His Crown having refolved to join with the Molcovites in the War against the Turks, the preparations necessary are making in the feveral Parts of this Kingdom, while Ambaffadors are fent abroad, to difcover the disposition of our Neighbors, and what affiltance we may expect from them. Those that are fent as well by the Czar of *Molcovy*, as by our King to the Emperor, are in their journy, and the account they give of the fuccels they meet with in their Negotiation at that Court will very much quicken or flacken the refolutions of this Crown in this important affair. From the Frontiers we have an account, that the Molcovite Army had taken the Field, and marched towards Kiovia, where they would have a firong Garifon, and then continue their march towards the Turks, wherever they heard they were. In the mean time we have an account from feveral parts, that the Forces of the Grand Signior this year will be nothing proportionable to those of the former Campagnes, which makes it believed that he intends to act only defensively, feeing he is like to have so many Enemies to deal with. The King and Queen with the whole Court are at prefent at Pielaskowits, and from thence intend to remove in few days to Fawarow. Madrid, Fune 28. On Thursday last in the even-

ing we had much Thunder and Lightning in these parts, which, belides the killing of feveral Perfons, did other confiderable michief, and especially at the Efcurial, beating down the Piramid of maßie Stone Work, which flood on the top of the great Cupilo of that Church, and with it a Brass Ball. fupported by the fame of about 750 pound weight, the fall of which, and the Pyramid, did great damage to the Cupulo, and other parts of the Church. The last week arrived here from his long Confinement at Siguenza the Conde of Monterey, but he is ordered not to flir out of his house, or to receive any Visits. Cur Letters from Tangier of the 7th infant fay, that on the 20th pass about 7 or 8000 Moors appeared within a mile and half of that City, and there continued till the 5th inftant, when they retired, without attempting any thing. That on the 27th paft Vice-Admiral Herbert came to an Anchor in that Road, and failed thence again the third inftant with the Squadron under his command for Sally. From Alicant of the 19 inftant they write, that Sir William Poele in the Happy Return failed thence the 14, with fome Mer-chant Ships under his Convoy for Genous and Legborne, and that the fame wook paffed by that place homeward bound, the Affistance Frigat, com-manded by Lieutenant Funiper, (Captain Gardner being dead at Legborne) with 12 Merchant Ships

under his Convoy; That the Dutch Relident at Argiers had finally concluded a Peace between the states his Mafters and that Government, in confideration of which the States are to give the Algierines 8 Bra's Guns of, 40 pound Ball, 8000 Shot, 500 Barrils of Powder, and a great quantity of Cordage, Mafts, and Yards. We are told by Letters of the 18 inflant from Cadiz, that Vice-Admiral Herbert arrived there with the Hampfhire and Saphire two days before from Sally, where he left the Charles Gally with two other Frigats to Cruife. That the Galeons being not yet arrived, they began to defpair of their coming till Auguft or September, when the New Spain Fleet is likewite expected.

The Moscovite Ambassiador has had Audience of the Emperor, and a Conference with the Commissioners appointed to negotiate with him. His Proposition is, that the Emperor will not loofe this occasion of joining his Arms with those of his Master, and of the Crown of Poland, and employing them against the common Enemy the Turks, who may by that means he reduced to a condition not fo formidable to their Neighbors, as they have for many years past been; and the better to induce the Emperor thereunto, the faid Ambaffador has given an account of the great Armies the Czar already has, and will have in the Field, which are alone able to give the Ottoman. Forces more employment than they can well turn themfelves to. An Ambaffador is on his way hither from Poland, to join with the Moscovite in his Negotiation, and the Pope by his Nuncio here does likewife very much prefs the Emperor to lay hold of the opportunity that is now offered, of making fo great an Alliance against the Turks. We do not yet know what the Emperor will refolve in this great matter; but every body thinks it neceffary, in cale he encline to the War, that the affairs of Hungary should be first com-poled.

Hamburg, July 4. The King of Denmark's bringing fo confiderable an Army together in Halfein, keeps this Gity in continual apprehension, which has perhaps been encrealed by a report that has gone abroad of the Molt Christian Kings having promified the King of Denmark, his affishance to make him Master of this City, upon condition he reliver all to Sueden, though any man of fence can hardly give credit to it. From Pomeren they write, that the Cannon, Magazines, Ge, were removing from fored to Sueden, and that at Stein they began to do the like: We are every day expecting to heave what fuccess the Conferences in Schonen have; there are few that doubt their ending in a Peace.

Lipitadt, Fuly 1. The 30. pall arrived here 22 pieces of Gannon, with a great many Wagons laden with Ammunition and Provisions under the Convoy of five Fattalions, and here they are to flav continues encamped near Minden.

Alinden, July 1. We have nothing to add to the account we gave you in our former of the action that happened the 30 pail in fight of this place, between the French and the Brandenburgs, on the occasion of the formers passing the Weser, not being yet able to know the particulars of the loss fuftained on either fide, which must needs have been confiderable, confidering the fharpness of the Engagement for two or three hours, befides the attack the French made upon the Houle of Bergen, in which they were three times repulled with a great flaughter of men. The Mareschal de Crequi continues with the Army under his command in our Neighborhood, and his Cannon, we understand, is come to Lipstadt, and ordered to remain there, which makes us hope, that the Mareschal has received advice of the Peace between his King and our Ele-Etor being near concluding, and that for that reafon he defers his entring upon any farther Enterprizes, till he fee what the iffue of that Negotiation will be, which we hope we shall know in a day or two, and that it will be fuch as we have

caufe to wilh it may be. Copenhagen, July 7. We have had a report here thefe two days of an Engagement between ten Danish Men of War, and a Squadron of Suedes, that came out from Calmar, and that 3 or 4 Ships have been taken on either fide; but the whole is related with fo much uncertainty, that it meets with no great credit.

Bruffels, July 11. On Saturday the Dutchefs de Villa Hermofa returned hither from Treveuren, and this afternoon was to wait upon her Royal Highnels. His Excellency goes hence fome time the next week for Luxemburg. The Prince of Iffenghien continues to very ill, that his recovery is defpaired of. Our French Letters give us an account, that the King of *Spain*'s Marriage with Madamoifelle d'Orleans will be Celebrated by Proxy the 20th of the next Month, and that foon after her Majefty will begin her journy for Spain From Liege of the 8th inftant they write, that that morning ten large Boats laden with French Cannon and Ammunition paffed by that City down the River.

Bruffels, July 14, Yesterday arrived bur Spanish Ordinary, bringing Letters of the 28 of June, which inform us, that the King has appointed Don Pedro de Ronquillos to go for England in quality of his Ambaffador. The Dutcheis of Modena arrived the 11th inftant at Cologne, on her way hither. The French Army under the command of the Marcíchal de Crequi, is marching to the Country of Oldenburg, which belongs to the King of Denmark.

Hague, July 14. The States of Holland have not as yet taken any resolution in the matters before them. The Treaty at Bremen between the Suedes and the Lunenburgs is broken off. The French Army marches towards Oldenburg, and according to our laft advices, was encamped about four Leagues

from the City of Bremen. Para, July 15. The 9th inftant the Articles of Marriage of the King of Spain with Madamoifelle d'Orleans, were figned by the Kings Commissioners, and the Spanish Ambassador. The Marriage will be Celebrated here by Proxy about the middle of the next month.
