62 Men, after a running Fight of Two Hours, close alongside.

She attempted to board us twice, but being repulsed, and a well-directed Broadside having brought her Main and Mizen Masts by the Board, and shot her Fore Yard away, they called for Quarter.

We had no sooner taken Possession of her, than, with the utmost Difficulty and all the Exertion we possibly could make Use of in getting the Prisoners shifted;

shifted, and our own People back, when she sunk, having received above Forty Shot between Wind and Water. She had 7 Men killed and 8 wounded. I am happy to add, we had only Two Men slightly wounded; the Damage we sustained is mostly in our Masts, Spars, Sails and Rigging. She was a remarkable fine fast-sailing Vessel, had only cruized Six Days, entirely new, fitted out for a Month's Cruise, and the largest Lugger that sailed out of Calais.

I am particularly indebted to Mr. Jeffery, Master, and Mr. Rolf, Mate, for their Attention, Assiduity, and prompt Execution of my Orders, as well as all the Officers and Crew, who deserve the highest Commendation for their Alacrity in knotting, splicing, and shifting Sail in variable Weather and through a Variety of Courses, having been exposed to a sharp and well directed Fire from the Stern Chases and Musquetry for near Two Hours before the Action commenced.

Copy of a Letter from Admiral Peyton, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Downs, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on Board the Overyffel, March 1, 1798.

Enclosed herewith is a Letter I have received from Mr. George Broad, commanding His Majesty's hired armed Lugger Resolution, stating his having Yesterday captured a French Lugger Privateer, mounting 4 Swivels, with 17 Men; and that he afterwards sunk her, she being very leaky.

S I R,

I Beg Leave to acquaint you, at Six A. M. Boulogne bearing E. S. E. Distance about Three Leagues, the Dolphin Armed Cutter in Company, I fell in with and captured after a Chace of Four Hours, Le Pou-Epie French Lugger Privateer, mounting 4 Swivels, besides small Arms, and manned with 17 Men, out Two Days from Dunkirk, but has made no Captures. The Lugger I sunk, she being so very leaky.

Dublin Castle, February 24, 1798.

Thursday last having been appointed for the Celebration of Her Majesty's Birth-Day, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode set to Music was performed.
