## Vienna; July 30.

HE Molcovite Amballadors have had feveral Conferences with the Ministers appointed by the Emperor to Treat with them; the Sum of their Proposals is, that the Emperor will enter into an Alliance with the Czar of Melcovy, against the common Enemy, which if the Emperor refule, then it's probable the Czar will make a Peace with the Turks, who then in all likelyhood will fall into Hungary, and fo the Emperor will be left alone to withfand the Force of the Ottomans: But the Imperial Miniflers, as we are Informed, have asked the Ambaffadors how the Emperor should be secure, in case he should enter into the Alliance now proposed, that the Czar will not make a feperate Peace with the Grand Signior. And upon the whole it feems that this Court has no great disposition to break with the Port. The Emperor has feat orders to his Troops in the Empire, to retire into his Heriditary Countrics. In Hungary a Ceffation of Arms is agreed on for fome weeks; during which time all endea-vours will be used to accomodate matters.

Ratiobonne, August 3. It having been propoled to the Dyet on the part of the Emperor, that they would apply their chief care for the elfablishing fuch a Force, as may be able to fecure the Peace of the Empire, feveral Sessions have been held to confult therenpon, and fome Propolals made in order therenato; but the general Senie was, that the Emperor should be pray'd first to withdraw his Forces, which are to burthenfom to the Empire, and that he would give them notice, in cafe of any Extraordinary occasion, when the States should be ready to contribute their utmost for the defence of themfelves and the whole Empire; That for the prefent they thought the Elfab ishment (by which the feveral Circles are affigned the Quota's of men they are refpectively to bring on Foot and maintain, in cafe of need) formerly made sufficient.

Hamburg, Aug. 8. The neighborhood of the Danith Troops, who lye io near us, that their Outguards fland where ours uied to do, keeps us in a continual apprehention, which is very much encreafed by the account our Letters from Berlin give us of the great preparations that are making by the Elector of Brandenburgh, as if he were going to enter into fome new War, and that it's probable he will joyn his Forces with thole of Dermark; and if that be true, there is ground enough to infpect, that their defign is upon this Ci y; upon which, both thole Princes are not wanting to have pretenfions. In the mean time the Elector is preparing to quit the places in Pomeren, of which he requires large fums of Money; of Straeiford he demands 30000 Crowns, of Stetin 40000, and fo of the reft.

strasburg, Aug. 5. On the 30 part marched from

hence, the Battallion of Eyfenach, and in a day or two we shall be wholly rid of those that remain as yet here, upon which, several French Regiments have likewise quitted Alface, and are gone home, so that now we hope to see in a fhort time, the Peace fully executed. The Imperial Troops assemble between Philipsburg and Offenburg, from whenes they will march in a body to Bohemia.

Cologne, Aug. 8. Yesterday the Imperial Garrison quitten Bonne, taking their march under the Commatid of Monfieur Sigra, who was Governor of the place, towards Philipsburg, to joyn the Imperial Troops that are drawing together there; no fooner were the Imperialit's marched out, but soo of our Electors Troops entred at another Gate, and took pofferfion of the place; the Elector will not remove thither himfelf, till the 28 of Oltober, when it will be five years fince he was forced to quit his Refidence, and to retire hither. This morning Prince William of Furstemburg began his journey from hence for France. Great prepartions are making at Dufeldorp for the reception of the Prince of Newburg, and the Arch-Ducheis his Wife, where they will refide ; the Duke of Neuburg having refigned to his Son, the Government of the Dutchies of Faliers and Bergs. From Lipstadt we have an account, that the Mareschal de Crequi had been detained some days there by a fit of the Gout, but that he parted from thence the 5 inflant for Wefel, where the French Troops pais the Rhine, and a confiderable body of them are come to Berehem, four Leagues from hence though fome Regiments continue their march towards Aix la Chapelle. The French demind of the Dutchy of Juliers 380 000 Crowns, for arrears of Contributions, and will have this fum paid, before their Troopsleave the Countrey, or that the Stat s give good lecurity for the payment of it, who are now allembled at Dufeldorp, to confider th reof. Wefel, August 9. On Friday and Saturday laft, the French Troops that were here begun to leave us, and paffed the Rhine over our Bridge, taking with them the Gannon they brought hither, fo that we hope we fhall, in few days, be tid of thefe unwelcom Gueffs, except 1000 horfe, who are toremain here and at Lipfladt, till the Peace be fully executed, and the places in Pomeren reftored to the Suedes. On Monday arrived here the Marefchal de Crequi, and at the fame time Licutenant General Space, came in at an other Gate, and received and complimented the Marefchal. This morning, marched from hence the Dauphins Regiment.
