Rome, March 8. Warfaw. March 12. From Ukrania we are informed, That the Royal and Rebel Coffacks have had of late frequent Encounters, but always to the disadvantage of the Rebels, whose Interests de-cline much, and confiderable numbers of them are daily returning to their obedience; and that a defigne was lately laid for the betraying and delivery of the Garrison Bialacierkien to the Rebel Cossacks, but by the timely discovery of it by an old woman, good order was taken for its prevention, and four of the principal persons concerned in the management of that Conspiracy, apprehended and empalled.

Vienna; March 13. Besides the former Envoyé from Poland, called Praochmobskij, who came accompanied with eight other persons, here is also a Senator of that Kingdom upon the same errand, both of them employing their cares and interests to obtain Succors for their Master; they affure us, that the Diet is already begun at Warfaw, but carnot yet make any guels what fuccels it is like to have.

From Erford they tell us, that the Prince Elector of Mayence, being in that City with a party of a thousand Horte, is setling the Affairs of that place in the best Order possible; and has ordered the speedy reparation of the Citties, to complement his Highness, and the Neighbouring Counts are most of them arrived there in perion, to attend

his Commands, whose stay there is yet uncertain.
S me few dayes fince arrived here the Marquels Pio, and lad Audlence fem the Emperor, but af er two or three dayes lest the Town; being it seems invited from hence by Colonel Dienewald a Snede, upon an old quartel risen between them in the Wars where they formerly served; but were hindered from deciding it with their Swords : and that purpose took post , intending to meet in some part out of that purpose tock post; intending to meet in tone part out of the Emperors Hereditary Countries; the Marque's Pio taking with him for his Seconds, the Marque's de Grana, and the Count de Heberstein; and the Collonel for his. Monsieur Hoffkirchen, and Lieutenant Collonel de Bernstan ; three Lutherans against three Roman Catholicks; all of them to engage equally on Horse-back with their Swords. The Emperor having notice of their intentions, has taken the best care possible to prevent them, but its believed to little purpole, the place appointed being not known to any, but the perions engaged.

Cadit, March 6. Three days fince failed hence 8 Galfrom the Indies, and the same day came in 3 St. Malos Merchants from Tunk with Whear, 9 more came out of the Streights with them bound homewards, whereof two of 14 Guns and 50 Men apiece, the others fmall Batque Fifther-men laden with Oyles.

Captain Herbert with the Pembrook Fregate, is new in this Port newly returned from a fresh dispute with a Zealand Man of War of 34 Guns, and 180 Men, with whom he fought, about twenty days fince in fight of this Bay, from Two in the Afternoon, till the Night put an end to the Days work, all that night the Fregate carrying out a light for the Zcalanders and the next morning being to the windward

fired a Gun, and bore up to re-engage him, but the Zealander being the nimbler Sailer, bore away once or twice before the wind, declining a further dilpute, which the Fregat perceiving, and fearing to be put to Leeward of the Port, by a fruit-less pursuit, the wind then blowing a firong Levant, came again for the Bay, which the Zealander wanted not the confidence to boaft of as a mark of his Victory. Since this the Fregat being put ashoar to Wash and Tallow, the Zealander made several challenges, but went out again to Sea before the Fregat could get ready. Yesterday morning the Zealander coming in, the Fregat being ready went out to meet him, and paffed five times upon him within Piftol-Rot, until the Zealander finding the fervice too hot, bore in for the Bay, purfued for a long time by the Fregate, who being unable to o-overtake him, fired her chace Gun, and stood out again to Sea; the Zealander answered her challenge with a friendly falute of three Guns to Leeward, but yet thought it convenient to put into the Bay, where he triumphantly fixed all kis Guns, leaving the Pembrook at S:a, in vain attending him till the mext morning. The Captain of the Zealander is fince come on fhoat, vainly endeavouring to perswade us that his Mainmaft is dilabled, and that he wants thot for his Guns. the dispute the Fregat had seven men killed, and five hurr, but none of them mortally, her Fore-mast somewhat disabled, but will speedily be refitted and made serviceable.

Libon, March 13. We are here making our usual preparations for the Campagnia, taking our Meatures from these of the Sparish fide, against whom we hope to be in a good posture to desend our selves. The Conde S. Juan has some sew days since made an entry into Galicia with a considerable party , burning 15 or 20 small Villages , and returning with-

out any reliftince.

The latter end of this Moneth the St. Berto of 500 Tuns, that the last year was by stress of weather socied back from the Height of Cape Verde, will be really to serial again for Goa, to go out with the Gallions and the rest of the Convoy to the Brazil Fleet, Francisco Ferreira Rebelles is suddenly intending for France in the S. Teresa, as Envoye from this Court. Not a French Ship has appeared here these two Mone hs, which is imputed to a general Embargo in the Ports. in their Ports.

It is confidently reported her Majefty is with Child. Some fe v dayes fince M nheur Schomberg marched into Spain, with intention to a tempt upon Guerumena, where the people taking the Alarm, quitting the Town, retired into the Fortres, leaving their houles to the mercy of the Portu-

guese, which they plundred, and afterwards attaqued the Fortiers, which proved too well defended to be suddenly taken, before which he lost 30 or 40 Men, a French Captain, and one other Officer, the Marquess de Normatier.

Venice, March 18. Out last Letters so on the Levant a vile us. That the Turkish Army is much visited with the Plague, which with the want of Victuals has obliged the Visites so disperse his Forces about the Island, having given order to the Bussa of Morea, for the speedy furnishing him with all sorts of Provisions, expecting also the arrival of forty Ships from Alexandretta, with necessaries of all sorts for ty Ships from Alexandretta, with necessaries of all sorts for his Sapply. Four Turkish Barks, that were sent to Canca with Provisions, were lately stripwrackt near that Port, with the e Corfayres, and four others put ashoar. They tell us moreover, that Seignior Micolo Lyon Commander of one of our Ships meeting lately with a Turkish Vessel laden with provisions, under the Conduct of six Gallies, after an hours fight, took her, which so incensed the Visier, that he caused the heads of six of the Captains to be taken off, as being wan-Kingfele, March 18. A Vetlel lately arrived from Bar-

bados, gives us an account of the good condition of that place, with the rest of our Plantations in the Carribbee Islands. That the attempt of the French upon Antego, had pur the Neighbour Islands upon their Guards, especially Mevis and Montserrat; who had encampt themselves, and were put into a good posture to have entertained the Enemy, if he had attempted them: to whose assistance Collonel Willoughby had from the Barbados sent two Ships of 24 Guns, and one of to Guus, with Provisions and other

Necessaries for their supply: but that the French had sent some fifteen or fixteen of their biggest Ships, and that Monfieur de Barr was with four others gone for Cayan , a letttlement of theirs upon the Main, about 60 Leagues to the Wind-ward of Surinam. They tell us also that the French and Dutch together had attempted Statia, formerly taken by the English from the Dutch, from whence they were beaten off with confiderable lofs; but upon the arrival & fresh Succors to them from S. Christophers, it was given up ; but upon the entry, the Dutch intending to fet up then Colours, were prevented by the French; which cocafoo'd much difptre and diffurbance, the Dutch thinking themfelves much injured, and accordingly have fent their Complaints to the States.
