Lubon, May 2.

HE great subject of discourse here is, the Marriage of the Infanta, who some tell us is to marry with the Dauphin of France, others with the Prince of Tuf. cany, and others again with the Duke of Savoy; thef: last have the most ground for what they fay; for it is certain that there has been some-time an Envoy here from Savoy, who has had frequent and private Conferences with the Ministers, and that feveral Expresses have of late passed backward and forward. The Count d' Estree is suddenly expe-Eted here with a Squadron of French Men of War. Three Ships of this Crown are fitting out here, and the Admiral of *Portugal* will embark on them, and will be accompanied with many of the Grandees, who are providing very rich Equipages; fo that's believed they are to go and fetch the Prince that is to marry the Infanta, who it's expected will be now very juddenly declared. A person of quality, some think it is the the Marcschal de Schomberg is expected herefrom France, and a house is preparing by the Princes order to receive him.

Madrid, May 18. His Majesty continues at Buen Retiro, to take the divertisement of the Scason, while in the mean time all the great Officers are providing very rich Equipages, and other Preparations are making for the Kings Marriage, though we do not yet certainly know who is to be his Queen. The King has given the Government of Messiva to the Sieur de Louvigny, in consideration of his Services during this War, he having had the command of the Troops of the Bishop of Osnabrug. The Prince de Ligne, late Governor of Milan, is every day expected here, to

take his place in the Council of State.

Dantzicke, May 20. It was said that their Majesti s of Poland had once resolved to have come and paffed part of the Summer here, but the Letters we have this day from the Court say, that if the King had any fuch intention he had changed it. being now resolved to spend the time he is absent from Warsaw, at Villanovs. In the month of August 2 great Council will be held at Warfaw, where a final resolution will be taken, in the great matter now depending, with relation to the Alliance between that Crown and the Mo'covites for the carrying on the War against the Turks for it seems the Poles have not as yet actually obliged themselves by any Treaty or other Engagements with the Moscevites, and it's probable they will not till they know the fentiments of the Emperor and other neighbouring Princes, to whom they have therefore fent Ambassadors; and that then they will take their refolutions accord ng to the dispositions they find those Princes, to join i a War against the common Enemy; for the Poles are above all thin, s jealous that if they should ent r into War in conjunction with the Moscovites the y might be left by them in it.

Copenhagen, May 30. Several persons are come hither, who saw the King of Sueden not many days fince at Christianstadt, and affore us he is in very good health. Monfieur de Feuquieres the French Ambasdor at the Court of Sueden has writ a second Letter to the Chancellor of Denmarke, that the King of Sueden had understood with great satisfaction that the Overture made by him of meeting and treating at some proper place in Schonen had been embraced here, and that no time might be loft, he had named the Sieur Fohn Gulden'lerne enator, and the Sieur Foel Ornester to be his Deputies and Plenipotentiaries; hereupon our King has likewife named his, who are Count Anthony of Oldenburg, and the Sieur Bierman Secretary of State; though the Brandenburg Minister here does all he can to hinder this meeting, which he thinks ought not to be, unless his Matter has likewise a Minister there. This morning was fought near this City a Duel on Horseback, between Lieutenant-Colonel Ranzaw, and Lieutenant-Colonel Rachau, the first was killed upon the place, and the other very much wounded. The Envoy of the Elector of Saxony, who came hither to offer the Mediation of his Master, having been told that the King readily accepts it, is passed on for Sueden, to perform in like manuer his Commission at that Court.

Hamburg, Funz 2. The Duke of Mecklenburg, who has had his Residence for some time in this City, going two days since, attended only with his ordinary servants to take the air, was about half a mile off, in the Territories of this City, attacked by three or four Danish Horsemen; but the Duke with his Servants was too hard for them, and brought three of them prisoners hither; who will be proceeded against as Robbers, having been taken within the sursidiction of this City. We know not yet what judgment to make of the affairs of the North, with relation to the Peace, for while one assures us that we may very quickly expect the conclusion of it, others assure that the Conferences which are now going to be

held in Schonen will prove unfuccessful.

Francfort, May 31. From Ratisbonne they write, that the Imperial Commissioner had represented to the Dyet that the Emperor, having parted with Friburg, to procure a Peace which the whole I mpire so carnessly desired, expected a recompence should be made him, and some other place. equivalent to that,, given him by the Empire; the maning of this is thought to be, that the Emperor would have Schlestadt. Colmar, or some other of the ten Towns in Alface left to him, to make an exchange with the French for Friburg. In the mean time the Elector Palatin press the Emperor very hard to demolish Philipsburg, and to cause the Lorrain Troops, who are said to be pass d into the Emperors service, to remove from the quarters they now are in b tween the Mojelle and the Reine, sor that he apprehends the French, who still cok

upon them as the Troops of the Duke of Lorrain, and confequently as Enemies will fall upon them, and make that an occasion to come again into his Electoral Highnesses I erritories, and to waste them.

Cologne, June 2. On Tuesday the Bishop of Strasburg made his first Visit to the Flector of Cologne, who received him in a very abliging manner; and according to all app, arance the said Bishop is already in as great consideration here as ever. The French Troops continue their march towards the Rhine; but we understand that Monsieur Calvo who was marching towards the Country of Ravensberg, has upon the orders he received from Court, stopt his march.

Bruffels, June 6. Yesterday their Royal Highnelles went to divert themselves at Treveuren, three Leagues from hence, and returned again in the evening. By the fail Spanish Ordinary Don Sermiento received a Commission to be Governor of Charlerov. Monsieur de Fue to be Governor of Aeth, and Don Acolla to be Governor of Gaunt. From the Hague we are told, that Don Emanuel de Lyra had giv n in to the States a very preffing Memorial, concerning Maestricht, declaring that if they do not comply with the obligation of their Treaty by putting Maestricht into the hands of the King of Spain, his Majesty will be obliged to do himself right by seizing the Dutch Effects, which shall be brought-home this year by the Calions. The Letters we receive from Liege continue to tell us of the march of the French Troops towards the Rhine, who passio near Maestricht, that they keep the Garison there as it were in a continual alarm.

Amsterdam, fune 6. By a Vessel arrived from Surinam we understand, that that Colony continues to be greatly disturbed by the Indians, and that besid s they had had there very unscasonable weather, which

had caused a want of Provisions.

Hague, June 6. The Ambassador of Sueden, and the Deputies of this State, not having been able in the several meetings they had to remove the diffi-culties that remained in the Treaty of Commerce, the first parted hence yesterday on his return for Nimeguen. The Letters we receive from Germany bring us an account of the death of the Elector of Bavaria, who died suddenly of an Appoplexy the 26th past, having been very well half an hour before; he has lest two Sons and a Daughter, his eldest Son being but 17 years old, the Administration of Affairs will be in the bands of his Unkle Prince Maximilian, till he be out of his minority (which he will be at 18) which it's believed may occasion some change in the Councels of that Court. The Letters from Hamburg inform us, that the two Northern Kings had named their Plenipotentiaries, who were to meet in Schonen, to see if they could agree upon the terms of a Peace.

Falmouth, May 24. Yesterday came into this Port the Elizabeth of this place bound for Newfoundland. The 22 instant the Oake and Defiance Frigats passed by to the Eastward with about 20 Merchant Ships: Inder their Convoy, coming from the Streights. The St. Irancis of London arrived here two days fince from Rochelle bound for Limericke, and the Fane of Gulloway from Havre de Grace, bound for Rochelle; by them we have an account, that the French Men of War that were sitted out at Brest were sailed, as was said, for the Streights, being command-

ed by the Count d'Estree Vice-admiral of France. Il is day we saw two of His Majesties Frigats cruising off of this Port, the Wind at N. W.

Plimouth May 27. On Saturday failed from hence the Defiance Sir Fohn Ernlie Commander, and the Oake Captain Romcoyle, who arrived here two of three days before with several Merchant Ships under their Convoy from the Streights. The same day sailed likewise Captain Haywood in the Norwich, who came from Guinea. And Sir Robert Robinson in the Harwich, Capt. Storey in the York, and Captain Trelawney in the Larke, put to Sea again to cruise.

Desie, May 23. Yesterday arrived in the Donnes, the Desiance and the Oak Frigats, with several Merchant Ships under their Convoy; and this morning came in a Vessel from the Streights, the Master whereof says, that he left Sir Fohn Narborough the 15th instant at Tangier with 15 Frigats under his command bound for England; That the rest of His Majestics Ships in those payts, were to remain there under the command of Vice-admiral Herbert.
