*Vienna, August 6.*

**T**HE fourth instant the Imperial Commissioners and the Moscovite Ambassadors had a long Conference together, upon which an Express was sent the next day for *Mosco*, to give the Czar an account of what had passed, whose commands the Ambassadors will expect thereupon: the Polish Ambassador presses to have a positive answer, his stay here with so vast a Train, being very expensive to him; he will not go for *Rome*, as was said, but will transact, what he would otherwise have done at that Court, with the Popes Nuncio here. What was said of Count *Nostitz* having concluded a Marriage between the young Elector of *Bavaria*, and the Emperors Daughter, is not confirmed. In *Hungary* things seem to tend towards Peace, which as well the Prince of *Transylvania*, as several of the chiefest of the Malcontents do very much labor to procure.

*Berlin Aug. 7.* Our Elector has given out Commissions for the raising five new Regiments; and a great Train of Artillery is preparing here; and the general discourse is, that so soon as the Corn is off the Field, some great design will be taken in hand. His Electoral Highness has given orders for the buiking a new Cittadel at *Maegdeburg*, and for that end several thousand Workmen are sent thither.

*Copenhagen, Aug. 8.* The Master of a Dutch Vessel, arrived here from *Calmar* reports, that the Suedes understanding that six Danes Men of War, lay as a guard off of *Calmar*, took the opportunity of a fair Wind, and sent out eight stout Men of War from *Stockholme*, to fall upon the Danes, and to destroy them; that the Suedes coming up with the Danes, fell into Action with them; but Admiral *Fuels* having timely notice of the Enemies design, came with the whole, or greatest part of his Fleet, to the assistance of the Danes, which the Suedes perceiving, and finding they could not withstand so unequal a force, they made haste to retire, and to gain some Port, but that the Ship, called the *Key* of that Crown, mounted with 94 Guns, having the misfortune to run aground, was there burnt by three Fireships which the Danes put upon her. The Conferences in *Schonen* continue still, and as we persuade our selves, with some appearance of success. The Suedes have besieged the Castle of *Helsenburg*.

*Hamburg, Aug. 11.* The King of *Denmark* continues to have his Head-quarters at *Pinnenberg*, though it was said two days since that he would remove them to *Wandsbecke*, two English miles from hence. His Forces in the mean time daily change their quarters, and by their marches and counter-marches, keep people here uncertain of their de-

signs; but our fears continue all this while, and no care is wanting to provide for our security. Four thousand men of the Duke of *Lunenbourg's* Forces, are quartered in the Territories of this City, and are at the disposal of our Magistrates, and to obey such orders as they receive from them. There are Letters, as we are informed, from the French Ambassador, who assails at the Conferences in *Schonen*, which gives great hopes of the Peace, saying that several Points were agreed, and that those that were not, would be, according to all appearance very suddenly. The Elector of *Brandenburg* demands a large Sum of Money of this City, on account of quarters, which he says they ought to have furnished his Troops during the War; and it is said that the Emperor has lately written to this Senate, to let them know, that they ought to satisfy the said Electors pretension, and not think by an Agreement with any other Prince, to elude his assignation of quarters in the Empire. The Privateers, set out by the said Elector, have within these few days taken another Vessel, belonging to this City, as likewise a Dutch ship of 400 Tuns, bound hither. From *Lubecke* we have an account, that six Suedish Men of War, coming from *Stockholme*, met the Danish Fleet, from which retiring, one of them, called the *Key*, of 80 pieces of Cannon, and 300 men, unfortunately running on ground, the resolute Captain, seeing no way to escape, went into the Gun-room, set fire to the Powder, and blew up the Ship.

*Wismar, Aug. 12.* By a Vessel arrived here in four days from *Calmar*, we have advice, that the Danish Fleet lay in that *Sound*, having destroyed a Suedes Ship of above 80 Guns, who run aground, and was there burnt by the Danes Fireships, or, as others say, by the Captains setting himself fire to the Powder.

*Strasburg, Aug. 11.* We are now quite rid of the Imperial Troops, who lie quartered in the Villages on the other side of the *Rhine*, expecting orders from the Duke of *Lorraine*. Instead of these, we shall have a Garison of the Troops of the Circles; and our Magistrates have sent Deputies to the Duke of *Lorraine* about it. The French are going to quit *Mombelgard*, *Dachsburg*, and *Lutzelslein*; but at the same time go on with the Fortifications of *Schlestadt*.

*Cologne, Aug. 15.* The Bishop of *Strasbourg* is at present at *Bonne*, to give the necessary Orders for the preparing things for our Electors Reception there, which will not be till the beginning of *October*. The Imperial Troops being retired out of *Strasburg*, the French are likewise about quitting the places they have Garisons in in *Alsace*, except *Colmar* and *Schlestadt*, which they seem to have no intention to evacuate; for if they had, they would not continue to work on the Fortifications of the latter with that diligence they do; which 'tis feared by

by force, may give occasion to some new misunderstanding between the Emperor and the Crown of France. From Vienna they write, that Count *Boissé* was returned from the Elector of *Bavaria's* Court not very well satisfied.

*Brussels, Aug. 15.* Yesterday the Princess of *Saxony* and the Dutchess of *Mecklenburg*, arrived at *Liege* in a Yacht belonging to the States of *Lothland*, from whence they passed in their Coaches on their way for *Paris*. *Don Carlos de Borghia*, who was sent by his Excellency to compliment the new Queen of *Spain*, is come back. Our Letters from *Luxemburg* give an account, that the Duke of *Villa Hermosa* had convoked the States; and that he had begun to settle the affairs of that Country, as well Civil as Military; that the Prince of *Waldeck* was come thither to his Excellency from *Germany*. From *Liege* they write, that the French Troops are returning home, that they take their march in small Bodies by *Chinay*, and the *Condross*, great part of them being to be disbanded so soon as they reach the French Territories. That the *Marschal de Crequi* had called together the States of the Country of *Marké*, and had required of them, to maintain 4000 men, which were to remain there, till they had satisfied the Arrears of their Contributions. Our Northern Letters say, that the Elector of *Brandenburg's* Troops continue to march towards the *Elbe*, as do likewise those of the Princes of *Lunenburg*, and that there was a warm report, that the latter, together with the *Munster* Troops, were to march into *Friesland*.

*Nimiguen, Aug. 16.* The Princess of *Orange* arrived here this forenoon from *Aernhem*, in her way to *Aix la Chapelle*, where her Highness purposes to use the Bath; her Highness was pleased to pass the time she was here, at my Lord Ambassador *Fenkens's* House, where she dined, and afterwards continued her journey. To-morrow his Excellency parts hence on his return for *England*. The *Sieur Hoeg*, Ambassador from *Denmark*, is returned hither from *Holstein*, where he has been to wait upon the King his Master; On Monday next he begins his journey from hence for *France*.

*Amsterdam, Aug. 18.* It is most certain that the Count *D'Estree* is gone with the Ships under his command for the *West-Indies*, though we cannot yet learn his design.

*Flague, Aug. 18.* This morning *Henry Sidney Esq;* Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain* to this State, had his first Audience of the States General, to which he was conducted by two of their Deputies with the usual Ceremonies and Respects. *Don Emanuel de Lyra* the Spanish Minister has given in a Memorial to the States, wherein he answers at large to the resolution of the States, concerning *Mazstricht*, which by their direction, had been communicated to him. The French Ambassador has likewise presented a Memorial to the States, in answer to a complaint that had been made to him of some Larships the Subjects of this State met with in their Trade in *France*. The said Ambassador has again demanded that the Count de *Benthem's* Children may be restored to their Father.

*Paris, Aug. 19.* The 26 the Court removes to *Fons Ambrean*, where the Marriage of Mademoiselle will be celebrated the 21, with much solemnity. The Dauphin and the Duke of *Orleans* will lead the Bride to the Church, and the King will lead her back. The

Knights of the Order are to assist at the Ceremony in their Robes, &c. The *Marschal de Loges*, and *Monsieur de Louvois*, who were very much hurt by a fall from their Horses, are in a fair way of recovery. On Wednesday last *Madam Brissard*, Widow of a Counsellor of Parliament, was secured by order of the Chamber set up for the Tryal of the Poysoners. The King, as we understand, has sent orders to his Troops in *Lorraine*, to besiege the Castles of *Bisch* and *Homburg*, the only places which remain to the Duke of *Lorraine*. The Count de *Soissons* is returned hither from *Turin*, from whence we understand, that the Chevalier *Lubomirski* was arrived at that Court from *Poland*, to demand assistance against the Turks. Yesterday an Envoy from the Bishop of *Munster* had Audience of the King.

*Bridlington, Aug. 7.* Yesterday arrived here a Vessel of this place from the *Sound*; the Master informs us, that the Danes have pulled down greatest part of the Town of *Helsenburg*, for the greater security of the Castle, which it's believed the Suedes will attack.

*Plimsouth, Aug. 8.* This evening *Sir John Berry* in the *Dreadnought* arrived here, with about 30 Sail of Merchant Ships and r his Convoy, most of which are past up the Channel.

*Deal, Aug. 9.* Last night arrived in the *Downes* the *Williamson*, Captain *Buss* Commander, and the *Unicorne* Captain *Slade*, both from the *East Indies*.

*Portsmouth, Aug. 10.* On Thursday past by for the *Downes* two *East India* Ships, under the Convoy of the *Swifisire*. Yesterday seven Hogsheds of French Wine, and one Cask of Brandy, were publicly flaved by the Officers of the Custom-House.
