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Dantzick, Aug. 12.

HE King of Poland as well as the Czar of Moscowy, having sent Ambassadors to the several Gourts of Christendom to demand assistance against the Turks, the account they give of the dispositions they find those Princes in will very much quicken or retard the proposed Alliance against the Port; into which it appears already that the Emperor has no great mind to enter. In Prassa the old standing Regiments are not only compleated, but new levies are making, though no body knows the reason of it.

Vienne Aug. 15. It is expected that an Answer will be given, this week, to the Moscovite and Polish Ambassadors, which they extreamly press for; the latter, in the last conference He had with the Imperial Commissioners', declared, That though the Czar should be persuaded to Treat seperately with the Turks, and conclude a Peace with them, yet the Crown of Poland would promise not to enter into any Negotiation with the Port, but jointly and with the consent of the Emperor, which they said upon the objection made by the Imperialists, that the Emperor, in case he entred into the War, might come to be left by his Allies. But after all, it seems, this Court has no great inclination to enter into so expensive and hazardous a War as this may prove; and with this Answer it's beleived the Ambassadors will be dispatched.

Cologne, Aug, 25. The French Troops that are quartered in the Countrey of Fuliers, do not make the least shew of removing from thence; and we begin to sear, that they intend to winter there. The detachment of the Mareschal'de Crequi's Army, which we were told, was ordered to march through the Eysfelt, towards Lorrain, lies still at Kerpen, where, as passengers that came from thence tell us, they have marked out a Camp; so that no body knows when they intend to remove from thence. In the mean time, we cannot but fear, that their remaining thus in these parts, is with an eye upon us; though our Letters from Paris' would assure us of the contrary.

Strasburg, Aug. 21. Monsieur Verjus, who is appointed. by the Most Christian King, to reside as his Minister at Ratisbonne, passed through this place two days since on his way thither. The Brench are now about quitting the Castle of Wallenbeim, and we hope this Countrey will in a short time be wholly rid of them; but as for Schlestadt it appears plainty, that they have no intention of quitting it. We are to have here a Garison of the Troops of the Circles, which is thought very necessary, seeing we are not yet free of the apprehensions we had of the French.

Strasburg, Aug. 25 The Imperial Troops are now on their march towards Bohemia, and are appointed to Rendezvous at Egra. The French Troops commanded by Lieutenant General Mon-

clar have received orders to remain on the Frontiers of Alface, till farther order. The French are fortifying Pfalsburg. Our Letters from Ratisbonne give an account that the Bishop of Aichstadt, the Emperor's Commissioner at the Dyet, had communicated to the States the Instrument Signed by the Imperial and French Ambassadors at Nimeguen, for the Executing the Peace, and acquainted them that in pursuance thereof the Emperor was drawing his Troops out of the Empire into his Hereditry Countries; but withall let them know, that it was necessary a constant Body of men should be maintained for the security of the Empire.

Brussels, Aug. 29. Our Governour the Duke de Vila Hermola was expected the 27th instant at Herst, in the Country of Limburg, where the Prince of Nassau, Governor of that Province, was preparing for his Excellencies reception. Don Emanuel de Lyra, late Envoy from our King to the States General of the United Provinces is come hither, and will continue his journey for Spain (where he is to be Secretary of State) so soon as his Excellency returns, who is expected here about the latter end of this week: the said Envoy is said to be much distaissfied with the Answer he received from the States concerning Maestrich, and, the more, for that he had all along promised himself he should obtain his demand. From Liege we have an account, that the French Troops would be all past in a day or two, except a small Body which continued encamped near the River Reer, in order to the getting in the Contributions, which they still pretend of Juliers and Bergs; and that the Detatchment that was to march to Lorrain remains encamped at Kerpen, without any appearance of removing.

Brussels, Sep. 1. To morrow the Duke de Villa Hermosa will be at Namur, where he will find the States of that Country affembled, and hopes to dispatch affairs there, so that he may page from thence the 4th instant, to visit Charleroy and Aeth. and that done, make a turn hither, before his Excellency goes for Gaunt, where he intends to be the 8th, the States being appointed to meet the 10th. The Prince of Orange having taken the Diversisement of Hunting, is now on his way to Breds, from whence he will go to Bergen-sp-Zoom, to visit those Garisons, and so retire to the Hague. From the Rhipe we are told, that the feveral Countries of which the French demand Contributions, have sent Deputies to Aix-la-Chapelle to adjust the same with the French Intendant. From Alface we hear that the French are leaving those parts, having enitted Savern and all other places in that Country, except Colmar and Slechfadt, wich they continue to Fortific; That the Duke of Lorrain was going to take Possession of his Government of Tyrol.

The next day the faid Marriage was Solemnized in the Chapel at Pontianbleau, (of which we may be able in our next-to give you the particulars) after which, the King, in the presence of the said Ambassador, swore the Peace concluded between the two Crowns, the fast year at Nimeguen, which the King of Spain was to do the same day at Madrid, in the presence of the French Ambassador the Marquis de Villars. The King has declared that it is & years fince he gave to Prince William of Furstemberg his Nomination to the Cardinalate, so that he will, without doubt, have a Cap at the first promotion; There are at present 16 Vaca: cies in the Calledge of Cardinals. The last week arrived here an Express from Sueden, with that King's Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace concluded here with the Ekctor of Brandenburg. The 22 past the Dutchess of Osnabrug arrived at the Abby of Maubuisson, of which her Sister the Princess Louise is Abbess where she was the same day visi red by the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, the latter being her Niece. The Mareschal de Crequi has been extream ill at Wefel, insomuch that his recovery began to be despair'd of, but two days since we had Letters which faid that he was somewhat better. - In his absence the Mareschal d'Humiers commands the King's Forces, of whose designs people here talk variously. Our Italian Letters speak of a sharp Fight between the Maltha Galleys and f Furkish Men of War or Galleys, that of the latter 2 were taken, and in them 400 Slaves; that the other 3 escaped with great difficulty; that on board the Multhejes were killed foo common Soldiers, and about 25 Knights. It is faid there is advice of the Count d' Estrae's being arrived at Martenico in the West-Indies, and that From thence he intended for Si. Christopher's.
