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Naples, Aug. 15.

Yesterday arrived here a Courier from Madrid, bringing an account of the Kings Marriage with Mademoiselle d'Orleans being concluded, and that there had been great rejoicings for three days together on this occasion. The Marquis de los Velez our Viceroy, has resolved to assemble again the Quarters of this City, of whom he formerly demanded that they would make the King a Present on his Marriage, to see what they will now do in it. The affairs of Sicily are in some disorder; the Messines complain of the severe treatment they receive from their Viceroy, and there has been, as we are informed, some disturbances on that account among the common people.

Vienna, Aug. 26. The 24 instant the Emperor and the whole Court parted from hence for Prague. Count Montecuculi at the same time is gone for Raab, to give Audience to a Turkish Chiaus arrived there. The Moscovite Ambassadors are gone home, having hastened their departure, because of the Plague, which encreases daily; and to morrow the Polish Ambassador Prince Radzevil likewise leaves this place. From Hungary we hear, that an accommodation is made with the Malecontents, who are restored to their Estates, and left to the free exercise of their Religion.

Hamburg, Sept. 5. We have Letters from Sweden, which say, that the Peace was as good as concluded, and that the Troops which were to take possession of *Stein*, were already on their way thither. And this is confirmed by a Letter from Monsieur de Feuquieres the French Ambassador in Sweden to the Sieur Rabenac, who says, that all the Articles of the Treaty were adjusted, and that they only expected the return of a Courier he had sent to Paris, when they would proceed to sign it.

Strasbourg, Sept. 1. We are assured that a detachment of the Marechal de Crequi's Army is on its march towards these parts, which, with the Advices we have from several hands of the designs of the French upon this City, puts us into great apprehensions, and the more when we consider with what earnestness the French pressed the Imperial Troops that were in Garison here, to leave this place, which we now begin to imagine was done with design, that we might be deprived of all assistance. The French work very hard on the Fortifications of Pfalsburg, and intend, as it seems, to lay up a great Magazine there, for they send daily thither vast quantities of Provisions, and all sorts of Ammunition. Our Magistrates are in the mean time so sensible of the danger that threatens them, that they have resolved to send three Deputies to France, to endeavor to discover the intentions of the Court with relation to us.

Wesel, Sept. 1. Yesterday the Marechal de Crequi being pretty well recovered of his indisposi-

tion, parted hence on his way for France; and we hope the French Troops, which as yet remain in these Countries will not stay long after him. The Brandenburg Troops have again taken possession of Rees, Emmericke, and Cleves.

Antwerp, Sept. 4. On Saturday last arrived here two English Yachts, on board of which were the Lady Ann and the Lady Isabelle, with their Attendants; they came ashore privately, and went on for Brussels, where it's believed they arrived the next day. From Germany they write, that the City of Strasburg is in great apprehension of the French.

Brussels, Sept. 5. On Sunday last the Lady Ann and the Lady Isabelle arrived here, in very good health from England. His Royal Highness has appointed Mr. Tufson to go for Spain, to compliment the King and Queen upon their Marriage. It is believed that the Princess of Orange, who finds much good by drinking the Waters at Aix, will take this place in her return home, to visit their Royal Highnesses. Our Governor the Duke de Villa Hermosa, is at present at Namur, from whence he is expected here about the end of this week. From the Rhine they write, that the Marechal de Crequi was past by Zons and Nuiz, towards Aix la Chapelle, in his return for Paris; that he was carried in a Litter, being still very much indisposed. That the Prince of Neuburg, with the Archduchess his Wife, was arrived at Dusseldorp, and had been received there with great solemnity.

Brussels, Sept. 8. Yesterday, by Letters from England, we had an account of His Majesties indisposition, and this morning early his Royal Highness, attended by the Earl of Peterborow, and Colonel Churchill, parted hence for England. The Dutchesse de Villa Hermosa returned hither two days since, and to morrow his Excellency is expected. On Sunday next *Te Deum* will be sung, and that will be followed by Bonfires and other publick demonstrations of joy, on occasion of our Kings marriage, which was solemnized the 31 past at Fontainebleau. From Liege of the 6th instant they write, that the Marechal de Crequi arrived there on Sunday last in his return for France. Our Letters from the Upper Rhine say, that the French are going to attack Strasbourg, pretending to restore the Bishops Jurisdiction there as it was in former times; that in order thereunto their Troops are marching thither from Lorraine and Burgundy, and that the Marechal d'Humieres is to command them. The Letters add, that the Most Christian King has demanded the Homage of those of Alsace.

Hague, Sept. 8. Yesterday the States of Holland were assembled for the first time since their late recess; and in a day or two the Prince of Orange is expected here. Our Northern Letters say that the Peace between the two Crowns was concluded at Lundon in Schonen; and at the same time our French Letters tell us, that a Treaty of Peace

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
