Hereas this present Parliament (which was begun and hold at Westminster the 6th day of March 1ast) was lately Prorogued until the 14th day of August next: the King's Most Excellent Majely being

resolued to meet bis People, and to bave their advice in frequent Parliaments, bath thought, fit so Diffolve this present Parliaments, and doth (by this bis Reyal Prochanadion) Diffolve the fame accordingly: And the Loidt Spuritual and Temparal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgeffes of this present Parliament are bereby discharged fram their meeting on the faid. And His Majesty is graciously pleafed to make known to all his loving Subjets, that He bath given directions to the Lord Chancellor of Engand, for the Isluing out of Writs in due form of Lam, fon the calling of a new Parliament, which fall begin and be balden at Westminster on Tuesday the feurnth day of October next.

Color, Fuly 7. The Troops of the Duke of Zell which were quartered in Weterravia, have at length been performed to quit their Quarters, and are marching home: but those of Ofnabrug do not yet fir. The Prince of Neubourg is expected the 24th inflant at Dufeidorp.

Bruffels, July 18. Yesterrlay arrived herelsha Dutchels of Modena and Prince Lodie de Effe with a noble Train. His Bycellency has Ienh Don Callos de Borghia his Nephew to the Fren h Gours! tol Compliment, in his harrie, the new Queen of Spain. Don' Pedra de Ronquillo appointed by the King of Spain to go his Amballador for England isproparing his Equipage, and will begin his journey in a Months or fix Weeks. From Nimeguen, our Letters of the 14th give an accounts That Mon fieur Harg the Danih Amballador parted thence that afternoon, on his way to Holftein, to attend the King his Maften at Rensburg, and to receive Inflructions for histEmb bally to France, whither the faid Monficur Laeg is appointed by the King of Denmark to go, thaving a better proffect of concluding the Peake there than in Schonen. Monficur Colbert the French Amballador at Nimeguen, flays only there till the Ran tifications of the Peace with the Elector of Brandenburgh are exchanged.

Hague, July 14. We are told that the Duke of Zell does in a late Letter to the States, very much prefs them, to pay the Arrears of Sublidies due to him (declaring he shall be otherwise obliged to take such refolutions as may procure him satisfaction in this matter as likewise to Feliore the papers belonging to the Sieur Wiequefort, who was a prisoner here, and as you have been told, made his escape; upon which the States of Aolland have refolved to pay their parts of the faid arears in fix weeks; and that such of the Sieur Wiequefort 9 papers as concern the faid Duke shall be reflored. Upon the conclusion of the Brandenburg Peace, the French are marched into the Countrys of Oldenburg and Delmenborft, which they have already sum moned to pay Contributions. The Ambastadors, of this State at the French Court have made their complaint to Monsieur Pempone of what was done at Drarge, about setting up of a Cross there, in prejuance of the Princes Soveraignty, though without being able to obtain any fatisfaction in it. Our Letters from Erancfort give us an account, that the apprehensions the City of Strasbourg has of thr French deligns do encrease daily, and therefore the Imperial Forces that are quartered in that Neighborhood are ordered to continue there, till the execution of the Peace.

The Articles of the Treaty Paris, July 15. lately concluded between the Elector of Brandenburg and this Crown are,

I. That there shall be a firm and lasting Peace between them, and free Commerce by land and water.

II. All Hostilities to cease within 10 days after the Exchange of the Katifications.

111. A general oblivion of all that is past.

IV. The Treaties of Munster and Olicaburg to remain in full force.

VI The Elettor to reftore to Sucden, all he has taken in Pomeren during this War, as Stetin, Straelfond, Gc.

VI. But that the Lands on the other fide of the River Oder shall remain in Soveraignty to the Elector.

VII. That Golnow shall at prejent remain in the bands of the Elector, be paying 50000 Crowns to the King of Sueden, who upon repayment of that Sum full have the fame reftored to bim.

VIII. The King of Sucden quits the Toll which be received at Colberg, and other places in Pomeren. putfuantio the Treaty made at Stetin 1633. IX. Quits likewife all the Rights and Revenews of the

Lands on the liber fide of the Oder, which remain by this Peace to the Elector.

X. Frees the Inhabitants of the Oath of Allegiance by them taken to him.

XI. The River Oder to remain in Soveraignty to Sueden, and the Elector is not to build any Forts or frong bolds on it, as far as the Territory of Sueden reaches.

XII. The Most Christian King shall presently after the exchange of the Ratifications, draw his Forces out of the Countries and places of the Elector, except 1000 Horfe, who are to remain in Wclel and Lipstadt, till the Peace be intirely executed.

XIII. That the Elector Shall draw his Forces out of the Field, but because the King of Sueden wants Troops, the Elector shall keep Garifons in the places in Pom ren viz. 2 coo men 'n Straelfond, 1200 or 1000 in Stetin, and so in other places proportionably, till such 'time as Sueden fends over men to receive them.

XIV. That the Elector may take away the Cannon and Ammunition he bath brought into those places, but must leave what he found there.

XV. That all indeavours stall be used to make the Peace with Denmark, and that in the mean time the Elector shall not give that Crown any Assignance.

XVI. The Mift Christian King obliges himself to procure the Crown of Suedens Ratifications of this Treaty in three Months, and as long so it is wanting the Eleftor is not obliged to restare the places abovementioned. The Ratifications between France and the Elector are to be Exchanged within a Month.

Edenburg, July 5. Here bas been published His Majesties Proclamation, commanding the Judges, and all Magistrates, to apprehend and punish all such as frequent any Field Conventicles (those Rendevouses of Rebellion) according to the prescript of the Laws, such as bear Armes there, being to be Deemed as Traitors; as likewife to profecute with all legal Rigour, the execrable Murtherers of the late Archbiftop of St. Andrews, and declaring, that His Majefty being defirous to reclaim all fuch as have been mifled by ignorance or blind zeal, bath according to the Power referved to His Majesty by the fifth Alt and second Seffion of his fecond Parliament, suspended the Execution of all Laws and Airs against such as frequent House-Conventicles in the Low Countrys on the South fide of the River Tay, excepting the Town of Edenburgh and two miles round the fame, with the Lordships of Musicl-burg and Dalkeith, the Cities of St. Andrews, Glafcow and Sterling and a mile about each of them. But that none may, under the colour of this favour, continue to preach Rebellion, all fuch as shall be juffered, to Preach, are to give in their names and to find Surety to the Privy Council for their peaceable behaviour, only one Preacher being allowed to a Paroch, and none to be allowed, who have appeared against His Majefty in this late Rebellion, nor none who shall be admissed by the Un-conform Ministers in any time bereafter.
