Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Kingmill, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the Coast of Ireland, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Cork the 4th Instant.

THE Greyhound captured a Spanish Ship named La Posta de Buenos Ayres, laden with Hides and Tallow, from Monte Video to Bilboa, which stood into the Convoy. She is brought in here by the Magnanime, along with the James of Liverpool, outward bound Guineaman, which having beaten off One French Privateer, had since stood an Action of an Hour and an Half with another, but was captured after losing her Master and Boatswain, who were killed, and had Two Seamen wounded, One of whom is since dead. This Ship was recaptured by the Magnanime on the 28th Ultimo, in Latitude 45 deg. 52 min. Longitude 11 deg. 7 min.
