Genoue, Aug. 9.

OT any Ships have arrived here this week, lave an Hamburger, from Legorn, from whence we have an account, that the Happy Return failed five days fince for Spain. An Ambaffador is daily expected here from Poland, to demand Succors against the Turks, being already arrived at Turin, from whence he comes hither. The Lrench Gallies are pass by Corfica for Sardinia, but it's faid will go no farther Eastward than Cagliari, where the Chevalier de Tourville with the Men of War under his command, hath blocked up three Majorkins. The 5th inflant our new Doge was Crowned with great folemnity.

Turin, Aug. 12. The 6th inftant the Chevalier Lubomirski, Amballador Extraordinary from Poland, had his first Audience of the Duke, and afterwards of the Dutchefs Regent; his businefs was to demand affiflance against the Turks in the War that Crown is going to engage in against them; and in the next place to defire the Dutchels would be Godmother to the Daughter of the King of Poland : As to the first the faid Ambaffador, was answered, that the Duke would raife a Regiment of Dragoons, which fhall be called the Royal Regiment of Savoy, and will maintain the fame for a year in the fervice of that Crown, and wifhed other Christian Princes would follow this example; and as to the other, the Duchefs received the Complement very kindly, and faid the would defire the Marchionels of Bethune, Wife of the French Ambaffador in Poland, to fland for her

at the young Princeffes Christing. Copenhagen. Aug. 22. The 18 instant our Plenipotentiaries come hi her from Schonen, to confult the Council here, concerning matters relating to the Treaty, and this morning they returned thither again, except Count Anthony of Oldenburg, who is gone for Hollein, to wait upon the King. The Swedes continue to befiege Elfenburg; three or four days fince they endeavoured to post themselves on the Strand, to hinder the Befieged from receiving any fuccors from that fide, but the Danish men of War that lay off there, did so ply the Swedes with their Cannon, that they were forced to retire. But yeflerday they returned with better fuccess, and having planted 27 pieces of Cannon on the Sea fide, they did fo gall our Ships, that they were forced to weigh their Anchors, and to quit their flation. This day one Colonel Lefbley, a cotchman, was brought hither prifoner, havi g been taken two days fince in a Sally they of Elfinburg made upon a party of wedes, who came very near their Works to oblerve them. We expect our King here this week from Holftein.

Hamburg, Aug. 25. From Holftein we have an account, That the King of Denmark had given Audience to the Molcovite Ambaflador, whole bufinefs, it feens, was to demand his affifance againft the 'Turks, We do not yet know whether his Majefly will come back hither, or return for *Copenbagen*. This City hath finally thought fit to accommodate matters with the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and to fatisfie his pretensions; fo that now we shall be pretty well at case on that fide. The like will be endeavoured with the King of *Denmark*, who pretends to the Homage of this City, as being leituated in his Territories. Our Polish Letters tell us, that they had news, that the Moscovites, with the help of the Colfacks, had defeated 40000 Turks, of which, one half had been killed upon the place, which if true, will very much promote the Alliance that is now proposed against the Port.

Cologne, Aug. 22. The Country of Juliers is totally ruined by the French Troops that ftill remain there, while the Marcichal de Crequi is very fick at Wefel, and has fent to France for Doctors. Here is a report that the French Troops that were marching towards the Meufe, have received orders to come back this way, and that the pretence is they are to march for Lorrin, which very much alarms us here.

Aix, Aug. 22. Yelterday in the evening her Highnefs the Princefs of Orange arrived here, attended with a noble Train, having been received fome Miles out of Town by Lieutenant-General Calvo, and a great many other chief Officers, and four Troops of Horfe; upon her Highneffes arrival here, all the Cannon upon the Walls were difcharged, and the Troops in Garifon here made a Laue in the Streets, through which fhe paffed to her Lodgings.

Liege, Aug. 22. The French Troops march daily by this place; their Cannon paffed yefferday at *Chinay.* Several thousand of their men are at prefent encamped on the River Roer, and they will follow the others in few days. It is faid there is appointed a general Rendezvous of their Forces at Sedan, and that there a great many will be disbanded. There are 16 French Companies still at Verviers, and at Huy they have still a Garison, of which place they demand 30000 Gilders, which the Inhabitants are unable to raife. Yesterday the Princes of Orange parted from Maesfricht for Aix la Chapelle.

Bruffels, Aug. 25. The States General having by their Refolution of the 5th inflant, communicated to Don Emanuel de Lyra the 9th, declared that they expected the Crown of Spain fhould fatisfie the Debts, owing to the Prince of Orange, by vertue of feveral Agreements and Stipulations made in confequence of the Treaty of Munfter; and to the Admiralties of thefe Provinces, for Monies disburft during the War, before they parted with Maeffrichts the faid Minifler two or three days before he Lift the Hague, gave in a very long Memorial, containing a Reply to the faid Refolution. In which he first forth

forth the furprize he was in to receive after a fullicitation of ten months, and after fo many Memorials by him given in, an Anfwer fo little fuitable to the great Allillances (even preceding the Treatv of 1673.) rendred the State by the Crown of Spain in the beginning of the late War; That the Offer of Maestricht was then made voluntarily by the States, as an acknowle igment of the lame, which they ought therefore the rather to make good; That for what concerns the Prince of Orange, the Debt had never been denied, and great Sums had been paid on that account; and that the Millions which the Crown of Spain has expended in the late War in Subfidies and maintenance of foreign Troops, would have more then fatisfyed his Highneffes pretentions. That the Crown of Spain does readily acknowledge the great obligations they, the States, have to his Highnels, for the eminent Services he hath rendred them in fo many occafions; That in fatisfaction of his Debt, the Crown of Spain had affigned him 100000 Crowns at each return of the Galcons, and 50000 Crowns of Annual Rents in the Low Countries; That as to what is owing to the Admiralties, all care will be taken to latisfie the fame. Then he shews the great advan-tage Muestricht may be of to Spain, but of none to the States, lying fo far from their Frontiers; and concludes, that he knows not how the King his Mafter will refent this their proceeding, or what he may refolve in return thereof, concerning the Dutch Effects, for that he is ignoraut whether his Majefly will act therein according to his Royal Goodnels, or according to the Jullice and Right of the thing.

Hague, Aug. 25. The Council of State has made fresh inflances that the Monies granted by the States for the Fortifications, may be paid, that fo they may begin with those of *Campen*; The States of Holland have declared themselves ready to furnish their Quota, and that they will write to the other Provinces concerning it. The States have thought fit to give an Answer to the Memorial of Don Emanuel de Lyra, the Spanish Minister, which he gave in by way of Reply to their Resolution of the 5th inflant concerning Maestricht. The news we have from Surinam is not very good, for our Letters give us an account, that the ill pollure of things there, chiefly occafioned by the feveral Rifings of the Indians, had obliged a great many Families to leave the Colony, and to transport themselves to Tobago. There are Letters from Italy, which fay, that the Chevalier de Tourville cruising on the Coast of Sardinia, had met with 3 or 4 Spanish Men of War, who, to avoid all-occafions of dispute, put into Cagliari, of which the faid Chevalier de Tourville had given notice to the Duke de Vivonne, who was thereupon failing thither with his Gallies, with intention, as is believed, to execute his orders about making all Spanish Ships strike, shough they are in their own Ports,
