*Venice, July 29.*

**S**ignior *Ciurani*, Ambassador from this State to the Grand Signior, has taken his leave of the Doge, and purposes to begin his journey the next week. Our last Letters from *Constantinople* gave an account, that the Ambassadors of *Ragusa* were still detained in prison, and very severely treated, by order of the Grand Vicer, because they would not undertake for the payment of the Moneys demanded by him.

*Marseilles, Aug. 8.* It is reported that orders are comt from *Paris*, for the fitting out several Men of War more at *Thoulon*, to join with those that are already at Sea.

*Genova, Aug. 2.* The Great Council hath finally made choice of Signior *Agustino Spinola* to be their Duke for the two ensuing years. The French Gallies having been forced back by the weather to *Leghorne*, are sailed from thence the second time for *Corfica* and *Sardinia*.

*Vienna, July 30.* There remaining no more to be done at *Nimeguen*, the Emperor has recalled his Ambassadors from thence, and at the same time has sent orders to his Troops that are at present in the Empire, to march this way, designing to employ some of them in *Hungary*, and to assign quarters for the rest in *Bohemia*. The Emperor has given to the Duke of *Lorraine* the Government of *Tyrol*, and accordingly his Highness will very suddenly take possession of it. The Count *de Nostriz* is returned hither from *Bavaria*, and the discourse at Court is, that he has concluded a Marriage between the young Elector, and the Archduchess the Emperors Daughter. The Moscovite Ambassadors have sent to compliment the Popes Nuncio, which he returned, and it's said will visit them. We cannot learn that the Emperor has as yet taken any resolution upon the Overtures made by these Ambassadors, with relation to an Alliance against the Turks; which is an Affair this Court will proceed very warily in.

*Vienna, Aug. 2.* The Moscovite Ambassadors press hard for a positive Answer to the Proposals they have made here in the name of the Czar, and that the rather, for that they perceive this Court has not any inclination to close with them, especially as long as affairs continue in the posture they are at present in in *Hungary*. Prince *Radzeville*, the Polish Ambassador pretends to be treated with the Title of Highness, but the Ministers here will not give him any more than Excellency, but this does not hinder them in their Business. The said Ambassador, as we have already told you, goes from hence for *Rome*, to sollicite the Pope to contribute on his part towards the promoting the Alliance, which is now projected among the Princes of Christendom, against the common Enemy the Turks.

*Ratisbonne, Aug. 5.* The Imperial Commissary has acquainted the Diet, that the Emperor has given Orders for the drawing his Troops out of the Empire, and for their marching into his Hereditary Countreys, where he has assigned them quarters; his Imperial Majesty being resolved to keep a constant Force on foot to be employed for the securing the peace and safety of the Empire; in which he expects the several Circles will joyn with him, and that they will at their cost, maintain such a number of soldiers, as upon occasion may forme an Army sufficient to defend them against the attempts of any neighboring Prince; to which the States have not as yet returned any answer, thinking the several Circles lay already under an Engagement to raise and maintain a body of Men, whenever the necessity of the Empire requires it.

*Copenhagen, Aug. 5.* The Conference at *Lundin* are not yet broken off, as has been said, but the Ambassadors there continue to meet, and to treat of the matters before them, in which they are assisted by the Offices of Sir *Edward Wood*, Envoy Extraordinary of His Majesty of Great Britain, as Mediator. Here is a report, that our Fleet has made a descent on the Isle of *Essef*, and taken it, together with the Castle that is there.

*Hamburg, Aug. 9.* We live here in a continual apprehension, and must expect to do so, till the Danish Troops remove out of our Neighborhood, of which there is but small appearance. When they first came into these parts, it was said, their business was to guard the passage of the *Elbe*, that the French might not pass it; but at present, that the French have quitted the Countreys of *Oldenburg* and *Delmenhorst*, and that they are marching back towards the *Rhine*, we know not what keeps them here; a short time will discover what their design is, and in the interim we are doing here all we can to secure our selves.

*Meurs, Aug. 7.* The thirtieth 8 Regiments of French Horse, part of the Marschal *de Crequi's* Army, who had passed the *Rhine* at *Wesel*, passed by this place on their march towards *Nuis*, and were followed the next day by two Regiments of Foot. This day two Regiments of Horse more are marched by.

*Cologne, Aug. 8.* Greatest part of the French Troops have repassed the *Rhine*, and the Marschal *de Crequi* will, as we are informed, return home by the way of *Sedan*, where several Regiments of Horse will be disbanded. The French that remain in this Country, do extremely vex the poor Country people, who have raised all they are able, to pay their Contributions. We here are not without our troubles, for we apprehend that the French have a design to assist our Elector, to recover certain Rights, which it's pretended this City hath usurped upon him, or as others say, to oblige the

*Brussels, Aug. 11.* Here happened a Tumult the last night among the Burghers, which was like to have had very ill effects; it was occasioned by the imprisonment of a Burgher for a Riot, to release whom, some thousands of the Rabble got together, and forced the burgher-masters to set him at liberty, threatening otherwise to pull down their Houses. Letters from *Liege* the 9th instant tell us, that Prince *William* of *Furstenberg* arrived there that morning, and was received very solemnly by the Burghers in Arms, and saluted with a treble discharge of the Cannon round the Walls: The Letters add, that the Bridge which the French are making over the *Meuse* at *Chinay* for the passage of their Troops was almost finished. From *Strasburg* they write, that the Imperialists are leaving that place, and that thereupon greatest part of the French Troops are retired out of *Alsace*.

*Amsterdam, July 11.* The French Army has repass'd the *Rhine* at *Wesel*, part of it takes its march directly towards the *Meuse*, while another part will remain in the Diocess of *Cologne*, and the Countries of *Fuliers* and *Bergs*, to raise (if they have no other design) the Arrears of Contributions they require from those Countries.

*Hague, Aug. 11.* Don *Emanuel de Lyra*, the Spanish Minister having received a final Answer in the matter concerning *Maestricht*, will part hence in few days on his return for *Spain*. We have had several reports here, as if the Peace between the two Northern Crowns was upon the point of being concluded, but they are without any ground, and the last Letters from *Copenhagen* said, that there was little reason to expect any thing from the Conferences at *Schonen*, though at the same time the Swedes would not endure the Treaty should be removed from thence to *Paris*, which the Danes design.

*Paris, Aug. 16.* On Sunday the Count de *Morslein* Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of *Poland*, made his publick Entry into this City, being attended by a very rich and numerous Train. Very great preparations are making here for the solemnizing the Marriage of the King of *Spain* with Mademoiselle, which will be done on the 30 instant, the Prince de *Conti* being that Kings Proxy for this Ceremony. We hear nothing more of the Peace of the North, the *Sieur Meyereroon* the Danish Minister here, expecting orders from his Master, how to proceed, upon what has been signified to him on the part of this King, of which you had an account in our last.

*Plimouth, Aug. 5.* The second instant came into this Port the *Nightingal* of *Hull*, *Adam Sherwill* Master, from the *Balticks*. The third the *Dorothy* of *London*, *Francis Eltbird* Master, bound for *Tangier* and *Malaga*. The Dart of *Yarmouth*, *Thomas Poynt* Master, from *Bristol*, for the *Streights*. The *Arn* of *Hamburg*, *Foskin Fooks* Master for *Cadiz*. The *Marshias* of *Amsterdam*, *Harman Bronnes* Master for the *Streights*. The *Elizabeth* of *Hamburg*, *John Coes* Master, for *St. Lucar*. The Young Teoman of *Middleburg*, bound for *Tangier*. The same day sailed from hence the *Antelope* and *Dover* Frigats, for *Newfoundland*. The 4th arrived here the *Mathew* and *Sarah* of *Bristol*, *John Cadner* Master. The *Prudence* of *Bristol*, *William Fisher*, and the *Dove* of *Bristol*, *Giles Strapely*, all three bound for *Cadiz*; and

this day the *Ann* and the *Hopewell* of this place, the first bound home from *Bayonne*, and the other from *Guernzey* for *Ireland*.

*Lime, Aug. 5.* A Vessel is put in here, who was chased off of *Portland* by a Turks man of War, Yesterday was publicly burnt here by the Officers of the Custom-house, a great quantity of French Linnens, and at the same time several Hogheads of French Wine were staved, pursuant to the Act of Parliament.

*Windsor, Aug. 6.* This day the Count de *Mayan*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy*, had his first Audience of their Majesties, to which he was conducted in the usual manner by Sir *Charles Costerel* Master of the Ceremonies.

*London, Aug. 11.* The Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen, taking notice that the City and Liberties thereof, and especially the Street of Cornhill, and Passages to the Royal Exchange, are much pestered with a sort of loose and idle Persons, called Hawkers, who do daily Publish and Sell Seditious Books, Scurrilous Pamphlets, and scandalous Printed Papers, contrary to Law, and to the great Scandal of the Government of this City (for the suppressing of whom divers Orders and Provisions have been formerly made by that Court) have thought fit, for the regulation thereof, and for the more effectual putting in execution the Laws against such Offenders, to appoint and command the Marshall of the City, as well as the Constables, to take care that no persons whatsoever do from henceforth Sell, Cry, Publish, or Disperse any Books, Pamphlets, or other Printed Papers in any place within this City or the Liberties thereof, and to apprehend all such Hawkers and Offenders, and to bring them before the Lord Mayor, or some other of His Majesties Justices of the Peace, to be set at hard Labour at Bridewell, or otherwise to be dealt with according to Law.
