THE King of Poland as well as the Czar of Moscow, having sent Ambassadors to the several Courts of Christendom to demand assistance against the Turks, the account they give of the dispositions they find those Princes in will very much quicken or retard the proposed Alliance against the Port; into which it appears already that the Emperor has no great mind to enter. In Prussia the old standing Regiments are not only compleated, but new levies are making, though no body knows the reason of it.

Vienna, Aug. 15. It is expected that an Answer will be given, this week, to the Moscovite and Polish Ambassadors, which they extremely press for; the latter, in the last conference He had with the Imperial Commissioners, declared, That though the Czar should be persuaded to Treat seperately with the Turks, and conclude a Peace with them, yet the Crown of Poland would promise not to enter into any Negotiation with the Port, but jointly and with the consent of the Emperor, which they said upon the objection made by the Imperialists, that the Emperor, in case he entered into the War, might come to be left by his Allies. But after all, it seems, this Court has no great inclination to enter into so expensive and hazardous a War, as this may prove; and with this Answer it's believed the Ambassadors will be dispatched.

Cologne, Aug. 25. The French Troops that are quartered in the Countrey of *Fuliers*, do not make the least shew of removing from thence; and we begin to fear, that they intend to winter there. The detachment of the *Marschal de Crequi's* Army, which we were told, was ordered to march through the *Bysselt*, towards *Lorraine*, lies still at *Kerpen*, where, as passengers that came from thence tell us, they have marked out a Camp; so that no body knows when they intend to remove from thence. In the meantime, we cannot but fear, that their remaining thus in these parts, is with an eye upon us; though our Letters from *Paris* would assure us of the contrary.

Strasbourg, Aug. 21. Monsieur *Verjus*, who is appointed, by the Most Christian King, to reside as his Minister at *Ratisbonne*, passed through this place two days since on his way thither. The French are now about quitting the Castle of *Waldenheim*, and we hope this Countrey will in a short time be wholly rid of them; but as for *Schlestadt* it appears plainly, that they have no intention of quitting it. We are to have herea Garrison of the Troops of the Circles, which is thought very necessary, seeing we are not yet free of the apprehensions we had of the French.

Strasbourg, Aug. 28. The Imperial Troops are now on their march towards *Bohemia*, and are appointed to Rendezvous at *Egra*. The French Troops commanded by Lieutenant General *Mon-*

clar have received orders to remain on the Frontiers of *Alsace*, till farther order. The French are fortifying *Phalsburg*. Our Letters from *Ratisbonne* give an account that the Bishop of *Aichstadt*, the Emperor's Commissioner at the Dyet, had communicated to the States the Instrument Signed by the Imperial and French Ambassadors at *Nimeguen*, for the Executing the Peace, and acquainted them that in pursuance thereof the Emperor was drawing his Troops out of the Empire into his Hereditary Countries; but withall let them know, that it was necessary a constant Body of men should be maintained for the security of the Empire.

Brussels, Aug. 29. Our Governour the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* was expected the 27th instant at *Herfi*, in the Country of *Limburg*, where the Prince of *Nassau*, Governor of that Province, was preparing for his Excellencies reception. *Don Emanuel de Lyra*, late Envoy from our King to the States General of the United Provinces is come hither, and will continue his journey for *Spain* (where he is to be Secretary of State,) so soon as his Excellency returns, who is expected here about the latter end of this week: the said Envoy is said to be much dissatisfied with the Answer he received from the States concerning *Maastricht*, and, the more, for that he had all along promised himself he should obtain his demand. From *Liege* we have an account, that the French Troops would be all past in a day or two, except a small Body which continued encamped near the River *Roeer*, in order to the getting in the Contributions, which they still pretend of *Fuliers* and *Bergh*; and that the Detachment that was to march to *Lorraine* remains encamped at *Kerpen*, without any appearance of removing.

Brussels, Sep. 1. To morrow the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* will be at *Namur*, where he will find the States of that Country assembled, and hopes to dispatch affairs there, so that he may part from thence the 4th instant, to visit *Charleroy* and *Aeth*, and that done, make a turn hither, before his Excellency goes for *Gant*, where he intends to be the 8th, the States being appointed to meet the 10th. The Prince of *Orange* having taken the Diversion of Hunting, is now on his way to *Breda*, from whence he will go to *Bergen-op-Zoom*, to visit those Garrisons, and so retire to the *Hague*. From the *Rhine* we are told, that the several Counties of which the French demand Contributions, have sent Deputies to *Aix-la-Chapelle* to adjust the same with the French Intendant. From *Alsace* we hear that the French are leaving those parts, having quitted *Saveren* and all other places in that Country, except *Colmar* and *Schlestadt*, which they continue to Fortifie; That the Duke of *Lorraine* was going to take Possession of his Government of *Tyrol*.

Hague, Aug. 29. The States having ordered the usual present to be made to *Don Emanuel de Lyra*, the Spanish Envoy, before he went hence

we understand he refused it because of the dissatisfactory Answer he had received about *Maastricht*; and it is now said that his Successor will not be here so soon as we had expected. We shall now in few days hear what becomes of the Peace of the North, the Most Christian King having allowed no more than this Month to conclude it in.

Hague, Sep. 1. On Wednesday next the Prince of *Orange* is expected here, but will not make any stay, intending to go and meet her Highness at *Maastricht* in her return from *Aix-la-Chapelle*. The Elector of *Cologne's* Resident here has desired the States to send Commissioners to *Maastricht*, to meet those that shall be Commission'd by his Electoral Highness, to adjust matters concerning the restoring his Jurisdiction there.

Paris, Sep. 2. The 30th past the Duke de *Puffranga*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Spain* had a private Audience of His Majesty, and the same day the Contract of Marriage between the King of *Spain* and Mademoiselle was signed by the King, by the Royal Family, and by the Marquis de *los Balbases* the Spanish Ambassador. The next day the said Marriage was solemnized in the Chapel at *Fountainbleau*, (of which we may be able in our next to give you the particulars) after which, the King, in the presence of the said Ambassador, swore the Peace concluded between the two Crowns, the last year at *Nimeguen*, which the King of *Spain* was to do the same day at *Madrid*, in the presence of the French Ambassador the Marquis de *Villars*. The King has declared that it is 6 years since he gave to Prince *William of Fursenberg* his Nomination to the Cardinalate, so that he will, without doubt, have a Cap at the first promotion; There are at present 16 Vacancies in the Calledge of Cardinals. The last week arrived here an Express from *Sueden*, with that King's Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace concluded here with the Elector of *Brandenburg*. The 22 past the Dutchess of *Osnabrug* arrived at the Abby of *Maubuiffon*, of which her Sister the Princess *Louise* is Abbess where she was the same day visited by the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, the latter being her Niece. The Marechal de *Crequi* has been extream ill at *Wesel*, inasmuch that his recovery began to be despair'd of, but two days since we had Letters which said that he was somewhat better. - In his absence the Marechal d' *Humiers* commands the King's Forces, of whose designs people here talk variously. Our Italian Letters speak of a sharp Fight between the *Malta* Gallies and 5 Turkish Men of War or Gallies, that of the latter 2 were taken, and in them 400 Slaves; that the other 3 escaped with great difficulty; that on board the *Malteses* were killed 300 common Soldiers, and about 25 Knights. It is said there is advice of the Count d' *Estree's* being arriv'd at *Martenico* in the *West-Indies*, and that from thence he intended for *St. Christopher's*.

Bridlington, Aug. 21. This afternoon came to an Anchor in this Bay one of His Majesties Frigates, to Convey the *Island* Fishers, having 5 or 6 in his company, and a great many are gone by to the Southerward.

Plimouth, Aug. 22. Yesterday Sir *Francis Drake* and Mr. *Ruffel* were chosen at *Tuystocke* to be their Burgesses in the approaching Parliament.

Waymouth, Aug. 23. Yesterday was our Election of Burgesses, and Sir *John Coventry* and Sir *John*

Morton were chosen. At *Melcomb Regis*, *Thomas Brown* and *Michael Hawey* Esquires are Elected.

Portsmouth, Aug. 23. The 21 instant came to Spithead the *Bristol*, the *Oxford* and the *Kings-Fisher*, who have been Cruising to the Westward; they saw nor heard of any Turks Men of War in the Channel. The *Friendship*, *Edward Beare* master, is this day arrived from *Norway*.

Lyme, Aug. 25. On Friday last was the Election of Burgesses for *Bridport*, where Sir *Robert Henly* and Major *Bragg* were chose.

Windsor, Aug. 25. This morning His Majesties indispotion returning, which the Physicians take to be an Ague, He was, by their advice, let blood, and has been since (God be thanked) in very good temper.

Windsor, Aug. 26. The King after his Fit yesterday, rested well last night, and has been (God be praised) fine and well all this day.

Windsor, Aug. 27. His Majesty had, this Morning, another Fit; but it was so much gentler than the former, and was accompanied with such good Symptoms, and His Majesty has been since Ten a Clock, when it left him, so brisk and well, that there is good reason to hope it is the last Fit he will have, and that his distemper is quite gone off.
